That is where I found a beautiful cobblestone bridge that provided crossing over the Neva River. It was so peaceful and serene to be able to sit there and listen to the stream. I was really hoping to find a store that I could buy some-

thing to document my visit to Zuccarello, but I couldn't find anything of that sort. I was able to get several pictures of me with the different town signs. That was the highlight for me! This past Christmas, my sister took those pictures and made me a wall hanging and I loved it! To this day, I still can't pinpoint if any of my relatives came from this town or not. My great grandparents on the Zuccarello side were from Sicily. I'm hoping to try and track down some family and see if they have any leads.

IAHF Events Health Policy

In an effort to keep our members safe, the IAHF has adopted the following policy:

All who attend an activity or event which takes place at the IAHF Hall will need to be fully vaccinated or present negative COViD-19 test results dated within 72 hours. This policy follows the guidance set by Santa Clara County and the CDC.

This means that when checking in at an event at the IAHF Hall, we will ask you to show your vaccination card or your QR Code on your cell phone from the State Registry (see below).


If you are not fully vaccinated (i.e., it has been a full two weeks since your second shot of the Pfizer/Moderna vaccine or two weeks since your Johnson and Johnson vaccine), you will need to show a negative Covid test from within 72 hours of the event.



Many local counties are implementing measures to require proof of vaccination to attend certain events or enter select venues. To facilitate proof of vaccination status, you can register your vaccination status at https://myvaccinerecord.cdph.ca.gov. With a validated registration, you will receive a QR Code on your mobile phone which you can show upon entry. This will serve as proof of your vaccinations at most venues. -- Article by Felix Dalldorf







In many ways, Richard was a man for all seasons. As was mentioned in his obituary, he was involved in many civic organizations from the IAHF to the Elks, The

Civic Club of San Jose (where he served as President), the Sainte Claire Club and many more.

Rich was the embodiment of many long-time families in this valley. He grew up on a local ranch in a family of San Jose natives, Marge and Andrew Arzino, and experienced firsthand the transitions from a rural community to a high-tech valley. Even so, he never disconnected with his country roots, being a member of 4H and the Cattleman's Association.

He was a graduate of Bellarmine, Santa Clara University and earned a Doctor of Law from Lincoln Law School and practiced law in his hometown for over 50 years, specializing in divorce and family law.

From Ken: "For me personally, he was a "go-to" person when complex issues at the IAHF would emerge. Somehow, given his early Board history, his tenure as President and his legal expertise, I knew he would have an answer, opinion and/or recommendation for me. It was very reassuring to be able to talk with him about IAHF issues. He was one of the first persons I turned to when I became President of the IAHF. His office at that time was in the Roberto Adobe in Willow Glen. Being a history buff, I was in awe of his office and the building in general.

My last contact with Richard was only a year ago, January 2021. I was writing an article about the early days of the



IAHF and the visionary efforts of our members at the time who worked so hard in securing the facility we enjoy today. He was intently involved with those efforts. He reviewed the draft article, filled in gaps and added some key points. The article was in the IAHF Newsletter last January, "A History of the IAHF, The Early Days." Also supplying some much needed contextual facts were Marge Valente, Tony Zerbo and Cathy De Maria. (You can revisit the article online.)"

From Cathy: "Rich was very generous with his time to the IAHF. He would never miss the Opening Ceremony of

the Annual Italian Family Festa – always the first to say he would be there and always dressed in a suit and tie! - and it was with much pride of his tenure and association with the IAHF that he could be acknowledged publicly as one of our esteemed past presidents when I would introduce him during our ceremony. His competency and compassion were respected in our community and especially in the IAHF community. In fact, several IAHF members were clients. He loyally advertised in our newsletter since perhaps the inception of the newsletter as we know it today."

Richard married the love of his life, Joan in 1964, taking great pride in his growing family, his garden and making memories at his beloved Lake Almanor retreat. Richard and Joan shared a passion for travel, golf and cooking, inspiring the creation of the annual Clam Dip Classic Golf Tournament as well as a family cookbook celebrating a life well lived.

We at the IAHF want to acknowledge Richard's legacy to us. An IAHF Scholarship in Memory of Richard Arzino is being established and contributions can be sent to the IAHF with this notation.

Bravo, Rich, for your selfless giving and generous conscientious service. Rest in peace.

A PEEK INTO THE BOARDROOM

Your Board of Directors held their regularly scheduled monthly meeting February 8. The meeting was well attended and members asking to be included via Zoom, as always, were welcomed.

