

OUR REVITALIZING PROGRAM HAS BEGUN

Our humble beginnings . . .

As many read this article, you will personally remember when the Italian American Heritage Foundation was founded as an organization in 1976. Throughout the next eight or nine years, the IAHF was able to raise large sums of money to purchase our current property at 425 North Fourth Street. Since then, we have held countless events spanning almost four decades celebrating our Italian history and culture. The heartbeat of the IAHF.

Our realistic present . . .

As the pandemic is (hopefully) in our rearview mirror, the Board of Directors and all our wonderful volunteers at the IAHF are doing everything in our power to bring back our celebrated events and striving to create new events. There seems to be an excited spirit amongst our members as I'm able to speak with them at our events that we've held so far. I also hear of positive reports from other members, both Board and membership, about the joy of meeting back in person and enjoying each other's company.

All the while, our building needs major improvements. The BOD has met and is in discussion about the improvements we need for our building. Some of those improvements are as follows: new HVAC, new flooring, new roof, electrical upgrade, ADA restroom compliance and a new canopy, just to name a few. I have been scheduling vendors to come in and look at the various items on our list of capital improvements to get ballpark quotes. When the HVAC contractor came and looked at the units up on the roof, the first words out of his mouth were "It's a miracle your HVAC has lasted this long." Being able to do all of these things will improve our building and secure it for future generations to come. Just as countless others have done so for us back in the 70s and 80s.

Our hopeful future . . .

Now I turn to our current membership and ask everyone to consider what you can do to support our revitalization fund, not only now but in the future! I'd like to start a revitalization fund campaign so we can move ahead on our capital improvement projects. I am looking for at least 100 people to join with me and commit to give \$100 over the next 12 months or a one-time gift of \$1,200 for the next year. There may be some members who can give much more than this and there may be some members who can give maybe \$25 or \$50 a month. This revitalization fund campaign will be called The President's Club and our sole purpose will be to raise funds so the future generations to come will enjoy this building just as you and I have enjoyed it all these many years.



Queen of Secrets

It was exciting to have been recommended Queen of Secrets, much of which is set in the east foothills of San Jose in the 1930's. Familiarity makes the book very special.

Queen of Secrets is a book written stylistically as a story within a story. Both narrations carry the same motif of spousal abuse. The first narration begins with Barbara, an R.N. who specializes in geriatric care. The second narration is that of her patient,

Violetta Giordano. The book is heavily weighted toward the narration of Violetta who is former Mafia queen. She chooses to share her fiery history with Barbara, her caregiver who had been sworn to secrecy...thus the title.

Violetta's narration is a very graphic telling of her complex life and her forced involvement with the violent Brooklyn mafia. All this transpires despite her tranquil upbringing in the east foothills of what was at that time called The Valley of Heart's Delight. Sadly, Violetta's life was anything but a delight. Crime entanglements followed her father from Sicily to San Jose and ultimately dictated her future. Passionately in love with an immigrant boy from Sardegna, Violetta rebelled against her father's arranged marriage in a most

uninhibited way; but ultimately to no avail. To keep peace between two crime "families" Violetta was "sacrificed" to an unwanted and doomed marriage.

Violetta's life in New York as the wife of an important member of a Brooklyn crime family certainly has its perks. We find Violetta slowly adapting, sometimes a little too well. Despite her name, Violetta is by no means a shrinking violet. In fact she is one tough woman, actually quite well-suited to her situation. Clearly and admittedly, however, she never loved, or even liked, her husband, a violent somewhat stupid, filthy-mouthed, murderous drunk.

Chapters returning to Barbara don't offer much relief because Barbara is in a dangerously abusive relationship. She is a conflicted woman with a boatload of responsibilities that immobilizes and traps her. Eventually the crusty, elderly Violetta realizes Barbara's situation, empathizes, and a bond forms. This ultimately leads to a dramatic and climactic melding of their lives in an explosive conclusion.

Character development in both stories is extremely commendable. The characters fully blossom as we read. We feel their motivation, their anger, their frustration, and true angst. Queen of Secrets would easily transfer to a riveting R-rated film. It's all there: love, betrayal, the underworld, passion, violence, conflict and resolution.

