OUR REVITALIZING PROGRAM HAS BEGUN

Our humble beginnings . . .

As many read this article, you will personally remember when the Italian American Heritage Foundation was founded as an organization in 1976. Throughout the next eight or nine years, the IAHF was able to raise large sums of money to purchase our current property at 425 North Fourth Street. Since then, we have held countless events spanning almost four decades celebrating our Italian history and culture. The heartbeat of the IAHF.

Our realistic present . . .

As the pandemic is (hopefully) in our rearview mirror, the Board of Directors and all our wonderful volunteers at the IAHF are doing everything in our power to bring back our celebrated events and striving to create new events. There seems to be an excited spirit amongst our members as I'm able to speak with them at our events that we've held so far. I also hear of positive reports from other members, both Board and membership, about the joy of meeting back in person and enjoying each other's company.

All the while, our building needs major improvements. The BOD has met and is in discussion about the improvements we need for our building. Some of those improvements are as follows: new HVAC, new flooring, new roof, electrical upgrade, ADA restroom compliance and a new canopy, just to name a few. I have been scheduling vendors to come in and look at the

various items on our list of capital improvements to get ballpark quotes. When the HVAC contractor came and looked at the units up on the roof, the first words out of his mouth were "It's a miracle your HVAC has lasted this long." Being able to do all of these things will improve our building and secure it for future generations to come. Just as countless others have done so for us back in the 70s and 80s.

Our hopeful future . . .

Now I turn to our current membership and ask everyone to consider what you can do to support our revitalization fund, not only now but in the future! I'd like to start a revitalization fund campaign so we can move ahead on our capital improvement projects. I am looking for at least 100 people to join with me and commit to give \$100 over the next 12 months or a one-time gift of \$1,200 for the next year. There may be some members who can give much more than this and there may be some members who can give maybe \$25 or \$50 a month. This revitalization fund campaign will be called The President's Club and our sole purpose will be to raise funds so the future generations to come will enjoy this building just as you and I have enjoyed it all these many years.

IAHF Merit-Based and Need-Based Scholarships



Online Italian Language Classes

When the pandemic hit, Delia Schizzano was no longer able to teach her in-person Italian classes at the IAHF. However, there was a great interest by people to do something so I started teaching online Italian classes twice a week. Delia has now resumed her in person classes at the IAHF. There is still a demand for online classes so I am continuing to offer them. Classes are taught online via Zoom every Monday and Wednesday from 6 -7 pm PST. We welcome students at different levels and classes are free. To sign up go to Meetup at Italian Language Online Chat Group in San Jose.

The classes focus on exposing students to the Italian language content by reading stories of authentic spoken Italian rather than using a textbook or focusing on grammar. Stories are discrete lessons making it easy for students to join at any point. Students are also introduced to all things Italian, including basic Italian phrases, how to start a conversation, ask for directions or make a reservation. Students are exposed to other topics including history of music, festas and opera as well as foods, wines and cheeses of each of the 20 regions.

We begin a new story or topic by having students review the detailed vocabulary list, then each student is asked to read a short passage in Italian and translate what they read into English. This process allows students to learn while hearing others speak Italian, much like when traveling in Italy because not everyone will speak in the same way. Hearing the repetition of words also helps students remember words and phrases more easily because they are absorbed in what they are reading.

Many of the students who joined from the beginning are still with me now. I'm grateful to have been part of their Italian language journey and enjoy the bond that has developed with this group. I have seen a great improvement when I hear them speak and pronounce words in Italian and in their general understanding of the Italian language.



A PEEK INTO THE BOARDROOM

Items discussed:

- In Attendance: President Dana Zuccarello, First VP Ken Borelli, Second VP Azie Habib, Fourth VP Louie Lombardo, Corporate Secretary Sharon McCray, Treasurer Frank Deturris, Madeline Damiano, Elise Habra, Joe Lucito, Stephen Ricossa, Nanci Wilborn Mary Pizzo, and Tony Zerbo. Attending via Zoom were Marie Bertola, Sue Monahan, and Dave Perzinski. The Third VP position remains vacant. The meeting was called to order by Dana.
- Financially, we are fairly sound with total bank assets of \$405,380 with available cash of \$104,919, including \$80,000 in reserves.
 Frank acknowledged a very generous anonymous member who pledged \$300 per month for the Revitalization Fund. We were all urged to help find new donors or sponsors for the IAHF.
- Ken reported that there are the usual events planned for 2023 such as regional lunches (beginning February), lectures, cooking and language classes, polenta/crab feed dinners and a bocce tournament, along with an Oldies but Goodies dinner dance on February 26th (Delia to chair).
- Ken has accepted the chairmanship for the Festa and asked for coordinators to help with several aspects of the event: food, beer and wine, cultural, public relations to name a few. The Festa dates are August 5, & 6, with set up Friday, August 4.
- Dave and Azie are working on replacing the floor in the Hall with estimates as high as \$40,000. Additional bids are being sought.
 We will need help moving all the furniture for the installation. It was agreed to defer ADA changes to the bathroom until we discuss the implications of modifications to the structure that are due to zoning issues.
- Louie reported that on August 20, 2022, the Cit changed 516 properties, including our Hall, from light industrial to