The Executive Board decided that there does not seem to be a need for a special meeting and therefore voted unanimously to abandon that process. In the future, Executive Board meetings will be held on an as-needed basis.

The December minutes were further corrected to include both Dave Perzinski and Madeline Damino as attending, along with some additional language regarding the election process. January minutes were approved as written. All finalized minutes are available for your review in the office.

- There were some concerns about the unsightliness of the conference room. The Board along with the language students will take turns cleaning the space.
- Issues regarding the ABC and bar matters have been deferred to a February 28 meeting with Matt Mahan who is running for Mayor of San Jose. Matt has agreed to help the IAHF with our permits.
- Ken reported that the Valentine's Day event has been postponed until March 6

- and that the Graton Casino Trip is scheduled for April 26. St Joseph's Day will again be a drive-through as Covid precautions are uncertain, and we need to protect our members. Cooking classes will start up again soon and a new Italian language class is in the works, both in person and online.
- As per routine protocol, the Board voted to remove Felix and Marie as signatories on the bank accounts and replace them with Dana and Sharon, respectively.
- Frank reported our net revenue for January to be \$22,493. This includes memberships and Hall rentals.
- Azie was excited to report that the building locks have been changed as a routine procedure and that a key log is being maintained to help keep track of who has keys.
 He also reported that we took delivery of 117 new chairs today with the balance to arrive before the end of February.
- Seth reported that the Five-Year Plan is moving along slowly, mostly due to lack of data. He asks if anyone has information for the Plan, please get the data to him as soon as practical. Dana also reiterated that our building is not for sale and that it never was an option.

- Lucia got the February newsletter printed in-house and a small group of volunteers spent an afternoon getting them printed, folded and mailed out. This will save the IAHF about \$500 per month. Volunteers are always needed for various tasks at the IAHF. Whether unloading chairs or processing newsletters, if you can help, please call the office and let us know. There was also a nice article in the Campbell Press about the IAHF, our history and offerings. It is hoped that this will help increase membership.
- Because our Library is increasing in volume, Madeline asked and was granted permission to use the small office adjoining the current space.
- As a reminder, if you have not renewed your membership, there is no time like today. Invite your friends and neighbors to join the IAHF, allowing us to expand our membership and outreach programs.

The next meeting of your Board of Directors is scheduled for Tuesday, March 15. All are welcome.

Applicants must demonstrate a past and current interest in the Italian arts and culture through academic course-work, including language studies, family heritage, travel and activities relating to Italy. Also considered are the applicant's graduatelevel Italian studies, Performing Arts and Fine Arts programs.

ITALY'S GEOGRAPHY

Four seas surround the Italian peninsula: the Tyrrhenean on the West, the Adriatic on the East, the Ionian on the South East and the Mediterranean on the South. On the North, the mighty Alps separate it from the European continent. Below the Alps a number of lakes straddle the borders with Switzerland.

There are over 400 islands in Italy. Many are very small and uninhabited. Some have been used as penal colonies for political or chronic offenders. Many go unexplored. They offer pristine settings of unequaled beauty. A few islands are a refuge for migrating birds.

Italy has twenty regions. The islands of Sardinia and Sicily are two of them. Italians refer to these two islands as *le isole maggiori* (the major islands). All other islands dotting the coastline and the lakes are called *isole minori* (minor islands).

Sicily (5 million) is the largest island in the Mediterranean basin. Sardinia (3 million) is the second largest. Several airlines and ferries connect the two to the mainland. Millions of tourists visit these islands each year. Splendid beaches, well kept antiquities, great food and sunny weather are the main attractions.

Surrounding the coastline of Italy are several smaller islands and a number of archipelagos blessed with rich history, fabulous beaches, great scenery and unique cuisines. An archipelago is a cluster of islands. Some tiny islands are close enough to one another to be connected by bridges.

It is noteworthy that off the Venice lagoon there is a small group of islands familiar to tourists. Murano with its adjacent islets is well known for its exquisite glass works. Burano is known for its signature lace work.

Tourism is the principal occupation.

LETS EXPLORE SOME OTHERS

Tuscan Archipelago is a chain of seven islands off the Tuscan shores. Most people are familiar with the islands of Elba (32,000) and Montecristo. Legends say that the archipelago originated from a necklace that Venus, the Roman goddess of beauty and sensuality, lost while emerging from the Tyrrhenean Sea.

