IAHF 2024 Scholarships

The Italian American Heritage Foundation (IAHF) announces the continuation of our scholarship program for the 2024 academic year! Our program was established in 1982 and is closely aligned with our organization's mission and goals. Since its inception, we have awarded hundreds of thousands of dollars to qualified students. Multiple awards are given and generally range from \$500 to \$2,500.

IAHF awards merit-based and opportunity-based scholarships to qualified high school seniors, community college students, and upper-division undergraduate or graduate students of Italian descent who are accepted to an accredited institution of higher education, including vocational school. All disciplines and majors are eligible.

The II Cenacolo scholarship (administered by the IAHF) is awarded to upper-division undergraduate or graduate-level students actively pursuing graduate studies in Italian arts and culture currently enrolled at these universities: San Jose State University, San Francisco State University, Stanford University, Santa Clara University, or the University of California at Berkeley. Applicants must demonstrate that they have been accepted to a graduate-level institution

<u>Random</u> <u>Acts of</u> Pizza

Yes, you read that right.

We've all heard of Random Acts of Kindness, right? Wikipedia defines Random Acts of Kindness as

"a non-premeditated, inconsistent action designed to offer kindness towards the outside world." Well at <u>Tony & Alba's Pizza and Pasta</u>, Al Vallorz has taken the phrase Random Acts of Kindness and has modified it to have an Italian flare: Random Acts of Pizza or RAP for short.

What are Random Acts of Pizza, you may ask? A simple \$10 donation will buy a RAP certificate that provides a needy family with children a dinner of pizza, salads, desserts, and drinks. Tony & Alba's make up the monetary difference for this meal. These certificates are distributed to local schools, churches, and food banks. Many struggling families can't afford the opportunity to take their kids out to dinner. The RAP program helps with that! Diana Vallorz says, "we give the family extra service and attention to make it special for the kids!" When they started the program approximately 10 years ago, they found that the RAP certificates were being sold or given away to others and that wasn't the intention. The children must be in attendance to redeem the certificates.

During this past holiday season, 300 RAP certificates were purchased. How does one donate towards these RAP certificates? I'm glad you asked! You can always head on into Tony & Alba's and buy these certificates in person, you could drop a check in the mail made payable to Tony & Alba's and now a Venmo account has been created for those of you who are all digital: @tonyalbapizza. Al wants everyone to know that RAP isn't just during the holidays but is an everyday occurrence. Some families need help all year long. The more RAP certificates that are purchased, the more families are helped throughout the year.

Tony & Alba's outreach doesn't stop there. Two years ago, Al started "Socktoberfest." For every pizza sold, he donated a pair of socks for the homeless. This past year, Al rallied support from two additional Bay Area restaurants: Sorelle Italian Bistro in Campbell and Mio Vicino in Santa

Clara. Collectively, all three restaurants were able to collect 2300 pairs of socks that were delivered to the farm workers in Salinas!

The generosity of Tony & Alba's goes even further. This past Christmas, Al set up a Dept. 56 Christmas village and his Polar Express train set complete with a train control. For a \$10 donation to benefit St. Jude's, families with children sat at the table where this was set up and they could control the trains throughout the village. When other patrons came in and saw the village and saw that St. Jude's was the benefactor, they generously donated money not needing to sit at the table. A whopping \$1000 was raised for St. Jude's!

Some of you will remember during the pandemic, Tony & Alba's was one of the featured stories in the March 2020 edition of People Magazine. Al and Diana's concerns were with the elderly people living alone with no nearby family to assist. They offered to deliver a free medium pizza to those who were over 70, shut in by themselves. When news got around, additional donations came in allowing them to include a salad with their pizza. And last, but certainly not least, if you've had the opportunity to dine at Tony & Alba's, you'll notice a sign at the register that very kindly states that if you need something to eat and cannot afford it, you will receive a slice of pizza and a drink paid for by the community fund. Both Al and Diana mentioned that the original owners, Tony and Alba, would often give to those who were hungry, not just here at this restaurant, but their other restaurants in Capitola and Mountain View. Al mentioned his father-in-law often said, "give because you don't know when they might help you one day." That's a good reminder for us every day. Tony & Alba's offer various fundraisers for schools and other groups.

If it's been a while since you've had a night out, consider stopping by Tony & Alba's for a pizza or some pasta and while you're at it, buy a RAP certificate. You'll not only have a great meal, you'll go away knowing you were able to feed a needy family!

When leaving Tony & Alba's, Al will send you off with his special farewell, "Have a slice day!"

Our first class of the year builds upon St. Joseph Day culinary traditions. Books have been written about the diversity and uniqueness of St. Joseph Day fare. For one thing, La Festa di San Giuseppe falls during Lent so it is basically a vegetarian meal. Historically and traditionally, the Lenten fare is meatless and, in truth, beats out the current vegetarian fad by about 2000 years!



Saying that, the complexities of each dish served are quite amazing. Our cooking class will concentrate on just one specialty item, "Pupa con L'uova," which literally translated means "doll with an egg." The class will be taught by Josie Taddeo, a master baker, with a backup support staff to help her out with the class logistics. The participants will be making a decorated small Easter bread with a symbolic egg in the center. It is a specialty bread associated with Easter, Lent and the St. Joseph Day Altar. In fact, you may have seen them on our previous St. Joseph's Day tables in individual sizes or as braided bread loaves. Either way, they are scrumptious!