In Queen of Secrets the Mafia is not presented as a major player in San Jose. But evidently there were some ties to New York crime families. Author Tanda clearly researched the topic. The author is especially commended for not glorifying the mafia. The men are chauvinistic, crude and cruel. The women are sad individuals enjoying the only benefit of the life of crime- wealth and material goods. These poor women are utterly devoid of self-respect.

Author Tanda's attempt to spell out the accents of the immigrants as well as the New Yorkers was quite successful and easy to read.

The series will continue, and we can only hope for Violetta to find a bright and rewarding future.

In closing there is with one caveat in the author's own words: "The book contains mature content which may be disturbing to some readers." *

SWEET POTATO GNOCCHI

As Autumn swept into the IAHF, our October cooking class prepped us for Thanksgiving, Italian style. This was made possible by our guest instructor, Linda Binkley, who taught us how to make sweet potato gnocchi in a maple cinnamon sage brown butter sauce. Instead of candied yams or sweet potatoes for Thanksgiving, sweet potato gnocchi can be substituted for a change of pace. This delicious side dish is the ultimate comfort food which absolutely melts in your mouth.

It is believed that gnocchi originated in Northern Italy. Word spread throughout Italy, and they are found all over the peninsula. Also, they can be found in diverse forms and made with a variety of core ingredients, depending on the region. For example, flour, cornmeal, semolina, bread, chestnut flour, ricotta or vegetables—from yam or pumpkin to spinach to the classic potato.

Linda began the class by going over the ingredients for the gnocchi, including yams, ricotta cheese, salt, cinnamon, black pepper and all-purpose flour. She then invited volunteers to come up and actually prepare the gnocchi and guided them through the process. To save time, the yams were pre-baked so she instructed the students to

mash the cooked yams, mix in the ricotta, salt, cinnamon and pepper until they were well blended. Next, the flour was added in small increments until the dough was formed. The dough was then divided and rolled out into ropes, cut into 1-inch pieces and rolled over the tines of a fork. After that, the dough was ready to be tossed into pots of boiling water.

Once the gnocchi floated to the top of the boiling water, they were cooked and ready to be topped with a sage brown butter sauce. This sauce consisted of butter, sage leaves, cinnamon, maple syrup, salt and pepper and cooked in a sauté pan until it was bubbly and golden brown. At this point, the gnocchi were drenched in the sauce and ready to be enjoyed. Once the steaming gnocchi were placed on serving platters, we served ourselves and devoured these delectable morsels. Ahhhhh, they were perfection in tiny doughy pillows.

If you want something different gracing your Thanksgiving table, I highly recommend this unique dish.

We thank Linda Binkley for her excellent skills in teaching this class and making it a wonderful experience for all of us.

SWEET POTATO GNOCCHI WITH MAPLE CINNAMON SAGE BROWN BUTTER SAUCE 6 to 8 Servings (about 105 gnocchi)

INGREDIENTS

For the gnocchi

- 2 pounds sweet potatoes
- 2/3 cup whole milk ricotta cheese
- 1 1/2 teaspoons salt
- 1 teaspoon ground cinnamon
- 1/4 teaspoon freshly ground black pepper
- 1 1/4 cups all-purpose flour plus 1/3 cup for the work surface

For the maple cinnamon sage brown butter sauce

- 1/2 cup unsalted butter (1 stick)
- 20 fresh sage leaves
- 1 teaspoon ground cinnamon
- 2 tablespoons maple syrup
- 1 teaspoon salt
- 1/2 teaspoon freshly ground black pepper

DIRECTIONS

For the gnocchi

- Preheat the oven to 425 degrees F.
- Pierce the sweet potato with a fork. Bake the sweet potatoes until tender and fully cooked, between 40 to 55 minutes depending on size. Cool slightly.
- Cut in half and scoop the flesh into a large bowl. Mash the sweet potatoes and transfer to a large measuring cup to make sure the sweet potatoes measure about 2 cups.
- Transfer the mashed sweet potatoes back to the large bowl. Add the ricotta cheese, salt, cinnamon and pepper and blend until well mixed. Add the flour, 1/2 cup at a time until a soft dough forms.
- Lightly flour a work surface and place the dough in a ball on the work surface.

