The St. Joseph's Altar is Sicilian in origin. During a terrible famine, the people of Sicily prayed to St. Joseph, their patron saint, for relief. St. Joseph answered their prayers, and the famine ended. In gratitude, the farmers honored St. Joseph by filling an altar with their most prized possession, food.

Present day Italian families have for many decades celebrated St. Joseph's Day during Lent on March 19th, both in their homes and at the Italian American Heritage Foundation where there is a beautiful and bountiful altar, a Catholic Mass, and a meatless dinner, followed by more desserts than one would have ever imagined they would see at one meal.

In the tradition of sharing with the poor and hungry, this celebration is free to all who come through the door. Each person is given a "take home bag" containing a prayer card to St. Joseph, an orange, a bread item, and three fava beans which symbolize the Holy Trinity. The fava beans are often kept on a kitchen cabinet shelf and considered representative of good luck.

Lunch will include Pasta Milanese or Marinara, frittata, orange salad, and many more traditional dishes prepared entirely by volunteers. Dessert will feature homemade Italian pastries such as cakes, cookies, biscotti, cuccidati, and much, much more. Join us for this Lenten (no meat dishes served) culinary treat!

Parking will be available on the street.

Spotlight on Felix and Marie Dalldorf

It's a pleasure to highlight exemplary IAHF members Felix and Marie Rose Dalldorf. I was honored to serve with these fellow Commissioners on Santa Clara County's Florence Commission for several years. This is an entity that promotes interaction between Santa Clara County and our sister county, the Metropolitan City of Florence, Italy. I was impressed with their thoughtful and thorough contributions to the commission. I quickly recognized what an asset they would be to our organization and invited them to join the IAHF. Felix applied and was accepted to the IAHF Board of Directors. At the same time, Marie Rose volunteered to be the IAHF Board corporate secretary. Two family members cannot serve together on the Board; since the secretary need not



be a Board member this was a perfect fit. The IAHF was rewarded with a dynamic and proactive couple.

Felix is an all-American boy, born in Pocatello, Idaho. He moved to California at the age of 9 and attended Wilcox High School in Santa Clara and San Jose State University. His deep love and understanding of Italy's culture, history, and food began when he met and married Marie Rose.

You may remember the entertaining articles Felix published in his President's newsletter about his experiences in Italy. After serving on the Board, he was elected and served three years as IAHF President at the beginning of COVID-19, a challenging time. We were rewarded by Felix's fiscally sound decisions and his keen ability to reduce expenses and obtain funding when we had no income from hall rental. In fact, Felix raised over \$300,000 in grants and services during his tenure as an IAHF officer! We also appreciate his success in creating on-line events so the foundation could move forward through the pandemic.

On the fun side, Felix and Marie Rose were also successful in bringing the Millenium Sounds Orchestra to the IAHF for several dance events, and a notable New Year's Eve party where they organized, prepared, and served a prime rib meal for over 200 attendees. We need to do that again!

Felix also recruited and worked with dozens of intern students from the San Jose Works program. They helped improve the IAHF website, graphics, events, and programs. The IAHF was recognized by Mayor, Sam Liccardo for the IAHF exceptional involvement with San Jose Works interns.

Felix and Marie Rose are La Dolce Vita members of the IAHF and are still active commissioners on the Florence Commission.

Marie Rose Pierano comes to us from the magnificent Italian Riviera in the region of Liguria, Italy, an area of exceptional beauty and delicious gastronomy. Her family immigrated to California when she was six years old. She immediately started the first grade not knowing a word of English. She arrived in a new country without the ability to read or write, not only in English but also in her native language. As a result, she was greeted with teasing, social isolation, and bullying from her classmates. This first experience of America is something that certainly contributed to Marie Rose's strength of character.



Over the years Marie Rose never lost sight of her Italian heritage and culture. The Genovese dishes she learned from her mother, traditions such as ravioli at holidays, and the importance of family are part of who she is. Every visit back to visit family in Liguria is a familiar embrace. Her Italian heritage is a proud part of her identity, and volunteering with Italian organizations has been a way to honor her roots. Marie Rose continues to spread Italian culture by offering online Italian classes two evenings a week. These classes quickly became popular and now include individuals from several states throughout the US, including Canada, Japan, and Mexico.

Marie Rose has served the IAHF well beyond her role as IAHF secretary. Her contribution when updating our by-laws was tedious and particularly appreciated. She also initiated a Wellness call to our members during COVID to check on them and provide help if needed. Most importantly, Marie Rose has chaired the Scholarship Committee for over nine years and brought the entire application process online and into the 21st century. This allows the scholarship committee members to more easily participate via online meetings rather than attending evening meetings downtown. For applicants, the online process is more convenient, providing greater accessibility, increasing our reach, and reducing the costs and delays of mailing documents. Last year, 19,000 was awarded to nine worthy students!

