

OUR REVITALIZING PROGRAM HAS BEGUN

Our humble beginnings . . .

As many read this article, you will personally remember when the Italian American Heritage Foundation was founded as an organization in 1976. Throughout the next eight or nine years, the IAHF was able to raise large sums of money to purchase our current property at 425 North Fourth Street. Since then, we have held countless events spanning almost four decades celebrating our Italian history and culture. The heartbeat of the IAHF.

Our realistic present . . .

As the pandemic is (hopefully) in our rearview mirror, the Board of Directors and all our wonderful volunteers at the IAHF are doing everything in our power to bring back our celebrated events and striving to create new events. There seems to be an excited spirit amongst our members as I'm able to speak with them at our events that we've held so far. I also hear of positive reports from other members, both Board and membership, about the joy of meeting back in person and enjoying each other's company.

All the while, our building needs major improvements. The BOD has met and is in discussion about the improvements we need for our building. Some of those improvements are as follows: new HVAC, new flooring, new roof, electrical upgrade, ADA restroom compliance and a new canopy, just to name a few. I have been scheduling vendors to come in and look at the various items on our list of capital improvements to get ballpark quotes. When the HVAC contractor came and looked at the units up on the roof, the first words out of his mouth were "It's a miracle your HVAC has lasted this long." Being able to do all of these things will improve our building and secure it for future generations to come. Just as countless others have done so for us back in the 70s and 80s.

Our hopeful future . . .

Now I turn to our current membership and ask everyone to consider what you can do to support our revitalization fund, not only now but in the future! I'd like to start a revitalization fund campaign so we can move ahead on our capital improvement projects. I am looking for at least 100 people to join with me and commit to give \$100 over the next 12 months or a one-time gift of \$1,200 for the next year. There may be some members who can give much more than this and there may be some members who can give maybe \$25 or \$50 a month. This revitalization fund campaign will be called The President's Club and our sole purpose will be to raise funds so the future generations to come will enjoy this building just as you and I have enjoyed it all these many years.



The Italian American Heritage Foundation (IAHF) is pleased to announce the continuation of its scholarship program. Scholarships are available to 2023 graduates of Italian descent or the child or grandchild of a current IAHF member in good standing. These scholarships are targeted toward students enrolled in high school, community college, undergraduate or graduate studies students planning to attend an institution of higher learning, including vocational school.

Three types of scholarships are available: merit-based, need-based, and Il Cenacolo to students in all disciplines and majors. These scholarships are focused on helping Italian Americans expand their educational goals. A commitment to a major or minor in Italian Studies will receive greater consideration but is not required.

Applicants will be asked to reflect on their future goals, and how their heritage has played a role in their decisions. They will be asked to share their vision of how receiving this award will assist with the applicant's academic and career goals.

The IAHF website is at https://www.iahfsj.org/scholarships and provides information about the specific criteria, instructions, and required documents. The site also includes the online Google Forms Application.

2022 IAHF PATRONS' DINNER



Among the hustle and bustle of the holidays, we at the IAHF were able to make a bit of time to just share an intimate lunch for about 90 people. The Festa di Natale lunch was truly a home for the holiday get-together with both old and new friends.

The activities included a special lunch, door prizes, and a video showing Christmas in Italy, created by our video guru, Dave Perzinski. In addition "hot off the press" at the luncheon, the Honorary Vice Consul of Italy in the South Bay, and former president of the IAHF, Sal Caruso presented to the IAHF and its president Dana Zuccarello, a resolution from the City of San Jose, proclaiming in 2023, the month of October, Italian Heritage Month! This was a welcome surprise and a fitting forum to share this wonderful gift of heritage. Kudos to Sal for all his work in securing the resolution; a true gift of heritage. In addition, we at the IAHF were able to collect food and toys to be distributed to local charities for the holidays.

