Joe Gallegos reached his centenarian status on March 11, 2024. Joe's family is originally from Galicia, Spain. He was born in Alamosa, Colorado. There was also a stint in Albuquer-



que before the family moved to Milpitas where Joe resided for over 50 years until his recent move to Aptos.

Joe was a teacher for 60 years except for his service during World War II when he was based in England and France. He also spent time in Germany and Western Europe. As an educator, Joe developed his love for knowledge. His wife Louisa of almost 75 years was also an educator and, together, they taught well after retirement.

As a lifelong learner and educator, Joe's curiosity and drive to learn new skills led him to pursue learning Italian in his early 90's. Joe's first language was Spanish so he quickly picked up the language in Delia Schizzano's Italian classes. When Delia's in-person classes were no longer available during COVID, Joe did not want to give up learning Italian so he joined Marie Dalldorf's online Italian classes and has continued those classes for almost eight years. His classmates admire his spirit and drive to continue to pursue knowledge. Joe demonstrates that you are never too old to accomplish any goal when you set your mind to it. The smile on his face and the twinkle in his eyes tell it all.

His granddaughter, Kristen, and Joe traveled to Italy when he was in his early 90's. Kristen trea-



sures the time they spent together exploring Italy and their bond as she grew up next door to her grandparents.

Joe's 100th Birthday celebration was held on March 10 at Christ Community Church attended by many extended family and friends, traveling from various parts of the United States to be there. Several of Joe's Italian classmates, past and present, also attended the celebration to honor and congratulate him on his amazing milestone. There were many testimonials and well-wishes shared with a video of Joe and his family.

In a recent article in the Milpitas Post by Eric Shapiro, Joe was quoted as saying that he has "no regrets and has had a good life blessed with four kids, 12 grandkids and 16 great-grandkids." His granddaughter, Kristen, sums up her grandpa's worldview as "living a life of faith without taking things too seriously, and seeing the humor and the positive in any circumstance." Getting to know this amazing person and having him in my Italian class has been a pleasure.

# **CABRINI -- A Must See Film**

By now many of our IAHF members have had the chance to see this amazing film about Mother Cabrini. It was an engaging story about her early life in the slums of New York City, an area called Five Points. Mother Cabrini is the first saint from North America canonized by the Catholic Church. She is considered the Patron Saint of Immigrants. The fascinating film has made the rounds of Italian American community networks throughout the nation, and my hope is it gets out into the mainstream media too. It was released at many film houses on or about March 8, International Women's Day.

It would be difficult to do a full-blown critique of the film, however, it would be helpful to place the story in a historical context and acknowledge some of the themes that were very gingerly touched on. In fact, "perhaps" for the sake of the storyline, several critical facts were not brought up at all, which can lead to some strange assumptions. Some of these themes are noted as follows:

The film noted that by the early 1900's about 2 million immigrants migrated from Italy to the eastern seaboard. By the 1920s, that number increased to 4 million. The early discrimination so poignantly noted in the film did not disappear. By 1924, the US had passed the discriminatory National Origins Quota System, which ended major immigration from Southern and Eastern Europe.

The great migration of Italian immigrants to the US, which began in the 1880s, occurred after the unification of Italy. The proverbial "why?" is certainly a great group subject among so many themes in the film.

Not touched upon at all, except for one comment made by an opera singer in the film who would not perform at a benefit for a Catholic institution, was the split between the Pope as head of the Papal States and the newly formed Kingdom of Italy.

When Mother Cabrini visited the pope, technically he was living in exile and excommunicated the King of Italy. To say relationships in 1870 between the Pope living in the Vatican and the Italian government (which made Rome the capital of a unified nation, including the old Papal States) were strained would be an understatement.

It was a challenge to determine who spoke for the poor Italian immigrant, and a safety net was almost non-existent which made Mother Cabrini's mission so vital. Likewise, the origins of many Italian American organizations started as self-help, mutual benefit societies.

Finally, while the movie pointed to the discrimination confronting a female during those times, it was hard to sort out what was anti-clerical discrimination and what was sexual discrimination.