History buffs know that Napoleon was a prisoner in Elba. Montecristo (2) is associated with the writings of Alexander Dumas. Other islands are Giglio (1,442), Capraia (415), Pianosa (10), Gorgona (220), and Giannutri (10). Ferry service connects the islands with one another and with the port of Leghorn. Cruise ships circle these islands during the summer months.

Campanian Archipelago is located off the coast of Naples and comprises five islands: Capri (12,200), Ischia (55,000), Nisida, Procida (10,600) and Vivara. Capri is perhaps the best known. Ischia is the largest and the destination of choice for many Germans, including retired Chancellor Merkel, who maintains a summer home there.

These islands trace their origins to the Mycenaean Greeks. The patrician class of ancient Rome used to vacation in these islands. Roman poets mentioned the beauty of the islands in their musings.

Cruise ships stop in Capri to let passengers descend and visit the famous blue grotto. Daily ferry service connects these islands to the-mainland and to one another.

Well-known films such as *The Postman*, *Cleopatra*, and *Talented Mr. Ripley* have been shot in Procida.

Aeolian Archipelago is a cluster of seven islands of the North East coast of Sicily: Lipari (10,200), Salina (2600), Vulcano (150), Stromboli

(450), Panarea (280), Alicudi (50) and Filicudi (25). These islands are the result of volcanic activity over a period of 260,000 years. Stromboli and Vulcano are still active volcanoes.

The islands trace their history to 4000 BC when the Sikels arrived. Mythology tells us that Aeolos, god of wind, lived there and so did Vulcan, the god of fire. Homer in the Odyssey mentions Neptune, god of the seas, as a frequent visitor. More than 600,000 visitors come to the islands each year. The islands are known for the Malvasia wine and the much-appreciated capers.

Daily ferry service connects these islands to several ports in Sicily and the mainland. Cruise ships can be seen circling the islands during the summer months. Stromboli entertains passing ships with its nocturnal explosions and fumaroles.

Stromboli is famous for the post-war neo-realist movie *Stromboli Terra di Dio* by Roberto Rossellini starring Ingrid Bergman. A museum of the apartment the two stars shared during the filming is open to the public.

Egadi Archipelago is a group of islands off the northwest coast of Sicily. Favignana (3,800) is the largest and most developed. Levanzo (450) and Marettimo (350) more pristine. The population of all three islands is 4,300. Fishing and tourism are the principal occupations.

There is evidence of Neolithic and Paleolithic presence in caves on Levanzo and to a lesser degree in Favignana. Roman historians tell us that it was near these islands that Carthaginians fought and lost to the Romans. Elymnian Greeks escaping Troy after its defeat at the hands of mainland Greeks stopped on Sicily's west coast on their trek to Latium.

Daily ferry service connects these islands with Marsala and Trapani in Sicily. This archipelago is a destination of choice for many Sicilians during summer. The capture of tuna is a celebrated event each year.

ISOLE PELAGIE

There are three islands in this archipelago: Lampedusa, Lampione and Linosa. They are located smack in the center of the Mediterranean Sea close to the North African Coast and Tunisia.

- Lampedusa (6,500) is the largest. Since the early 2000s it has become the entry point of choice for illegal migrants arriving from Libya. Upon landing in Lampedusa, migrants are afforded protection and assistance by the Italian government and the European Union. Lampedusa traces its history to the Phoenicians, Greeks, Romans and Berbers. Fishing, agriculture and tourism are the main economic drivers. Air and ferry service connect the island to Sicily.
- Lampione is uninhabited and serves primarily as a lighthouse. The island according to Homer's Odyssey was a rock fallen

from the Hands of the one-eyed Cyclops Polyphemus.

- Linosa (430) traces its origins to the Punic wars and was used by the Romans as a base. Saracens, Normans, Angevins, Aragonese and the British have controlled the island. Agriculture and tourism are the principal components of the local economy.
- Pantelleria (7,800), not part of the archipelago, is located in the Sicilian Channel 37 miles east of the Tunisian Coast and 62 miles southwest of Sicily.

On a clear day Tunisia is visible from the island. Its history goes back to the 7th century B.C. Carthaginians, Romans, Arabs, and Aragonese have ruled the island.

The wine industry is the island's principal economic activity. The island is well known for its sweet wines (passito), capers, and the Zibibbo grape. Air and ferry service connect the island to Sicily.

MADDALENA ISLANDS

A small archipelago on the north east corner of Sardinia merits mention. The island (11,200) is part of an archipelago that in-

cludes Caprera, Gallura and four other smaller islands. Caprera is famous as the final retirement home of Giuseppe Garibaldi, the revered leader of Italy's Unification.