The lunch, itself included a Sicilian-style green salad with finocchio and orange slices, appetizers, a hearty classic Italian wedding soup, and a fillet of pork roast with green beans, with cannoli and torrone for dessert. A short comment about the "wedding soup". The Italian term "minestra maritata", literally translated into English is "wedding soup"; however, in Italian culinary jargon, it refers to a marriage or blending of green herbs in a rich "minestra" or broth, and not to a soup served at a wedding. It is one of those dishes that is universally popular in Italy, but naturally, each region has its

own preferences and styles, but the common denominator is the use or "marriage " of greens in the soup. For our lunch, we used spinach, and small homemade meatballs, some with chicken and some mixed with beef. Regardless of your preference, it's one of those dishes that is very healthy and packs a vitamin wallop! We may consider doing a class in its prep when we resume our cooking classes in 2023.

Generally speaking, all our lunches use primarily fresh ingredients. These menus may seem deceptively simple but each dish required much prep time, and about 2 days' worth of work not to mention collecting all the correct ingredients. The holiday lunch was in essence a labor of love, and joining us in this love fest were Joe Lucito, Christi Gilcrest, Nora Monette, Rebecca Morici, Sandi Strouse, Stanley Olivar, Lucia Clementi, Dave Perzinski, Nanci Wilborn, and yours truly. (taking a short break, but also to be acknowledged was Kay Virgilio). As we go into 2023, we want to wish you a wonderful 2023, Also I want to welcome you to join our culinary team or if you have a favorite dish from a region you wish to share at the regional lunches, contact me at the IAHF. What makes the lunches so unique is their grass root focus. We try to present the amazingly diverse cuisine of Italy, and the food we grew up with, which can be quite different from the normal restaurant fare.

SOCCER'S WORLD CUP 2022

If the World Cup final games weren't exciting enough, Lionel Messi is now considered one of the sport's greatest players. That position was solidified with Argentina's win over France in a penalty play shoot-out. The game itself will be replayed and reviewed for many years to come. It's a game of legends. Messi is a citizen of Argentina, Spain, and Italy. Part of his family has roots in the Marche region of Italy. In truth, what a game for both France and Argentina. They fielded amazing teams. I happened to be in Florence when Italy won the world cup and it was an unforgettable and unbelievable experience, so I can only imagine what happened in Buenos Aires, and all of Argentina that week. If you happen to glance at Argentina's national team roster, it is a timely reminder that the Italian American immigrant experience impacted both North and South America. Likewise, many of our IAHF members have roots not just in the boot, but in the Rio de la Plata, too. Brooklyn's a huge borough of New York, and Bensonhurst is one of its many unique neighborhoods. When my boyfriend and I booked a night at the Holiday Inn in NYC, we used the Express Jamaica-JFK Train to get into Manhattan without a car.

I struggled to find the best subways to take because the NYC subway system makes BART's coverage area look like a quaint hamlet. Luckily, good of Google Maps told us which lines to take to get to the destination. We walked a half mile to the Jamaica stop to get on the Long Island Railway to go west. Then at one stop we had to change trains to catch the N-line subway. We walked up and down stairs about 4 times for this transfer. When we got off at 18th Street we still needed to walk several blocks to get to our destination.

Villabate Alba is a bakery I followed on Facebook and Instagram for a couple years. I had to trek through several feet of snow to get to this place. I bought \$111.00 worth of mini pastries and cookies, and my boyfriend helped me out by taking the photos.

They serve Cassata cakes wrapped in a thick green marzipan with a cherry or sugar fruit in the middle. They had big ones and small ones. These are cakes you will NOT find in the entire Bay Area. I purchased 5 of the mini ones.

Next, were lovely dark chocolate covered mousse like cakes with a mouse face decorating on top. Sfogliateli are lobster cream rolls, and lots of cannoli (which are not in the photos) have a maraschino cherry or another candied fruit at each end.

Villabate Alba's delicacies include mini tiramisu, huge marzipan frutta martorana, Neopolitan biscotti, orange almond flavored cookies, Linzer tarts, pignoli, pistachio and raspberry flavored almond cookies, rainbow cookies, Rococo, jam filled vanilla sandwich cookies, chocolate dipped butter cookies, almond flavored cookie white chocolate dipped, amaretti, cuccidati, and many more!

I carried a bag of big boxes on two trains back to the hotel. These pastries went through JFK's TSA security checks and then sat on the floor of the plane guarded by my feet.