La Regina of the 2024 Pasadena Tournament of Roses Parade

The annual Rose Parade held in Pasadena at the start of each year is a tradition that goes back more than 135 years. A special part of that tradition is that a Rose Queen along with a court of princesses are selected as the Tournament of Roses Royal Court, who serve as local ambassadors to the community before appearing in the Rose Parade itself. These young women represent the diversity of the backgrounds and cultures of the extended Pasadena community. No Rose Queen has been of Italian descent - until now.

Naomi Stillitano, the 2024 Rose Queen, was born and raised, until age 7, in Cosenza, Calabria after which time her parents, Piero and Nerida, moved to Arcadia, California along with her brothers, Toraino and Taaj. Of course, growing up in Italy, Naomi had no idea what the Rose Parade was. On moving to Arcadia, which is very close to Pasadena, Naomi saw the Royal Court float in the parade and thought someday that would be her on the float. And remarkably, only 10 years since Naomi arrived in the United States, she is the youngest Rose Queen, now at the age of 17, in addition to being the first Italian to have attained this honor.

Naomi is very active in her community. She is currently the Co-President of the local Italian Culture Club. She is a young lady of many talents, She still has strong ties to Cosenza as her grandmother lives there along with friends, and she is looking forward to visiting soon. Among Naomi's possible future plans are studying fash-

More Donations - Fiction


So many quality books have been received that they can't all be listed in one article. This month I am highlighting some of the newly arrived fiction.

Secrets In Translation - Margo Sorenson

A quick read, the book tells the story of 16-year-old Alessandra. She is returning to Italy to babysit a rebellious 12-year-old. Set in Positano, this easy-to-read book is an "...armchair excursion to the romantic heart of southern Italy!"

Queen of Secrets - E.J. Tanda

Written by a local author, the book tells of Violetta Giordano, whose family has close ties with the Mafia. In love with one man, she is forced to marry one of the most notorious crime bosses in



the country. She adapts to her life as a "Mafia Queen" as she learns the rules of survival.

<u>Under the Light of the Italian</u> <u>Moon</u> - Jennifer Anton

Nina Argenta is the daughter of a strong-willed midwife and finds herself torn between the desire to move to America to be with the man she loves and her promise to her mother to never leave Italy. The story plays out against the rising tide of fascism and the chaos of World War II. Gripping historical fiction based on a true story.

A Hidden Sicilian History (Second Edition) - Ettore Grillo

Another historical novel, this one set in Enna, Sicily. A young researcher finds an ancient scroll that has fallen from the shelves onto the floor. As he begins to translate this lost manuscript, historical facts flow freely, illuminating the details of life long ago.

Suffer the Little Children - Donna Leon

Comissario Guido Brunetti investigates violent crimes and murder from his home base in Venice. We have several books in this series and this latest acquisition tells the story of a doctor whose 18-month-old son is kidnapped in a violent home attack. The San Francisco Chronicle reviewed the book, calling it "terrific at providing, through its rare but engaging protagonist, a strong sense of the moral quandaries inherent in Italian society and culture."

My Brilliant Friend and The Story of a New Name - both by Elena Ferrante

We now have the first two books in the series, also known as "the Neapolitan novels," which have been highly praised. The first, My Brilliant Friend, was made into a movie for TV. The books begin when Elena and Lila meet at six years of age. The books chronicle their close bond as they navigate the challenges of life.

PIEDMONTE REGIONAL LUNCHEON

HIGHLIGHTING THE GEMELLO WINERY OF MOUNTAIN VIEW

Save Tuesday, February 15, for our first Regional Lunch of the year. The menu will be posted online shortly.

An exciting addition to the lunch will be a talk by Kevin Ferguson, author, and historian from North Santa Clara County. His great-grandfather founded the Gemello Winery in Mountain View with plantings along the Montebello Ridge located in the Western part of Santa Clara County in the hills above Cupertino. Ridge Winery and Picchetti Winery are still in operation along the Ridge among other smaller wineries. The Gemello Winery was a local Mountain View community institution and thrived from 1934 to 1990. Some of our "old timers" may recall the Winery and the Gemello Family. Kevin's great-grandfather, John Gemello, emigrated from Piedmont and was an early regional vintner along with his son, Mario.

It is hard to imagine northern Santa Clara County as an agricultural hub with the current Silicon Valley transformation that occurred with ample "cement" that has tragically covered up one of the earth's greatest agricultural zones.

Kevin, a journalist, wrote a book about the winery, the times with a fascinating glimpse into old Mountain

View. The book is called Rain on the Montebello Ridge--a Memoir about Health, Aging and Winemaking. More nformation about the book can be secured from Kevin's newsletters at https://gemello.substack.com. Kevin will present after lunch followed by questions and answers; the book will be available for sale.

There is an interesting sideline story on how this event unfolded. IAHF member and former Scholarship Chair, Chris Hudson, attended a lecture about the book and became acquainted with Kevin. Chris is a Mountain View resident and fondly recalled the Winery, which was considered a meeting place in the neighborhood since it also sold produce and groceries, taking on a "village feel." Chris also presented at the Festa last year a self-published book about her mother, Mary Reginato Hudson, and her tales of growing up in Shasta County. The book is called Paintings of Mama and Papa. Chris is also cousin to Board member Nanci Wilborn.

You never know how the dots are connected, especially when you attend some of the IAHF activities. This lunch should prove to be another part of our celebration of heritage and a glimpse into the richness that was the Valley of Hearts Delight.