BORROMEO ISLANDS

The Borromeo islands are a group of three small islands and two islets in the west arm of Lago Maggiore, the biggest of the four lakes straddling the border between Italy and its northern neighbor.

There are 200 inhabitants in the group, mostly in Isola dei Pescatori. The most famous is Isola Bella. The other islands Isola Madre and Isolino di San Giovanni are not as well known. Isola Bella is a popular tourist attraction, with regular ferry service from Stresa, Laverno, Pallanza and Intra. The annual Stresa Music Festival is held in the island.

Italy has many surprises in store for the visitor interested in the less traveled road. There is much to be explored and a lot to be learned about the culture, traditions, and thousands of years of history. Smaller islands are unique microcosms of yesteryear. You can find there long lost but not forgotten customs.

Ancient Tricarico


We recently received a book titled Per la storia di Civeta di Tricarico e di Calle, by Rev. Giovanni P. Daraio (c. 1954). The book is written in Italian and details the history of three cities.

The book begins with a general overview of the history of ancient Lucania, which once overlaid most of what today is Basilicata and parts of neighboring regions. Rev. Daraio then delves into specific towns, detailing the pre-Roman history of Civita, Tricarico and Calle. Civita has not survived, but the histories of Tricarico and Calle are detailed up through modern times.

The book contains detailed maps and diagrams, including coats of arms for all of the towns of Lucania, including Tricarico. If your family has roots in this area, this is a book you should take a look at. Although it's written in Italian, today's smart phones can scan and translate text at a basic level.

For its protection, this fragile book is only available for reference.

I have traveled to Italy to trace my family history. Surprisingly, my trip led me through several small towns; my Contadini ancestors must have migrated to find work. In two of those towns, I was offered similar books on local history. They are written by locals and contain details that we in the US do not have access to. I value these books immensely and





feel lucky to have one on Tricarico's history because I know many of our members' families emigrated from there.

Our Twila Venuti Library welcomes donations, especially items of local, West Coast Italian American history. We also welcome digital files (text or photos), and we are actively seeking family histories. Because our library is small, books that we cannot accommodate are passed on to other members or to public libraries, unless you request their return.

Books should be in reasonably good, clean condition. Like the Tricarico book discussed above, if the book is of historical significance, a damaged or fragile book may easily find room on our shelves.

THE VENICE SKETCHBOOK

Thanks so much to Rhys Bowen for sending me The Venice Sketchbook. It is a captivating book, and I did not skip a word. The sad beginning of a broken marriage and broken heart blossomed into a story of intrigue, historical drama, romance, heartache and true love.

Our protagonist, Caroline, received a mysterious bequest upon the death of her beloved great-aunt, the sister of her grandmother. She is given a sketchbook, 3 keys

and a single dying word "Venice," nothing more. Caroline decides a trip away may soothe her aching heart so she travels to Venice to scatter her Great Aunt's ashes. Armed with the sketchbook and keys, she is determined to solve this riddle which has totally captivated her (and me!) In doing so, happily her own private problems become resolved as well.

Through Caroline's quest, the entire story of Juliet's experience in Venice unfolds page by page from her first arrival as a young woman touring with her very Victorian Aunt. Her chance waterlogged encounter with a young aristocratic gentleman blossoms into a magnificent love story. Despite a rather surprising number of coincidental encounters as years pass by, the story is achingly real. War interrupts one visit, and Juliet becomes involved with the government as a low-level spy. I say, low-level, but as the story progresses, seriously dangerous.

The novel is beautifully written with just enough description of Venice to create a colorful pallet. Author Bowen clearly knows the city well, having spent time there in her youth. The story also has a wonderful completeness to it. From beginning to end the novel forms a complete and fulfilled circle. It is a very satisfying, enjoyable and intriguing read.

The word pendolare means to swing back and forth, to oscillate or to dangle. It is related to our word clock pendulum.

Commuters go back and forth to work, like the swinging of a pendulum.

- Tutte le settemane io pendolo tra San Jose e San Francisco. (verb) Every week I commute from San Jose to San Francisco.
- Mio marito e` un pendolare. (male) My husband is a commuter.
 La studentessa e` una pendolara. (female) The student is a commuter.
- Mi dispiace tantissimo fare la pendolare. I very much dislike commuting.

We can also use pendolare as an adjective.

- Io sono una maestra pendolara. (feminine adjective) I am a commuting teacher.
- Lui e` un lavoratrice pendolare. (male adjective) He is a commuting worker.