Call me crazy but you cannot order these to be shipped 3000 miles away. I was crazy enough to give these unique pastries one hell of a trip. Some ended up in my fridge, and others at my work break room. My coworkers claimed they never tasted such cookies in their lives. Treats like this can only be found in the New York Tri-state area.














Powers and Thrones

by Dan Jones ~

Power and Thrones by noted historian Dan Jones, a Fellow of the Royal Historical Society, is non-fiction at its finest. Author Jones has a remarkable talent for engaging lay readers in the heavy, complex topic of a thousand years of Middle Ages and yet he makes it enjoyable and compelling.

As the title indicates, the book does

not involve itself with the mundane realities of daily medieval life such as women's rights, spousal abuse, slavery, public education and general welfare. Instead, we travel through the great power epochs which drove Europe to the Renaissance and ultimately gave us the western Europe we know today.

Especially enjoyable was Mr. Jones' writing technique of avoiding straight chronology. We don't just start at the fall of Rome in 476 and end with Martin Luther in 1517. Instead, the book is divided

into four parts: Imperium, Dominion, Rebirth and Revolution. Then each part has four chapters. For example, Imperium's chapters are Romans, Barbarians, Byzantines and Arabs. Each chapter reaches into the origins of the topic and brings it forward to the subject era. It's fascinating to see how all the cultures intertwine. In his authoritative style, Mr. Jones makes it clear that we cannot understand one cultural development without knowledge of the other. The Middle East, the Far East, North Africa and Europe are historically melded. The conflicts and cultural exchanges are ancient.

Rome did indeed fall and with it its imperial rule. But wait, did it? Author Jones deftly brings us through the rise of Rome as a universal authority figure through the Popes. The author unapologetically explains choices made by Rome which drastically altered the course of European history throughout the entire Middle Ages, 1,000 years. We see the influence of Rome via the Pope appear in most all chapters, and it is sometimes disturbing.

Of particular interest is the melding of severe well-documented climate disturbances with major population movements. Huge migrations causing urban chaos is nothing new. The sweep of several massive bubonic plagues of course is also a major player.

The book is sprinkled with asterisks which lead the reader to a footnote - tying the medieval event to current events. So they are food for thought. Particularly entertaining was the medieval doomed couple Abelard and Heloise. They named their son Astrolab and the asterisk cites Elon Musk naming his son XAE A-Xii. Too much!

This book is heavily researched with a bibliography and footnotes filling 42 pages. If you are a history buff, **Powers and Thrones** will not disappoint! *

In Italy on January 6th, the Feast of the Epiphany is celebrated and is a national holiday. This day commemorates the presentations of the infant Jesus to the Magi or Three Wise Men.

This day is also known as "La Befana" and is solely an Italian tradition. The legend goes that on their way to visit the infant Jesus, the Magi encountered Befana, who was in front of her home with a broom in her hand, sweeping. They asked her for directions and invited the old woman to accompany them. She declined because she had a lot of housework to do. As soon as they left, she regretted her decision and started her journey to find the baby Jesus with a bundle of presents for him. Sadly, Befana never found the baby Jesus, so she gave the gifts to other children.

To this day, she travels on her broomstick every Epiphany Eve looking for the manger and giving presents to Italian children who leave out a shoe or hang up their stockings. It is also said that before she leaves the house, she will sweep the floor, sweeping away last year's worries.

As with any other Holiday, the tradition is to celebrate with food. In Italy, one of the sweet delicacies served on this day is La Befana Cake. This is a cake made with a large bean inside. Whoever finds the bean has good luck for the year. There are many recipes for La Befana Cake...here's one that I found to share with you.