Marie Rose additionally helps he younger generation by co-chairing the "La Zona di Ragazze e Ragazzi" kids' area at the annual Italian Family Festa. In 2021 Marie Rose was honored and featured in the Italifornian, the online Almanac of the history of Italians of California, as one of the women celebrated for contributions to the local Italian community.

Beyond the IAHF and the Florence Commission, Felix and Marie Rose have busy lives. Felix is a successful businessman still working full time as a Sr. Computer Systems Architect at Northrup Grumman for the past 41 years. He graduated from SJSU with a dual major in Marketing and Computer Sciences. Marie Rose graduated from SJSU with a master's in education and two teaching credentials. She taught business at Foothill College and was the Director of Education at a private Medical, Nursing, and Dental college. She was also part of an evaluation team for two national accreditation agencies (the Accrediting Bureau of Health Education Schools (ABHES) and the Association of Independent Colleges and Schools (AICS). During the ten years on these committees, she participated in more than 160 site visits to schools in the western US. During the same time, she worked at AIR, a non-profit organization as a Senior Research Scientist and retired after 38 years.

Felix and Marie Rose celebrated their 40th anniversary and both are dedicated parents. They raised two sons, Joseph Pierre and Johnathan Lawrence who both attended SJSU and graduated in 2014 and 2016. During their senior year at SJSU, each was selected to attend a six-week internship in Hong Kong at Crown Worldwide. They are both currently working at Applied Materials. Joseph is a Software Engineer and Jonhathan is a Financial Analyst. Both sons live in downtown San Jose.

Robust family get-togethers include Marie's extended Ligurian family and, thanks to the wood-burning pizza oven Felix insisted was needed in the backyard, the culture and comradery of family and friends are well preserved.

The IAHF is thankful for their hard work, contributions, leadership dedication, and passion. Felix's ability to secure grant money during his tenure's most challenging tims helped position the organization for the future. Marie will be continuing her work as scholarship chair, so please consider volunteering or setting up a named scholarship!

# IAHF and II Cenacolo Scholarships are now closed, as we prepare to honor winners

The deadline for applicants to submit their scholarship applications was February 21, 2025. Fourteen applications were received.

Scholarships help ease the financial burden of educational expenses, allowing students to focus on their studies and personal growth. They are designed to support students of Italian descent who excel academically and demonstrate leadership. It encourages them to stay connected and take pride in their Italian heritage.

Beyond financial assistance, scholarships offer recipients recognition within the Italian American community, networking opportunities, and a connection to their cultural roots. Past recipients have credited these scholarships and highlighted them as important on their academic journey.

The Scholarship Committee will convene and begin a comprehensive review process to carefully evaluate and score applications ensuring a fair and unbiased evaluation. Top candidates will be selected, final decisions will be made through collaborative discussions, and recipients will be chosen based on merit and eligibility. The committee will inform applicants of the committee's decision by the end of March.

Scholarship recipients will be officially announced in the April IAHF newsletter. The scholarship awards ceremony luncheon on May 4th at the IAHF Hall in San Jose will celebrate their academic excellence, dedication, accomplishments, and the rich heritage of the Italian community.



MISSION CHAMBER ORCHESTRA PROGRAM A CELEBRATION OF HERITAGE

Sunday, February 2nd was the date for a very special celebration of Italian and Italian American Heritage. The IAHF hosted the Mission Chamber Orchestra at the Foundation for the third year, in an all Italian and Italian American theme program.

Included in this program is a special piece in honor of North Beach Native, musician and composer Vince Guaraldi. I was indebted to Chicago Author, Bill Dal Cerro (Bebop, Jazz and Bella Musica) for pointing out that 2025 will be the 60th anniversary of A Charlie Brown Christmas. The IAHF Concert will be a timely venue to recognize this important Italian American artist. In fact, it really is a long overdue recognition of his contribution to not only Jazz but American music in general. We now want to set our sights for promoting a star in his memory, in the newly formed Star Walk that is going up in North Beach. More updates as those efforts unfold.

Our program was part of a special community outreach program that was set up about 3 years ago by IAHF member and Orchestral Director, Emily Ray. This year there was a transition to a new music director Maestro Juan Palacios. Juan is the product of an amazing classical music tradition in Venezuela, called "*La Sistema*". We welcomed Juan to the IAHF with a Coffee and Biscotti Reception. The program was especially designed to offer a wide sampling of "music from the boot!"

The program started with an operatic piece by Gioachino Rossini, Overture to L'italiana in Algeri. This was pure and joyful Rossini at his most dazzling, followed by part of the modern classical repertoire with Ottorino Respighi 's Ancient Airs and Dances, Suite no. 3. The first half of the program ended in a spectacular piece of virtuosity by oboist Robert Scott, preforming Alessandro Marcello's Oboe Concerto in D minor.