One amusing observation was the use of language. I found it thoroughly charming to experience a true bilingual Italian English film, while part of me wondered how Mother Cabrini, who was from Lombardy, was able to instantly communicate in such beautiful standard Italian among the plethora of regional idioms, languages and dialects spoken by the immigrants.

The film told an amazing story without even touching upon many of these critical themes. The real Mother Cabrini navigated all of these issues and, for me, how she did so is the real miracle of the film.

Mel Dí Salvo Remembered Musícían, Counselor and Band Leader

Our IAHF community was saddened to learn of the passing of Mel Di Salvo on March 1. Mel was a long-time member of the IAHF (if not a charter member) and was very active during its early days.

Mel was a teacher by profession along with being a musician, counselor, and band leader. He also held a Master's Degree in conducting and was an instructor and counselor at Buchser High School. As a drummer, he played with many jazz groups in the area and performed with the San Jose Symphony and Civic Light Opera.



Mel's many talents were enjoyed by many at the IAHF. With the help of our Librarian Madeline Damiano, we were able to find a note that showed Mel and the "Mel Di Salvo Band" played at one of the first IAHF dinner dances in May 1976. The event was chaired by Founding Members Joe Guera and Joe Di Salvo (a relative). Mel was also the entertainment chair for many of our Italian Family Festas, scholarship programs and Board work.

Mel is survived by his wife, Anna Sordello, and three children Daria Rizzi, Mark DiSalvo and Diane Di Salvo and several grandchildren. Mel's first wife and the children's mother, Virginia "Ginger" Cadile, predeceased Mel. On behalf of the IAHF, our condolences go to all the immediate and extended family. The March IAHF Board meeting was adjourned in his memory and honor.

I would like to acknowledge the work of Madeline Damiano, who searched our newly digitalized IAHF Newsletters to collect some information for this article. Through a special History Grant from the County of Santa Clara, all the IAHF Newsletters are available for you to use for research and from which to gather information about the activities of family, friends, and members as they pertain to the activities of the Foundation. Reading some of the early newsletters is not only fascinating, reading through the archives also makes one truly appreciate all the time, dedication and energy of our collective membership. This article and tribute to Mel is but one example. We are so fortunate to have this resource completed that enables us to honor the Mel Di Salvo and his Dance Band of 1976!






# Seeking Volunteers!

#### The Lost Painting: The Quest for a Caravaggio Masterpiece

The Lost Painting details the search for the original Caravaggio painting titled "The Taking of Christ" which hangs in the Dublin National Gallery. The book was written

by Jonathon Harr who is an acclaimed nonfiction author. Mr. Harr decided to take this finely researched subject and fictionalize it. We become quite immersed in the lives and adventures of two young female art restorers. Sometimes their lives seem to overshadow the theme of the book. It's too bad, really, because the true story is actually a very exciting tale.

Together with the researchers, we dig through 200 years of history, sleuthing through old family ledgers and wills. I had hoped for a thorough explanation of the painting, but that does not appear in the writing. We do learn about various methods of studying a canvas such as using modern infra-red techniques, chemical analysis, and we learn about the restoration process. But the book focuses more on the exhausting job of tracking the painting's ownership history as well as visual clues in the painting itself. We do also glimpse the eccentricities and competitiveness of art experts. The occasional flashbacks into Caravaggio's short, interesting, but ultimately tragic life is particularly interesting

Cooking Class with Josie Taddeo & Helen Lagel - Pupa con L'ouva

Our cooking class season has begun! In March, our bread baking expert, Josie Taddeo, with her assistant, Helen Lagel, prepared us for St. Joseph's Day by teaching us how to make Pupa con L'ouva (doll with an egg). This lovely delicacy adorns our St. Joseph's Table each year. They resemble braided bread baskets and hold a decorated hardboiled egg in the middle or woven into the sides of the "baskets". Other variations include forming the dough into shapes like birds, dolls, hearts, bunnies and more.

Pupa con L'ouva are especially popular in Sicily and Southern Italy and are a tradition for Easter and St. Joseph's Day. To me, they also represent the dawning of Spring and the rebirth of nature's beauty.