La Befana Cake Recipe

Ingredients:

- 1 1/4 cups raisins
- 1/2 cup diced, candied lemon peel
- 1/2 cup diced, candied orange peel
- 1/4 cup brandy (optional)
- 1 Tablespoon active dry yeast
- 1/2 cup warm (110-115F) water
- 5 cups plus 2 tbs Unbleached, All-Purpose Flour
- 1/2 cup sugar
- 1/2 tsp salt
- 1 tbs grated lemon zest
- 8 tbs (stick) unsalted butter cut into pieces, softened
- 2 large eggs
- 1/2 cup warm milk
- 1/2 cup chopped almonds

- 1 dried fava or other large bean
- 1 egg yolk
- 2 tbs turbinado (coarse brown) sugar

Directions:

- 1. Put raisins in bowl, cover with warm water and let aside to plump.
- 2. In a bowl, mix the citrus peels with the brandy and set aside. If not using brandy, use hot water.
- 3. In a medium bowl dissolve the yeast in warm water. Add one cup of the flour and mix until a ball of dough is formed. Fill a large bowl 2/3 full with warm water. Place the ball of dough in the water, cover with bowl with plastic wrap and let the "sponge" rise in a warm place until doubled, about 20 minutes.
- 4. In a food processor, combine 4 cups of the flour, sugar, salt and lemon zest. Add the butter, eggs, and milk and process to a slightly stiff dough. With a slotted spoon, scoop the risen sponge from the water and add it to the dough. Process until thoroughly incorporated into the dough. If the dough seems too stiff, add a little tepid water.
- 5. Turn the dough out onto a lightly floured surface and knead for a few minutes. Butter a large bowl, place the dough in the bowl, and turn to coat. Cover with plastic wrap, then a towel, and let rise in a warm spot for one hour or until doubled in size.
- 6. Butter a 10 by 3 1/2 inch round cake pan, ceramic pan or tube pan. Dust with flour and shake out excess. Drain the raisins, pat dry with paper towels and toss with one tablespoon of the flour. Drain the candied citrus peels, reserving the brandy. Toss the peels with the remaining 1 tablespoon of flour.
- 7. Punch down the dough. Turn the dough out onto a floured surface. With your hands, work the raisins, candied peels, almonds, and dried bean into the dough, and knead until you have a uniform ball of dough. It should feel slightly tacky.
- 8. Place the dough in the pan, cover with a towel and let rise in a warm place for one hour, or until doubled in size.
- 9. Preheat the oven to 350F. In a small bowl, beat the egg yolk and reserved brandy together. Brush the top of the cake with this mixture and sprinkle with the coarse sugar.
- 10. Bake for 45 minutes, or until nicely browned. Let the cake cool for 10 minutes in the pan. Carefully run a knife around the sides of the pan to loosen the cake and turn the cake out onto a cooling rack to cool completely. To serve, cut into wedges.
- 11. Note: To freeze, wrap the cake well in aluminum foil. Freeze for up to a month.

La Befana vien di notte con le scarpe tutte rotte, col vestito alla romana viva viva La Befana!

Growing up I recall anxiously awaiting with excitement the arrival of La Befana on the eve of January 5th. For my family, the event was all about the religious "Festa dell'Epifania", on January 6th marking the symbolic day when the three kings or wise men, who after traveling from faraway lands, followed the star of Bethlehem, leaving gifts of gold, frankincense, and myrrh for the newborn Christ Child.

According to a popular legend, Befana is known as "the Christmas witch" because she is

dressed "in the Roman custom" (col vestito alla Romana), wrapped in a dark shawl with layers of chimney soot, a handkerchief on her head, and rides around on a brook. She is depicted as an elderly grandmotherly woman who resembles a kindly witch and brings gifts to good little children throughout Italy on Epiphany Eve.

Children are told that she will give them a swift thump from her broomstick if they try to see her when she arrives, but the tradition could just be to keep kids in their beds. To this day Befana is



still searching for the newborn Christ and, on her quest, she leaves treats such as toys and candy or fruit for well-behaved children. Naughty children get chunks of coal, onions, or garlic. Families leave her a glass of wine and a bit of their traditional local food to refuel her for the rest of her journey. So, the message here is that Santa gets fat from cookies left for him while Befana drunkenly rides her broom from house to house leaving candy.

It's also said that Befana sweeps the floor of a home before she

departs, a symbolic gesture for clearing out the old just as the new year is dawning.

Many cities in Italy hold celebrations in her name. The biggest La Befana festival takes place in Urbania, her traditional home. Here is a Befana regatta in her honor in Venice. This is a race between old owners of the oldest rowing Association in the City who challenge each other and dress as Befana.
