

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OUR REVITALIZING PROGRAM HAS BEGUN

Our humble beginnings . . .

As many read this article, you will personally remember when the Italian American Heritage Foundation was founded as an organization in 1976. Throughout the next eight or nine years, the IAHF was able to raise large sums of money to purchase our current property at 425 North Fourth Street. Since then, we have held countless events spanning almost four decades celebrating our Italian history and culture. The heartbeat of the IAHF.

Our realistic present . . .

As the pandemic is (hopefully) in our rearview mirror, the Board of Directors and all our wonderful volunteers at the IAHF are doing everything in our power to bring back our celebrated events and striving to create new events. There seems to be an excited spirit amongst our members as I'm able to speak with them at our events that we've held so far. I also hear of positive reports from other members, both Board and membership, about the joy of meeting back in person and enjoying each other's company.

All the while, our building needs major improvements. The BOD has met and is in discussion about the improvements we need for our building. Some of those improvements are as follows: new HVAC, new flooring, new roof, electrical upgrade, ADA restroom compliance and a new canopy, just to name a few. I have been scheduling vendors to come in and look at the various items on our list of capital improvements to get ballpark quotes. When the HVAC contractor came and looked at the units up on the roof, the first words out of his mouth were "It's a miracle your HVAC has lasted this long." Being able to do all of these things will improve our building and secure it for future generations to come. Just as countless others have done so for us back in the 70s and 80s.

Our hopeful future . . .

Now I turn to our current membership and ask everyone to consider what you can do to support our building fund, not only now but in the future! I'd like to start a building fund campaign so we can move ahead on our capital improvement projects. I am looking for at least 100 people to join with me and commit to give \$100 over the next 12 months or a one-time gift of \$1,200 for the next year. There may be some members who can give much more than this and there may be some members who can give maybe \$25 or \$50 a month. This building fund campaign will be called The President's Club and our sole purpose will be to raise funds so the future generations to come will enjoy this building just as you and I have enjoyed it all these many years.

Items discussed:

- Meeting called to order by President Dana Zuccarello at 7:10 PM
- In attendance: Ken Borelli, Azie Habib, Lucia Clementi, Louie Lombardo, Joe Lucito, Sharon McCray, Dave Perzinski and Frank De-Turris. Via Zoom were: Marie Bertola, Tony Zerbo, Elise Habra. Minutes from July 12 meeting were approved as written.
- Dana suggested that we should host a food drive in November and a Toys for Tots gift collection in December. Also scheduled in the coming months is a General Membership meeting to vote on new board members, a Patrons Dinner and a Festa Volunteer dinner (Nancy to coordinate). Ken pointed out that Guillermo Winery would like host a wine tasting dinner sometime this year. Also planned is the membership screening sometime in October of the movie "Potentially Dangerous" about Italian internment camps during WWII. Dana will also be playing her cello on January 29 with the Mission Chamber.
- Later in the meeting, Marie B. explained that Santa Clara University will have a screening of Potentially Dangerous that will be open to the public. The event will be free. She would get back with more information. Because bringing this film to the IAHF for a showing would be costly, Lucia recommended that the IAHF announce the Santa Clara University screening to it's members, rather than have another screening at the IAHF.
- Frank submitted Financial Reports. Net bank assets are \$300,189. Funds are being advanced to cover routine Festa expenses and will be recouped after the event.
- Other events for the remainder of 2022, include a Hawaiian Garden dinner and pre-holiday raffle. Also some events we are considering are: Santa Clara Wine & Art Festival, Parade of Champions. 2023 events include a symphonic program, St. Josephs Day.

The holiday dinner dance is scheduled for Sunday, December 4. August 16 is the date for the Navy Welcome pre Festa dinner: Ken and Joe will be cooking.