- Divide the dough into 6 equal balls. Roll out each ball into a 1-inch-wide rope.
- Cut each rope into 1-inch pieces. Roll the gnocchi over the tines of a fork.
- Transfer the formed gnocchi to a large baking sheet.
- Continue with the remaining gnocchi.
- Meanwhile, bring a large pot of salted water to a boil over high heat.
- Add the gnocchi in 3 batches and cook until tender but still firm to the bite, stirring occasionally, about 5 to 6 minutes.
- Drain the gnocchi using a slotted spoon onto a baking sheet. Tent with foil to keep warm and continue with the remaining gnocchi.

For the brown butter sauce

- While the gnocchi are cooking melt the butter in a large sauté pan over medium heat.
- When the butter has melted add the sage leaves. Continue to cook, swirling the butter occasionally until the foam subsides and the milk solids begin to brown. Remove the pan from the heat.
- Stir in the cinnamon, maple syrup, salt and pepper, being careful as the mixture will bubble up.
- Gently stir the mixture.
- When the bubbles subside, toss the cooked gnocchi in the brown butter.
- Transfer the gnocchi to a serving dish and serve immediately.


Recently I ordered two texts about wartime Italy from the Italic Institute of America in New York. They were fascinating surprises. The two research reports were "Italy between the Wars" and "Italy and the Holocaust." They are both well laid out, illustrated and engaging.

This also caused me to give a nod to the concept of "time." I started reflecting on the content of the books in relation to "time." Time is multidimensional. For us mortals, there is biological time (my aching body). And then there is historical time, which we are all connected to that transcends one's lifetime and beyond. There is also the concept of time in the universe, which may or may not exist so no sense going there; suffice it to say it's part of our DNA.

If you are a history buff or just curious about Italian history, both of these are important publica-

tions. And, according to the document editor and contributor, John Mancini, these publications are soon to be part of a trilogy about wartime Italy. The two reports I ordered resonated with me and with the various ancestry and heritage programs that the IAHF and Almanac are involved in preserving. So many of the episodes were points in time and while many of these actions seem "in the past," they really are a part of our world today.

Most of the players are long gone from the scene, along with our family members who were caught up in those harrowing times. Nonetheless, the actions they set in motion are still with us today. For better or worse, our society is still dealing with the issues. Biologically, our tales end with us however, what we set in motion resonates for a very long time.



I also realize with today's tik-tok generation, sound bites are about all that they can take in. This is fine as far as it goes which fails miserably in terms of trying to grasp the whys and wherefores of our existence and how historical motions are set forth that impact one's life or family drama in very profound ways. If members of your family emigrated from Italy after World War II, for example, then I don't need to go any further as to the relevance of these research reports.

Another factor about the Research Reports is they incorporate an Italian perspective. Yes, there is one! What passes for history many times is solely one perspective, which is usually an Anglo-Saxon one. However, there are other perspectives on the same set of actions. The Italic Institute works are an alternate take on similar events. The more you delve into history,

the more you can appreciate various points of view from which you can base your own opinions.

Just consider one fact in the research reports: "In German-occupied Europe, only Denmark (kudos to the Danes) surpassed Italy in rescuing Jews. 85% of Italian Jews survived the holocaust. This was no accident, and the war years are replete with individual and communal acts of heroism along with the tragic and evil consequences of the Italian Fascist and Nazi occupation of Northern Italy.

A PROCLAMATION ON COLUMBUS DAY, 2022

In 1492, Christopher Columbus sailed from the Spanish port of Palos de la Frontera on behalf of Queen Isabella I and King Ferdinand II, but his roots trace back to Genoa, Italy. The story of his journey remains a source of pride for many Italian Americans whose families also crossed the Atlantic. His voyage inspired many others to follow and ultimately contributed to the founding of America, which has been a beacon for immigrants across the world.

Many of these immigrants were Italian, and for generations, Italian immigrants have harnessed the courage to leave so much behind, driven by their faith in the American dream — to build a new life of hope and possibility in the United States. Today, Italian Americans are leaders in all fields, including government, health, business, innovation, and culture.

