Professor Bill McCraw gave an insightful presentation on May 3rd at our IAHF Symposium on the Italian Parliamentary system of governance. He also went into the historical context of the development and evolution of the current political party systems in Italy. For Italophiles, it was a spellbinding symposium. The workshop was held in our conference room and lent itself to quite a rich dialogue. Bill set the pace for following the ebb and flow of Italian democracy since the founding of the Italian Republic in 1945-46.

The theme is a challenging one since many of our members have a limited knowledge of the actual workings of the political process in Italy, including its many political parties and rules of governance. It also provided the setting for an enlightening and lively discussion that included information about how Georgia Meloni put together a winning coalition to become Prime Minster or "President of the Council of Ministers." Italy has two governing bodies, the Chamber of Deputies and the Senate along with a President of the Republic. The Chamber of Deputies has 400 seats and the Senate has 200 seats. The ruling coalition has a majority of votes in both houses of government. Italy is about the size of California, so navigating among 600 deputies brings

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some unique challenges. Bill also went over an example of an actual ballot for the Senate.

To Bill's credit, he was able to clearly delineate the process of governance and some of the key issues that are associated with the Italian Political Party system. This is a system that is composed of approximately 16 political parties with quite unique focuses. A lively dialogue ensued, and his lecture generated quite a lot of interest. We are fortunate to have the lecture taped, thanks to Dave Perzinski under the auspices of a History Project Grant though Santa Clara County. As soon as the video is edited, it will be posted on the IAHF online website. The web site also has many postings of past activities and programs, so it is an extremely valuable avenue through which to come current with the activities of the Foundation.

On a more personal note, Professor McCraw was able to reconnect with some of his students at San Jose State University. Several alumni were present and two of his students, Dave Perzinski and Linda Zavoral, a reporter with the San Jose Mercury News (and I was surprised to learn, an editor of the Spartan Daily Newspaper) were in the audience. Bill is now lecturing to a second and third generation of San Jose State students, and his wealth of knowledge is truly a resource he readily shares. We at the IAHF are a fortunate recipients of this resource and are planning an updated lecture next year.


Coincidently, Bill's lecture nicely ties into our IAHF plans for celebrating the founding of the Italian Republic. At the June 2 event, there will be a flag raising at the County Building at 11:00 AM and a dinner at the IAHF. These two special events, will include a presentation by Rod Diridon on the unique history of the celebration of the

Festa Della Repubblica in San Jose, and the opportunity to learn the words of the Italian National Anthem, including a sing-along with some Italian American pop songs through the technology of DJ Eric and Delia Schizzano's Italian Language classes. ◆ THE FAVALESI SOCIETY ◆

Last month, I wrote an article about seeing an abandoned Italian American club or center located on Story Road in San Jose, which is now long gone. Few people I asked knew much about it. Through this May article wherein I shared what recollections I had been able to gather, I received a fascinating note from IAHF member Dorina Cereghino. She wrote, "Your recent article in the newsletter brought back many memories of Sundays spent pic-



nicking with friends and fellow Italians. Our club, the Favalesi Society, and others such as the Swiss Club, etc. would use the facilities at the Matasci Ranch." She recalled, "[there] were numerous picnic tables, large indoor and outdoor kitchens, a place for the lotteria games, a horseshoe area, and a large dance hall."

Upon getting the letter, I called Dorina and received additional information and reminiscences. It's interesting to note that everyone I talked to were literally children when we recalled the site, so understandably we were all sketchy on many of the details. Dorina recalled it being in an orchard setting, with fruit boxes and farming equipment in the area. When the orchard and farming property was sold, that signaled the end of the facility. A lady on the Emma Prusch Park Association, who still lives in the same vicinity, was familiar with the area. She said the hall was located on East Sunset Avenue and Story Road. Dorina noted the Favalesi Society is no longer operational. They were a club that traced their origin to a village, Favale, located in Liguria. tant cousin and famed Olympic ice skater, Brian Boitano, was also part of the clan.

This led me to speculate that the

facility was less a foundation and

more of a picnic site and rental hall for primarily Italian and Italian

Swiss organizations and was associ-

ated with the Matasci Ranch. When

the ranch sold, so too did the pic-

nic facility. The Boitano family was very active in the club, according

The unfolding story hopefully will be continued!

Dorina provided another memory associated with those times – Sunday picnics in old Alum Rock Park. For anyone growing up in the 1940s to the 1960s, I do not need to say more. It was a magical experience that I just took for granted. That is certainly a part of our local Italian American history for sure. Unfortunately, we do not have much in the way of photos and documentation of those wonderful times. Alum Rock Park is still there, but certainly not with the ambiance of old. That story still needs to be told. Any takers?