- Lucia announced that she would be leaving our BOD at the end of this year. With that said, someone will need to take over the responsibilities of the 3rd Vice President. She stated that if anyone is interested in the position, she would train that person and she recommended some upcoming SCORE webinars.
- Azie noted that we are returning to using the previous Security Company. He also reported that we have 3 weekend rentals in September, none in October and 2 in November. We are still awaiting ABC approval of our liquor permit.
- Ken commented that we are in desperate need of more storage space as we are at capacity. Both Louie and Sharon strongly recommended that we purge unnecessary items.
- Louie has asked to make minor changes to the Membership Application form to include emergency contact into.
- Dave reported Membership is doing very well and that we have 439 total members. Since January, we have 28 new members, with five new members since July 1. We currently have 43 Super donors and 96 Patrons. He would like to get a locked cabinet for the computer equipment he is currently storing at his home.
- An open discussion followed with the following comments noted:
 - We should consider a Halloween party for neighborhood children and members families.
 - SJPD is using our parking lot which is helping with security afterhours.
 - We do not need a Security Supervisor during set up of events.

My family on my dad's side is of Italian heritage. My great grandparents' families came over here to Ellis Island, and my uncle and aunt have been liv-

ing in Italy throughout my life. Having the connection to Italy and the influence of its culture in my everyday existence has surrounded me with a view of the two different countries. Every time I visit my cousins or Facetime them, we share stories of the social and educational aspects we both encounter. My nonna is very adamant about sharing family recipes and learning about our heritage. She would read us books about the people coming to Ellis Island, tell us stories about my great grandparents, and sing us Italian songs. In fact, my great grandmother would bounce us on her knees and sing them when I was very young. With part of my family living in the country, I am lucky enough to experience the world outside of the place where I live. Having the ability to submerge myself into Italian culture firsthand has enriched me with information about other history, art, food, and scenery. Being immersed into a country that exhibits the origins of so much creativity and scientific thinking is fascinating to experience compared to the country I have grown up in that is relatively new. This scholarship will assist with my passions because it will help me afford the education that is most suitable for pointing me in the right direction and preparing me for my future. My dream would be to go to the east coast for study because I want to get a sense of a new perspective, and I grew up going back there with my family so it has a special place in my heart. Although, as someone who just had an older sister go through college and a twin sister going to college at the same time as me, my family would need the financial support in order for me to get the chance of pursuing that goal. As I have said previously, I like trying many

activities. One of my main hobbies is theater. The performing arts has helped to link me to my passions of the visual arts, hence what I want to study through architecture and design. I have been doing it for 11 years now, and although it has presented many heartbreaks, it has also given me happiness and taught me valuable lessons. For example, Les Miserables. The show I've wanted to do since my love for theater began. It included not only several of my dream roles but one particular one: Eponine. When I received the cast list I sadly did not get her. Not only that, but I was put in the ensemble. I was in shock. My overthinking arrived with full force. "You're not good enough." "You should have done better." There was a period of time the confidence in my skills held me back from performing to my full potential. Not being the best singer made me feel like that would never put me on the same level as other performers. I started vocal lessons and took notes on the theater industry. With this I was ready, and I wouldn't let my insecurities get in the way. That's why the blow was so hard. Here I was thinking that I did well on my audition, believing I could get one of my dream roles, and yet, I still didn't. The sad part about that in musical theater is you can work on your voice to improve it, but you can't fix natural talent. Some are born with it and others aren't. Many people can sing well, so I thought that what I couldn't give in terms of my singing, I could make up for in my acting. For me, the most important thing as an actor is to bring the character to life and connect to the audience. That's the part of theater I fell in love with. Since my director also loves

It's a rough business and it will only get harder, but I love doing it. It's tough to get rejected, but I've learned how to deal with it and keep my persistence, determination, and dedication. The lessons I've learned in theater have provided me with useful skills I will apply in college and life after college.