The second half of the program began with a contemporary selection from LA resident, Jeremy Cavaterra and his composition, "Lost Coast", which was basically an engaging musical tone poem of images from a lost coast. Followed by the Vince Guaraldi, arr. Moore, *A Charlie Brown Christmas*, which was a stirring reminder of how both Jazz and classical music compositions truly merge in artistry and scope of sounds.

The program concluded with a surprise classical piece from Operatic composer Gaetano Donizetti's Sinfonia for Winds and the Overture to II matrimonio segreto by Domenico Cimarosa. Which led me to wonder why this piece is not done much? Surely the operatic powers that be can forsake just one performance from the standard repertoire in favor of these lesser accessed selections. A constant wonder, of mine.

The reception was also indebted to Nora Monette and Maria Bandy for the homemade baked goods. Likewise, the event afforded everyone time to meet the musicians, Juan Palacios and just enjoy the musical vibes.

Speaking of which, one of our IAHF members Mary Moreno's granddaughter was in the audience, and she is studying musical composition at UC Santa Cruz. She is currently working on a piece, so who knows perhaps it will be ready to perform in 2026!

JANUARY CENA FUORI AT BUCCA DI BEPPO

Wow, wow and WOW! Cena Fuori at Bucca di Beppo was really among the best of all time. Many of us arrived early to stroll a bit indoors because the walls of the restaurant are a feast to the eyes with framed portraits and pictures throughout every inch. We took time to enjoy the entertaining display.

The group was large tonight... 60 people! We filled two rooms which are connected by a wide archway. The spectacular meal was served family style. The bread loaves were hot out of the oven and the table offered cruets of olive oil and balsamic vinegar as well as butter. Next, we were treated to two bowls of salad, one was dressed with apples and cranberries and gorgonzola, the second was a traditional Caesar. Portions were bottomless.

The pasta offerings were amazing. Again, we were offered two recipes, one was homemade ravioli, large and soft and filled with a creamy ricotta and topped with a light marinara sauce. The second was a rigatoni dish covered with a spicy tomato sauce and topped with dollops of burrata. These pasta dishes were really superb.

The meat dish was chicken ala marsala and topped with an ample amount of mushroom gravy. The portions were very large and the restaurant distributed take home boxes to everyone without asking. Many of us had a day off from cooking the next day!

Desert was again wonderful and a fitting end to a divine meal. The cannoli were small, the crunch was exquisite, and they were served on a plate scored with choco-

late sauce. The cheesecake was one of the best I ever tasted, with its hint of lemon. Coffee was served afterward and many sat and mingled for a while enjoying the friendly ambience of the surroundings and the staff. It was an extraordinary evening.














THE ARDEATINE CAVE MASSACRE MARCH 24, 1944, REMEMBERED

The Eternal City, Roma, holds many special sights and experiences. One of them for me was visiting the Ardeatine Caves. While it is hardly a tourist destination, it is still worth the effort to visit the monument on the outskirts of Roma, and pay respects to one of the many senseless atrocities of World War II, the reprisal massacre of over 335 people, many plucked from the streets of Roma by the Nazi's and Italian Fascist in reprisal for the raid and attack by a Partisan group on a Nazi patrol in the city.

Even today, as we approach the 81st anniversary of the massacre, I can still recall a visit to the caves. How I ended up visiting the caves, was an interesting IAHF story too. One of our former board members and Sister County Commissioner Corrado Russo, had lived through the German occupation of Rome, and recalled the event vividly, as probably many Romans did who lived through those terrible times. He periodically used to check out the same book in our IAHF Library about the "Fosse Ardeatine" so Corrado's recollections finally piqued my interest, and I read the book. Regretfully we do not have an oral history from Corrado to include in the IAHF's collection and highlights the significance of that project.

It truly harkened to a trying time for Roma, and colors many stories and tales of Nazi/Fascist occupation of Central and Northern Italy. As I talked to Corrado about those terrible times, I began to appreciate how the Italy of today emerged from the ashes of the war. He was quite emphatic in recalling the war years in Roma, and as time went on, I could not forget his stories, so one day talking to his wife Zina, a contact was made with Corrado's nephew in Roma, so on one of my last trips to Roma, met with him and we were able to drive to the outskirts of the city to visit this sacred monument. The 335 massacred victims were put into a final resting place in a mausoleum in one of the caves. The caves themselves have become an Italian National Monument, and even today holds sway over Roman consciousness, while at the same time remains a polarizing experience for many Italians especially of the far right.

While this article does little justice to the dynamics of the experience, checking out the book at the IAHF library or going online can give you some appreciation of the significance of the Fosse Ardeatine for many Italians.


Florence was born into the Barbano pioneer farming family of Campbell (more on that family later) and married George Sordello, a member of another large farming family.