Italian Lessons

by Peter Pezzelli 🔊

Lessons are certainly learned in this charming and peaceful novel set in Rhode Island and Italy. Author Pezzelli opens his story with his two very disparate protagonists meeting in the dreamy setting of early summer in Rhode Island. Giancarlo, an immigrant Italian music professor, begrudgingly agrees to give private Italian language lessons to Carter, a recent college graduate. Carter has had a love-at-

first-sight moment with a young Italian visitor to Rhode Island and is hopelessly in love. Unfortunately, his dream girl, Antonella, immediately returned to Italy and left Carter with only her first name and the name of her small village in Abruzzo. His passion for her is so strong that he decides to learn the Italian language over the summer and then fly to Italy in September, find Antonella's town, and claim his prize. GianCarlo is impressed with Carter's zeal and agrees to teach him. Giancarlo clearly understands the boy's passion which foreshadows Giancarlo's deeply troubling and personal story.

Carter's bubbly optimism is juxtaposed with Giancarlo's struggling and acerbic nature. He is a composer and music teacher but is suffering from "writer's block." He simply cannot compose nor perform in public. He's lonely and depressed over a very long estrangement from his brother who has remained in their village in Abbuzzo. Coincidentally, his village is a short distance from the place where Antonella lives. So, Carter kindly agrees to deliver a heavily symbolic package to Giancarlo's family; a symbol which carries all the pain in Giancarlo's stubborn heart.

Part 2 of the book describes Carter's experiences in Italy and will appeal to all who love Italy. The descriptions are lovely without sounding like a tour guide. Carter is an amazingly real person. In fact, all the characters are a real tribute to Author Pezzeli's writing skills. The sprinkling of Italian words throughout the text is particularly charming. The description of the rugged Abruzzese mountain terrain is vivid and accurate.

The story unfolds with our protagonists eventually reuniting in the mountains of Abruzzo under terrifying conditions. The two are forced to face some harsh realities which will hopefully open the door to a bright future. Author Pezzelli's character development is smooth, unstrained and real. There is never a moment in the reading that feels contrived. This is a fine, swift, summer read, and I especially recommend it to young adults. The story lends us a lovely perspective on life and addresses expectations and disappointments.

Fare la scarpetta

To soak up sauce with bread

- This lovely Italian custom has nothing to do with the word scarpetta (*little shoe*).
- It's merely an expression which means to soak up the sauce left on your plate after eating the pasta with your bread.
- We must not waste that delicious sauce! You are welcome to fare la scarpetta with your fingers holding the bread or with a fork.
- In English we can say, for example, he "scarfed up all the sauce." This expression, of course, has nothing to do with a scarf.



Our May cooking class featured a dish that comes from the western and southwestern regions of Sicily, Trapani and Agrigento. We were privileged to learn about couscous, a dish of steamed, small round wheat grains, taught by our instructor, Nora Monette. It was an exciting discovery for me, as I am originally from the Palermo region of Sicily and did not know that couscous was popular in distinctive regions of Sicily.

Nora provided some interesting facts about couscous in Sicily by pointing out the where, when, and how about couscous. She provided a handout which included a map, recipes and a fascinating article which gave a background of this tasty grain. With Sicily and North Africa being so close, couscous traveled from North Africa to Sicily and some sources say as far back as 827 A.D.

After giving background information, she began teaching us how to make her sweet couscous dessert. Preliminarily, Zante currants are soaked in warm water for at least ten minutes. Next, water, honey cinnamon sticks and cloves are combined in a pot and boiled together and then simmered until the volume of the liquid is reduced by half. At this point, the cinnamon sticks and the cloves are removed, and

Nora's Dolce Couscous Recipe

North African culinary influences are found in western and southeastern Sicily in Trapani and Agrigento provinces. There even is an annual International Couscous festival in San Vito Lo Capo, a historic fishing town.

Ingredients

- 1/2 cup Zante currants or small raisins
- 1 ¾ cup water
- 2 cinnamon sticks and/or
- 1 tsp. ground cinnamon
- 2 whole cloves
- 1 cup plus 2 Tbsp medium couscous (not instant)

the couscous is added to the pot to cook for a couple of minutes. Once the couscous is cooked, it is covered and allowed to stand for 10 minutes. At this point, candied orange peel, chopped pistachios (or other nuts) and grated orange rind are added. In addition, if you're a chocolate nut like me, you can add dark chocolate pieces. The couscous mixture is then shaped into a form, turned over and placed on a plate in a pool of orange sauce and garnished. Sound delicious? It is! Our students were then served the sweet dessert and expressed their pleasure and were given more of it to take home to enjoy later. All in all, it was another fun cooking class where there was the opportunity to work together in creating this luscious dessert.