Even small characters can make a huge difference, and I want to be that effect. When I get my chance, it will only be THAT much better, THAT much more important, and THAT will be worth it. 🜟



REFLECTIONS ABOUT CARMELLA GULLO

If ever the adage "big things come in small packages" rings true, one only has to think of Carmella Gullo and her varied contributions to the life of the IAHF. A petite lady with an amazing smile is how I will always remember her. Sadly, she passed away last month after reaching the proverbial "cent' anni" milestone plus 5 additional months. She is sur-

vived by her husband of 71 years, Joe, her daughters, Frances Hogan and JoAnn Gullo, and two grandchildren, Josh and Jaimie. A private service was held.

She was a mainstay in so many activities at the IAHF that you could not count them all. She could be found in the kitchen making her specialty salads and being an active participant on Norma Mestice's kitchen team or working and serving at the St Joseph Day Festa. You could also



The Pope and Mussolini

Thanks so much to Ken Borelli for suggesting I read The Pope and Mussolini. When I saw the size of it, 407 pages, I felt overwhelmed when, in fact, the read was swift and engaging. The author, historian Professor David Kertzer, took full advantage of the 2006 opening of the Vatican archives pertaining to the Mussolini era. His research appears to be thorough and unbiased. There are 100 pages of re-

search bibliography!

Many of us have a picture of Benito Mussolini in our minds that presents him as a strutting peacock of a man. In fact, in his early days in government, he was greatly admired. Famous persons such as Mahatma Gandhi, Winston Churchill, Thomas Edison and FDR had words of lavish praise for him. But we all know that his bonding with Hitler set his train to glory right off its rails.

This book clearly shows us Mussolini's genius at manipulating the Church. Through the Church he was able to conquer the hearts of the people. Alternately, Pope Pius XI used Mussolini to achieve his goals for the Church which suffered from a dire fear of communism especially because of its atheism and abandonment of tradition. This led to the Lateran Accords which protected the Church (clergy and schools and Catholic organizations) in exchange for the Church publicly supporting Mussolini and his Fascist agenda.

Historical events highlight the Pope's subservience. For example, The Holy See was opposed to Mussolini's invasion of Ethiopia. For fear of losing the Lateran Accords and this protection, the Pope fell in line and gave public support regarding the effort to colonize Ethiopia. Mussolini had Pope Pius XI under his control. One wrong move and Catholic schools would be closed as they had been in Germany, or Catholic Action and Catholic newspapers would be shut down.

So the Pope behaved. When Pius XI realized what a catastrophe Hitler was and the full dynamics of Hitler's agenda emerged, it was 1939 and too late for Pope Pius XI to alter the disastrous course.

Author Kerzer explains the difference between the Church and Mussolini regarding the Jews. Mussolini's anti-Semitism was raced based, while the Church's anti-Semitism was religion based. If a Jew converted to Christianity, he was a Christian. The tension between the two determined men is skillfully portrayed but Mussolini had all the ammo and by this time was subject to Hitler.

Author Kertzer describes the death of Pius XI as an old man full of regret. At this point the book reveals the truth about his successor, Cardinal Pacelli, who became Pope Pius XII. For me, this was the toughest part of the book to read. I grew up with Pope Pius the XII's smiling image in every one of my classrooms. I thought he was saintly. In fact, he was a sycophant and pro-fascist racist. Much is revealed in his own writing. To appease Mussolini, Pius XII shut down Catholic organizations and newspapers. I found it to be very disturbing, disappointing and sad to discover this about Pope Pius XII.

The Pope and Mussolini is a wealth of information and for those of you who enjoy non-fiction and history, this is a worthwhile book. It is acclaimed by historians and a finalist in the National Book Awards.

- *Li ho finiti* = I've finished them (masculine plural)
- *Le ho finite* = I've finished them (feminine plural)
- *Hai finito la colazione?* Sì, l'ho finita.

Be careful translating I am done directly from English - Sono finita/o. Certainly Sono finita/o does exist, but it actually means I am done for!