During the class, Josie initially demonstrated how to knead, braid, and shape her pre-made dough with the assistance of a couple of our students, Xavier Galano (junior member) and his cousin, Maddison Cathy. The dough was rolled into long ropes, braided, and formed into little baskets around the colored egg. They were then brushed with orange juice and sprinkled with candy sprinkles and baked in the oven.

While the Pupa con L'ouva baked, an appetizing aroma wafted from the kitchen. Meanwhile, Josie demonstrated how to make the dough. And once that was done, the same procedures, as mentioned above, were followed.

Finally, the Pupa came out of the oven, and we had the opportunity to taste this luscious specialty. The bread was a little sweet, soft, delicate, and absolutely melted in your mouth. What a treat it was for all of us!

This was a delightful start to our culinary season, and we want to thank Josie and her assistant, Helen, for making it enjoyable for all!

ITALIAN EASTER BREAD

Pupa Con L'uova Josie's Special Recipe

INGREDIENTS

- 1/4 c. Warm water (about 110 degrees)
- 1 tbsp. Active dry yeast (from 2 1/4 oz. packets)
- 3/4 c. Warm milk (about 110 degrees)
- 1/2 c. Granulated sugar
- 6 tbsp. Unsalted butter, melted
- 2 eggs at room temperature
- 4 1/2 c. All-purpose flour, plus more for the surface
- Orange zest of one orange
- 1/2 c. Candied fruit (optional)
- 1 tsp. Vanillina aroma (pane d'angeli)
- 2 1/2 tsp. Salt
- Nonstick cooking spray
- Optional:

4 dyed uncooked eggs, at room temperature Rainbow sprinkles, for garnish (optional)

FOR ICING

- 1/2 c. Powdered sugar
- Zest of one orange
- 3 tbsp orange juice



DIRECTIONS

STEP ONE

• Stir together the water and the yeast in a small bowl. Let the mixture stand until it is foamy, about 5 minutes.

• Combine the yeast mixture, milk, sugar, butter, zest of one orange, 2-3 tbsp of orange juice, 1 tsp. Vanillina aroma (pane d'angeli) and 2 of the eggs, beaten, in bowl of a stand mixer fitted with a dough hook.

• Beat on medium-low speed until combined, about 30 seconds. Add the flour and salt and mix with a spatula until a shaggy dough forms.

• Return the bowl to the mixer; increase the speed to medium and beat until the dough is smooth, elastic and tacky, about 5 minutes.

STEP TWO

• Transfer the dough to a large bowl, cover with plastic wrap and let the dough rise at warm room temperature until the dough is doubled in size, 1 to 1 1/2 hours.

STEP THREE

• Turn the dough out onto a lightly floured surface and divide it into 4 equal portions.

• Divide each portion into 3 pieces. Roll each of the pieces into a 12 - 14 inch long rope. Braid the ropes together, pinching the ends to seal and tucking them underneath.

• Transfer the braided dough to a parchment-lined baking sheet. If desired, tuck dyed eggs into the braid, spacing them evenly apart.

• Cover the loaf loosely with plastic wrap and let it rise at warm room temperature until it has puffed, 30 to 45 minutes.

STEP FOUR

• During the last 10 minutes of rising, preheat the oven to 350 degrees.

- Uncover the loaf and brush it lightly with the beaten egg.
- Bake the loaf until it is golden brown, 28 to 32 minutes.

• Slide the loaf and the parchment paper onto a wire rack to cool completely.

STEP FIVE

• Whisk together the powdered sugar, orange zest and juice until smooth in a medium bowl. Brush the glaze over the cooled loaf and decorate with sprinkles, if you like.



Dana called the meeting to order at 7pm. Minutes from the February meeting were approved with corrections. Dana discussed the Hall was successfully used as a voting/polling place and will be again Oct 31-November. The Registra of Voters has already paid for the Hall rental, and we recruited a new member. Dana reported Marie and Jan will attend Pioneer High School's multi-cultural event 3/20. We need Festa Chairs & Co-Chairs. 