- public/quasi-public. No one was notified of these proposed changes and so nobody from the IAHF attended that August meeting. We are looking into what we can do to solidify the bar permit.
- Azie reported that we currently have 11 hall rental dates reserved for 2023.
- Nanci showed the newly created plaques for the new chairs and asked for help in getting them installed as soon as feasible. It was agreed that they would be placed on the back of the chairs, just below the hand entry point.
- Mary is looking for articles and encouraged everyone to contribute something. There was also discussion about the "Save the Date" postcards Dave created and how effective they are.
- Madeline noted that the Library needs a bigger budget once the current library grant is used. Revenue from book sales is considered a donation. She is hoping to locate a scanner to help with the many documents on file. Louie said we should consider purchasing more than one scanner. Louie explained that we had spent \$15,150 so far and that \$28,850 remains in the Grant.
- Louie reported that the office is covered by BOD members while Stanley is on vacation. Office hours during this time will be 11am
 2pm, closed on Fridays.
- Dave reported that we currently have 308 members, 75 of whom are new. An email and letters have been sent; second reminders will be sent soon. This year, we are upgrading to plastic membership cards, and Dave showed a sample. They have been ordered and should arrive within the next couple of weeks.
- February BOD meeting has been changed to MONDAY, February 13, 2023.



This significant announcement is from the American Italian Federation of the Southeast.

As I have written many times before, many members of our local Italian American community are the product of a secondary migration that originated from Southern Louisiana and New Orleans to the greater San Jose metropolitan area. So I enthusiastically share the announcement of the establishment of a Sicilian sugarcane harvester monument around Houma, Louisiana. The early Sicilian immigrants (1870-1920's) contributed greatly to the reconstruction of the regional economy after the United States Civil War when slave labor was substituted with immigrant labor.

The early immigrants were a hard working group of "paisani." Their back-breaking work was labor intensive and almost as exploitive as the slave labor it replaced. This more than likely

contributed to the secondary migration to move out of the sugar





cane fields and come to the Santa Clara Valley. Nevertheless, sizeable groups of those early immigrants stuck it out, and became an integral part of the community and hence the "sense of collective memory" and the need to memorialize this piece of Italian American History in Southern Louisiana. As a young graduate student in New Orleans, I recall my field instructor telling me about her African American grandmother who did not speak English, coming from the rural southern Parishes (counties). She only spoke Cajun and Italian. The region has a fascinating history, and that history in many ways is also shared by our community, especially as it pertains to work ethic, a common trait of all immigrant groups. For this same reason, we have developed our IAHF history boards and the need to have some sort of recognition of the San Jose Growers Market. It's all part

of the same phenomenon, and they both need to be memorialized in the community! -- Article by Ken Borelli *

Once Upon A Hill

by Carmine Vittoria ~

Once Upon a Hill by Carmine Vittoria is a muti-faceted work of heavily documented historical fiction. It will appeal to readers interested in the development of the Mafia here in America as well as its roots in the south of Italy. Professor Vittoria makes interesting, occasional references to the Mafia films such as The Godfather and Goodfellows which makes his historical writing relevant to present

day readers. Additionally, the book will have special appeal to Bostonians as the complicated history of the North End is thoroughly explored in the writing.

Readers are initially introduced to two young Italian shepherd boys from small towns in the Campagna region of Italy. At 8 yeas old the boys are thrust into the hard life of shepherding hundreds of sheep to the Apennine Mountain ridge for grazing. It's a lonely and dangerous life. The resulting friendship of the boys forms the basis of the story.

One boy, Vito, comes from the sunny side of the mountain and his trek up to the top is very long. His trek is fraught with typical mountain dangers of wildlife and dangerous terrain. The second boy, Guido, comes from the colder and windier side of the mountain. His trek to the top is shorter, but exceedingly difficult due to an abundance of loose boulders and deep ravines and wild boar. These treks hint to the paths they each will follow in life. Once the boys reach the sweet grasses of the highland plateau, the tedious and lengthy job of caring for the sheep and sheepdogs continues for months. The gentleness of the grassland atop the mountain offers a needed contrast to the grueling trek up the hill. Frequent matches of bocce among the shepherds of all ages provide excitement and camaraderie.