LUCIA'S COOKING CLASS NEWS



Remember the time when the house smelled of wonderful homemade cuccidati? In August, our chef, Joe Lucito, taught us how to make yummy cuccidati (fig cookie) from a traditional family recipe. This fig cookie comes from Sicily and Southern Italy and has roots from the time Sicily was under Arab or possibly Roman rule. This class was well attended because there is so much interest in this subject, and it brings memories of traditions in our own families. Some of the students in the class mentioned that their grandmothers used to make cuccidati and they wanted to preserve the same custom that they cherished. Cuccidati are normally made during Holidays and especially during the Christmas Season. Although this cookie is labor intensive and time consuming, it is well worth it. Just think of the sweet flavors of figs, raisins, dates, nuts and spices wrapped in cookie dough and melded into a tasty bite. They are absolutely irresistible! Because of the work that goes into these delectable morsels, the class participated with Joe in preparing the cuccidati. Joe demonstrated how to make the stuffing and dough. Once the dough was ready, the students rolled it out, cut it in strips, placed the stuffing on the dough, rolled the dough around the stuffing, sealed the ends of the dough with a fork and placed the cookies on cookie sheets to go into the oven. While the cuccidati were baking, the lovely aroma filled the kitchen, and we all waited in anticipation to taste them. After they came out of the oven and cooled, everyone had the chance to savor these sweet bites and expressed how good they were. The students were even able to take some cookies home to enjoy later.

The cooking classes are such a joy for me because I have the opportunity to "rub elbows" with others who share a passion for culinary arts. Not only that, we also always have fun working together by laughing, telling stories and enjoying good food.

CUCCIDATI RECIPE

Filling:

- 1 lb. figs (dried), tips cut off
- 6 oz. stoned dates
- 12 oz. raisins
- 3/4 cup sugar
- 1/3 of No. 2 can crushed pineapple
- 1 Tbsp. whiskey
- 1/3 lb. shelled pecans or walnuts
- 1-1/2 tsp. nutmeg
- 1-1/2 tsp. cinnamon
- Grated rind of 1 orange
- 1/4 tsp. black pepper

• 2 Tbsp. light Karo syrup Pour boiling water over figs; drain well. Put raisins, dates and figs through a food grinder/ processer. Put mixture in a large bowl and add all other ingredients. Work with hands until well blended. Cover with foil and let stand overnight.

Dough for cookies:

- 6 cups flour
- 2 level Tbsp. baking powder
- 1 cup sugar
- 3 eggs
- 2/3 cup milk

- 3/4 lb. unsalted butter
- 1-1/4 Tbsp. vanilla

Cookie Icing:

- 1 cup confectioners' powdered sugar
- 2-4 tsp. milk
- 2 tsp. Karo Syrup
- ¼ tsp. vanilla

Sift flour, sugar and baking powder together. Add butter and work with hands until the dough is like small peas. Mix eggs, milk and vanilla. Add to flour mixture; blend well with hands. Knead lightly until dough does not stick to hands, adding flour if needed. Take small amounts of dough and roll out strips about 6 or 8 inches long and 3 inches wide. Place filling in center of strip. Bring dough together; seal dough with fingers or fork. Roll and cut into desired shapes. Bake at 400° for 15 to 20 minutes on greased cookie sheet. Ice when cool with cookie icing. *continued on next page >>>*

It is an ideal time to taste some amazing wines and stock up for Thanksgiving, Christmas and New Year - if you really need a justification to enjoy the "liquid gold."

As the sages say, "in vino veritas" -"in wine there is truth" - so we will have some fun with this adage when we enjoy a late afternoon "soiree" at the winery. As we go to press, we are in the process of finalizing plans for a dinner or winetasting with appetizers. Details, including pricing, will follow; in the meantime, circle the date for this South County adventure. And, actually, our visit is about 3 years overdue, as it is one of the pre-covid visits we are finally going to be able to realize.

In many ways the South Santa Clara County area still retains much of the lifestyle of the Valley of Hearts Delight. 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