- ¹/₂ cup candied orange peel, cut into small pieces
- ½ cup chopped pistachios (or a mixture with almonds, pinenuts)
- Grated orange rind, from ½ orange
- 2 Tbsp dark chocolate (optional)

Directions

- Soak currants in warm water for at least 10 minutes.
- Place water, honey, cinnamon and cloves in a pot and bring to a boil. Simmer and reduce volume by approximately half.
- Add couscous to pot, cook for 2 minutes, then cover and let stand for 10 minutes.
- Mix candied orange peel (cut into small pieces), chopped pistachios (or almonds, pinenuts, if using), orange rind and chocolate (if using) to the honeyed couscous.

- Scoop 1/3 cup of the couscous mixture in a shaped measuring cup or form. Turn form over and place on a plate or cookie sheet.
- To Serve: Spoon a pool of orange sauce, about 2 tablespoons, below the couscous on the plate. (Recipe below)
- Garnish with pistachios and possibly candied orange rind.
- Note: The amount of water to start out with is 2:1 the weight of the couscous.

Sweet Orange Sauce (Makes about 1 cup)

Ingredients

- 1 cup fresh squeezed orange juice (2-3 navel oranges)
- Orange peel, from ½ an orange, (use strip zester and chop into

smaller pieces)

- ¼ cup sugar
- ½ teaspoon cornstarch dissolved in 2 tablespoons of the orange juice.
- Up to 1 tablespoon of butter.

Directions

- Mix orange juice, orange peel, sugar, and cornstarch and bring to a boil in a pan and simmer for 20 minutes to reduce.
- Remove the mixture from the heat and stir in the butter. Even with a little less butter it is still very rich tasting.
- Enjoy!

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A PEEK INT® THE BOARDROOM

Board of Directors Meeting May 9, 2023

- The meeting was called to order by President Dana Zuccarello at 7 PM on May 9. After the Pledge of Allegiance, the minutes from the April meeting were approved with one minor change. (Note: minutes, agendas and financial documents are in a binder in the office as well as posted online).
- Dana noted that she will not be at the June 13 meeting and confirmed that Ken will run the meeting.
- Information tables are being set up at a Santa Teresa Cultural event on Friday, May 12, from 2 until 5:30 and again on May 13 at the 38th Annual Hands on the Arts Festival in Sunnyvale. One condition of our Grant is that we outreach to our local community, and these events certainly will qualify.
- Our financial position remains strong with Year to Date Net Income of \$81,419, available cash of \$73,945 and total bank assets of \$419,211 as of April 30. Total bank assets include \$80,000 in reserve funds and \$93,637 in restricted funds (scholarships and grants).
- The May 12 Polenta Dinner, co-hosted with the Tricarico Club, will honor Tony Amato and is sold out. They always do the cooking and leave the kitchen spotless.
- FESTA plans are coming along although we could use more craft vendors and volunteers. Sponsorship donations are on track. The food and bocce courts are secured for the June 4 tournament. The Festa Della Repubblica scheduled for June 2, will include a dinner that evening at the Hall. A new, larger sized Italian flag has been ordered.
- Hall rentals are on the increase with \$19,600 so far this year, and

contracts for an additional \$7,600 in the works. The area near the BBQ pit, west of the Hall, has \$3,300 dedicated for its completion. Sharon and Robert Martinez will work on a design and submit details and budget at the next meeting.

- A brief presentation on the ADA accomplishments since the audit report was finalized in 2019. Approximately 75% of the recommended mandates have been accomplished with the ramp for stage and ADA bathrooms currently on hold.
- A motion was made to have the ceiling in the Hall painted and sealed. After some discussion and review of three bids, the Board approved Brightview Painting to cover the popcorn ceiling with Lag Kote at a cost of \$10,000.
- Photos of the seriously deteriorating tire bumpers in the parking lot were shared. The Board approved hiring H&H Construction to install 45 36-inch cement stops at a cost of \$3,699.
- It was suggested that a team be created to help prioritize projects at the Hall.
- A Membership Reconciliation revealed that some members have overpaid and will be given the option to extend, upgrade, refund or offer the overpayment as a donation.
- Mary had nothing to report on the newsletter.
- Madeline again pointed out that the area designated for the archival office is once again full of "stuff." After the meeting, the materials were relocated by our BOD.
- On a final note, Dana reminded everyone that "we are all volunteers, so please be respectful and kind to each other."