This introduction of the boys' cresting the hill, encumbered with responsibility, and reaching the top successfully, is a metaphor for the entire subsequent story. It's the 1940's, the War has ended, and the boys become familiarized with the modern world and its opportunities. Vito decides to come to America and eventually gains entry through legitimate channels. Guido also gains entry but does so under false pretenses and documents signed and paid for by his Mafia relatives. Their method of entry into the U.S. foreshadows the paths their American lives will take.

Author Vittoria has clearly done his homework as we follow Guido's path through all the open doors provided by the Mafia. The

background of the Mafia capos, where they come from, and what becomes of them is fascinating. Mafia illegal activities in New Jersey, New York, Boston, Providence, Miami, Havana, and Las Vegas will remind readers of what a dangerous and massive and successful, and evil organization gripped the country. A truly black mark on Italian American history.

Vito's path was blissfully different. Just as he entered the country as an upright citizen, so his life continued. It was a pleasure to read about his good choices, academic challenges, and successes. His emersion into the rarified world of electromagnetism and that of Enrico Fermi's former students and colleagues is fascinating and satisfying.

Interestingly, the two childhood friends meet again, much later in life on a bocce court in Boston's North End. So, the boys come full circle from their youthful bocce on the high plateau. The bocce court which was an oasis at the top of the Apennines is also an oasis in the troubled North End where people come together for relaxation and diversion despite their differences in daily life. The conclusion is gratifying, and the richly detailed book is enjoyable and edifying.

These colors have a rich history and symbolic meaning dating back to the Roman Republic. Green represents hope, white represents purity, and red represents the blood of martyrs. Lucia's COOKING CLASS NEWS





This is the time of year that we take a little break from cooking classes. That doesn't mean we're not still cooking, right? Here's a recipe that's easy, tasty and economical to grace your table at any time of the year. Now that it's cold and rainy, it's the perfect, creamy comfort food to warm your bones.

You may have heard of a baked feta pasta dish that originated on TikTok and has taken the social media world by storm. There are many popular baked feta pasta recipes on social media. I'm writing about this particular recipe because my nephew, Damian, recommended it. I have tried it and thought I would share it with our readers.

If you try it, let me know how it turns out for you and if you like it. You may want to add additional seasonings to suit your preferences. After all, as they say in Italy, "tutti gusti son gusti" (everyone has their own taste). I would like to know if you prepared it. Here's my email for your comments – lac9471@yahoo.com. TIKTOK INSPIRED BAKED FETA PASTA

Ingredients:

- 2 pints (20 ounces) cherry tomatoes
- ½ cup extra-virgin olive oil
- Kosher salt
- Freshly ground black pepper
- One 8-ounce block feta cheese, drained (recommended-made from sheep's milk)
- 10 ounces mezze rigatoni (or any short pasta noodle)
- 1 clove garlic, finely grated
- Pinch crushed red pepper flakes (optional)
- ¼ cup fresh basil leaves, thinly sliced
- Flaky sea salt, for serving

Directions:

- 1. Preheat the oven to 400 degrees F.
- Toss the cherry tomatoes and olive oil with 1/4 teaspoon of salt and several grinds of black pepper in a medium bowl until combined. Transfer to a 2 1/2- to 3-quart baking dish, place the feta

- in the center of the tomatoes and season with a pinch of black pepper. Bake until the tomatoes have burst and the feta has softened, about 30 minutes. Raise the heat to 450 degrees F and continue to cook until the tomatoes and feta are golden brown, 10 to 15 minutes more.
- 3. Meanwhile, bring a large pot of generously salted water to a boil over high heat. Add the pasta and cook until al dente, about 13 minutes. Reserve 1/2 cup of the cooking water, then thoroughly drain the pasta.
- 4. As soon as the tomatoes and feta come out of the oven, stir in the garlic and red pepper flakes (if using). Use the back of a spoon to smash the tomatoes and feta into a smooth and creamy sauce (it's okay if some of the oil isn't fully integrated). Add the pasta and half the basil and toss until evenly coated. If the sauce is too thick, stir in some pasta water a couple tablespoons at a time. Taste and adjust the seasoning with salt and pepper. Serve topped with the remaining basil and a pinch of sea salt.

Cook's Note

Be sure to buy a good-quality feta for this recipe, particularly because it's the main ingredient and flavor of the dish. We suggest using a medium or firm Greek feta made only from sheep's milk. Feta made from cow's milk tends to be crumblier and sourer.

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