The image accompanying this article is of a large painting of the Sordello buildings and drying yards, which today hangs in Florence's den.

#### Maria Cancilla Bandy

Next, we sat down with Maria Bandy to talk about the St. Joseph Tables as they were celebrated in her neighborhood by local families. Maria brought in dozens of photos that I have been hoping to digitize for over two years!

Vanessa worked the video camera while I asked Maria a few questions. And what a terrific interviewee! Maria has wonderful stories from her childhood. She made the point several times that "we all have stories to tell" and urges other people to pass on their own stories. A summary of her interview will be available shortly.



#### The Barbano Collection

Two and a half years ago, the IAHF received a call asking us if we were interested in a few boxes of memorabilia belonging to Josephine Barbano, who sang with the San Francisco Opera for over ten years.

I was thrilled to get the material, and what a treasure trove. It turns out that the Barbanos were one of the "pioneering farmer families" who settled in Campbell, and there is a good amount of newspaper articles supplementing the photos. But I couldn't find relatives who could help me connect the bits of information or identify the people in the photos.

Until now! By sheer luck, I found out that Vanessa's grandmother, Florence, was first cousin to Josephine and her

three sisters. We are planning to sit down and go through the photos to talk about her childhood with her cousins and the extended family. This collection is about to get some important context that will help us tell their story.

#### Other interviews

While using the video camera, the memory card became full. I removed it and found other oral videos that Ken Borelli has done. I am currently converting and uploading them for viewing, so stay tuned for more information on these. They include an interview with Mary Canepa Klevan about how the Italian internments of WWII affected her family and John Bargetto talking about the history of the Bargetto and Regan Vineyards.

Once again, our thanks to the Santa Clara County Historic Grants Program, who provided the funds for the camera.



tradition began in the medieval ages and endures to this day in Sicilian neighborhoods throughout the world.

Author Ruli speaks through Giovanni, a young boy, whose eyes and heart are opened while enduring the drought and ensuing famine that has beset the island. Through his encounter with a victim of dire poverty, young Giovanni grows from being a petulant and selfish child into being a warm-hearted and generous young man. Children will appreciate this beautiful transformation which is an underlying theme of the book.

After weeks of earnest prayer guided by the village priest, rainfall at last begins on the Feast of St. Joseph ending the disastrous drought. Young readers are comforted that the drought ends, and the village rejoices with the celebration of Mass giving thanks to God for answering their prayers. Now, Sicilians all over the world celebrate their gratitude to God for relieving the famine on March 19th, the feast of St. Joseph. The celebration includes a lavish table replete with delicious Sicilian specialties that always includes a bowl of fava beans in recognition of the important role the lowly but nutritious fava bean had in staving of starvation.

The language is simple enough for elementary school readers and little ones will love the full-page artwork in warm colors. The book is 10 by 14 inches and would make a lovely gift.



## Remarkable Connection Between Christopher Columbus and Walt Disney

Much notable effort has been dedicated to restoring and preserving the birthplace of Walt Disney in the Hermosa District of the city of Chicago. Many folks who are casual fans, may not realize that he was born in Chicago, Illinois.

And, with a bit of a stretch, it can be observed that Christopher Columbus, having sailed to the New World just over 400 years before Walt Disney's birth, had an impact on where he was born. It all starts with the celebration of Columbus' first voyage.

The World's Columbian Exposition, also known as the Chicago World's Fair, was a world's fair held in Chicago from May 5 to October 31, 1893, to celebrate the 400th anniversary of Christopher Columbus's arrival in the New World in 1492. The centerpiece of the Fair, held in Jackson Park, was a large water pool representing the voyage that Columbus took to the New World. The exposition was an influential social and cultural event and had a profound effect on American architecture, the arts, American industrial optimism, and Chicago's image.

Dedication ceremonies for the fair were held on October 21, 1892, the 400th anniversary of Columbus' Voyage, but the fairgrounds were not opened to the public until May 1, 1893. The fair continued until October 30, 1893. In addition to recognizing the 400th anniversary of the discovery of the New World, the fair showed the world that Chicago had risen from the ashes of the Great Chicago Fire, which had destroyed much of the city in 1871.

In the early 1890's, Elias Disney, Walt's father, needed employment, and construction workers were needed for the massive project to build the Columbian Exposition. So, Elias, his wife Flora and family moved to Chicago so that Elias could find employment as a construction worker for the Exposition. And Elias built the now famous and preserved house in Chicago where Walt was born. It should also be noted that Roy O. Disney, Walt's older brother and lifelong business partner, was also born in Chicago, in the year of the Exposition itself of 1893.

There you have it: Christopher Columbus' original voyage touching the life of Walt Disney 400 years later, although only to the extent of determining where Walt was born.