Things have not always been easy; prejudice and violence often stalled the promise of equal opportunity. In fact, Columbus Day was created by President Harrison in 1892 in response to the anti-Italian motivated lynching of 11 Italian Americans in New Orleans in 1891. During World War II, Italian Americans were even targeted as enemy aliens. But the hard work, dedication to community, and leadership of Italian Americans in every industry make our country stronger, more prosperous, and more vibrant. The Italian American community is also a cornerstone of our Nation's close and enduring relationship with Italy — a vital NATO Ally and European Union partner. Today, the partnership between Italy and the United States is at the heart of our efforts to tackle the most pressing global challenges of our time, including supporting Ukraine as it defends its freedom and democracy.

In commemoration of Christopher Columbus's historic voyage 530 years ago, the Congress, by joint resolution of April 30, 1934, and modified in 1968 (36 U.S.C. 107), as amended, has requested the President proclaim the second Monday of October of each year as "Columbus Day."

NOW, THEREFORE, I, JOSEPH R. BIDEN JR., President of the United States of America, do hereby proclaim October 10, 2022, as Columbus Day. I direct that the flag of the United States be displayed on all public buildings on the appointed day in honor of our diverse history and all who have contributed to shaping this Nation.

IN WITNESS WHEREOF, I have hereunto set my hand this seventh day of October, in the year of our Lord two thousand twenty-two, and of the Independence of the United States of America the two hundred and forty-seventh.

Note: Columbus Day was signed into law by President Benjamin Harrison on October 21,1892 as a tribute and an act of forgiveness to the Italian community in response to the lynchings of 11 Italians that took place in New Orleans on March 14, 1891. To this day STILL the largest number of people ever lynched at one time in the United States. The Columbus Day holiday quickly became a great source of pride and a symbol of defiance for the Italian-American community against these horrific murders. \sim







PAVAROTTI HONORED with Hollywood Walk of Fame Star

A star on the Hollywood Walk of Fame was posthumously unveiled Wednesday honoring legendary opera singer Luciano Pavarotti. James Conlon, the music director of the LA Opera, and movie producer Cinzia Salvioli, spoke at the ceremony at 7065 Hollywood Boulevard. Pavarotti's daughter Cristina Pavarotti accepted the Star on behalf of the family.

The Star is the 2,730th since the completion of the Walk of Fame in 1961, with the first 1,558 Stars. The ceremony will be streamed on the Walk of Fame's website. The Star ceremony is among a series of events organized by Salvioli's Italian film production company, Albedo Production, to honor Pavarotti, who died in 2007 at the age of 71.

'Severance'Emmy Nom John Turturro Boards 'Potentially Dangerous' As EP; Doc On Italian American WWII Experience Was Produced Via Grant From Russo Brothers Italian American Film Forum

2022 Emmy nominee, John Turturro (Severance), has come aboard the WWII documentary. Potentially Dangerous, as an executive producer.

During the course of the Second World War, the U.S. Government restricted the actions and freedoms of 600,000+ Italian residents. All were declared "Enemy Aliens," and many were placed under curfew, banned from their workplaces, evacuated from their

homes and communities and sent to internment camps in Montana, Texas and elsewhere.

Many of these people had been in the United States for decades, had children born in their adopted country and had sons serving in the U.S. Military.

"During this era, Italians made up the biggest foreign-born group in the country. Interned Italians were not charged with a crime and were not allowed legal representation. They were subjected to "loyalty hearings" and held for the duration of the war. The United States government considered them "Potentially Dangerous" not based on anything they had done, but instead on where they were born."



In the years following the war, most Italians refused to speak about what happened to them. Even 80 years later, many chose to remain silent. Until now. For the first time on film, their stories are about to be heard and the truth revealed."

"Potentially Dangerous reveals what happened to Italians in America during WWII and examines the lasting effects of these events on our culture. This story has modern-day implications about issues like immigration and justice, and it can help us learn to treat others with empathy and understanding."

"This is an important and often-

times overlooked era," said Russo Brothers Italian American Film Forum Grant co-founder, Joe Russo.

"Potentially Dangerous is a critically important film shining light on a story that was nearly lost to the ephemera of history," added Turturro. "As an Italian American, I'm honored to help bring this film to a wide audience that will discover how the pertinent issues it raises are still applicable today."
