La Festa della Repubblica Italiana

La Festa della Repubblica Italiana, the festival of the Italian Republic, is celebrated each year on the 2nd of June to commemorate the birth of the Italian Republic. At the end of WWII Italians were asked to vote for either a monarchy or a republic. On June 2nd and 3rd the majority of Italians voted for a republic. The result of this was that the ruling monarchs of the House of Savoy were exiled from Italy. Some of them have only recently been permitted to return. Eventually the Italian legislature passed Article 260 and declared June 2nd a national holiday, recognizing it as the date of the founding of the Italian Republic.

Like the 4th of July here in America, the country celebrates with festivities and parades. Italian embassies all over the world sponsor celebrations and Italian flag ceremonies hosting local heads of government in the festivities.

In Italy, this is the morning on which a wreath is placed at the Tomb of the Unknown Soldier in Rome, L'altare della Patria, following a military parade presided over by the President of the Republic who is also Commander-in-Chief of the armed forces.

Afterward, festivities continue in the public gardens of La Quirinale, the seat of the government, in the heart of Rome. There are musical performances by all the branches of the



military including the carabinieri and La Guardia di Finanza. The formal celebrations conclude with a dramatic fly-over by *La Pattuglia Acrobatica Nazionale*. Nine Italian military planes fly over the Monument to Victor Emmanuel, in tight formation, trailing smoke in green, white and red, the colors of the Italian flag.

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20th Anniversary of Una Storia Segreta:

The Secret History of Italian American Evacuation and Internment during World War II

Many third generation Italian Americans wonder at the silence of their grandparents. They wonder at how the Italian language can vanish so quickly from local schools and universities. They wonder at about their own Italian roots and history. And they search for answers within the context of history.

On March 23rd, 2014, I entered the Museo Italo Americano located at Fort Mason in San Francisco to hear a presentation by an expert on the Italian American internment experience in California during WWII. Immediately upon entering the

lecture room, my attention was caught by a yellow poster which read, "Don't Speak the Enemy's Language". In the center was a picture of Hitler, a Japanese person and an Italian, all speaking their native language from the cartoon bubbles above their heads. The Italian bubble read, "Bisogna distruggere la



Democrazia!" The line underneath the cartoon

La Festa di San Giuseppe - Grazie!

On March 19, the IAHF held its annual celebration in honor of the Feast Day of St. Joseph. It is a very special day for our community, both as Italian Americans and as residents of San Jose (San Giuseppe), the patron saint of our City too. In Italy, this is very much a special day as it is also considered Father's Day there as well as a Catholic Holy Day of Obligation.

The feast has its roots in Southern Italy, specifically medieval Sicily, where petitions were presented to St. Joseph to relieve a drought: the petitions were answered with life-giving rains to the countryside. Does the theme sound familiar today given the concerns of the damage a drought can do to a community? In grateful commemoration of that miraculous occasion, St. Joseph Day events have been a mainstay of the Italian American community for as long as all of us can remember, ranging from more elaborate feasts and "Tavole di San Giuseppe" like we have at the IAHF and others may have in Church auditoriums to garages and living rooms in the old neighborhoods.

Aside from the ceremony and traditions, including Mass which we traditionally celebrate at the IAHF prior to the "Table." what also stands out are the people who come from far and wide to experience this part of their heritage along with sharing the festa with family and friends alike. The event is "free" and open to all. Donations collected are shared with various local community charities.

Another part of this event is the hundreds of hours of volunteer time that go into making the Festa so special. There are several days of dedicated work that go into the beauty of the St.

The Italo Americano Crusaders Commentator OF 1938!

A rare time capsule emerges from San Jose's rich Italian American past. Thanks to Joe Catania and his sister ,who went through their dad's documents finding a copy of the April 1938 newsletter, Italo Americano Crusaders Commentator. Last December, Joe shared a copy of it with the IAHF. After some detective work we discovered a little about the document, but still need more information about the organization and how long it had continued. In the meantime, I wanted to give you this update. A first reading highlights a very well put together newsletter. It is a direct and organized newsletter wanting to recruit Italo Americans to be a part of the decision making process in San Jose, as well as uniting as a community for the political betterment of the interest of Italian Americans. In many ways the message is as relevant today as in those years, but I would have to say, "the stakes in 1938 were probably a lot higher and tougher."

A Google search of 1937-38 nationally and internationally, put Italy in the news associated with Germany as a "Hitler and Mussolini" duo, with Hitler acting in Poland and eastern Europe while Italy consolidated its invasion of Ethiopia and Albania. Both countries at the time were also involved in the Spanish Civil War supporting the dictatorship of Francisco Franco. On the home front the USA was still trying to dig its way out of the great depression, working on jobs, and fighting attacks on the "New Deal". It was a very politically divisive time, similar to today's political controversies.

Within this political arena, and locally, a group of "young" Italian Americans felt the need to organize the Italian American community as a political power in the community. And they did not mince words about their focus. They appealed to individual action, and not being connect to "machine politics" but to vote for their interest. They also called for being an educated voter, and getting over apathy or any alienation. These were their organizing points and it seemed direct and non partisan if sketchy on

programs. As an FYI, San Jose at the time, in 1936, incorporated Willow Glen as part of the city, and there was still fall out from the 1933 lynching in St. James Park.

Approximately 4 years later, San Jose and the nation found itself at war with Germany, Italy and Japan. The issue of enemy alienship was a concern in our community, and young Italian Americans were enlisting in mass into the armed forces, making one of the largest contribution to the World War II effort. It's no wonder the Italo Americano Crusaders Commentator went its way. Even so there certainly is a tale still to be told about its aspirations and dreams, of which are still with us today.

The Crusaders staff included Joseph Catania Jr., Dominic Navarra, and Vince Barone. The Officers included Dominic Navarra, John Orlando August Azzarello, Vincent Barone and Sal Turturicci. Fascinating too were the ads in the newsletter which included S.Dorsa of Hyde Park Meat Market, I Piazza of the Breakers, Barone's Service Station, Benny Laviano's shoe shop, Pete's Barber Shop, Ruiz's Shoe Store, Louis Gaitto's Garden City Window Shade Co. Anthony Campagna's Moderne Drug Co., Margalati's Market, Gus's Place, and finally Chiaramonte's Market. Incidentally our Cena Fuori for March was at Chiaramonte's; the only establishment still left of the advertisers, being one of the oldest continually run family markets in the USA! The Italo American Crusaders met at Crucifix Hall at 9th and Jackson Streets in San Jose, and most of the ads came from the 13th Street and Holy Cross neighborhood. Up to quite recently the most vibrant part of the Italian American community, and still fondly referred to as "the old neighborhood".

At the "Cena Fuori", at Chiaramonte's Deli last month we had some informal discussions about the paper, but more recollections are needed. If you have information about the Crusaders to share, or would like to have a copy of the newsletter contact me at the IAHF, 408-293-7122.

read, "The Four Freedoms Are Not in His Vocabulary". The large print following cautioned the reader to, "Speak American".

But this would not have concerned me or my husband's grandparents because they left Italy and arrived in the Boston, Massachusetts, before WWII. Soon after their arrival however, the Sacco and Vanzetti trials stirred anti-Italian sentiments in that city and beyond. At just this time, they were attempting to fit into their new country and raise a family. The desire to fit in was so strong that speaking Italian was forbidden in the home. The internment camps which followed over a decade later seemed a west coast experience. Or so we, the third generation, thought.

On this day, a Sunday, editor and contributing author of *Una Storia Segreta*, Lawrence DiStasi lead a presentation of a series of witnesses, who spoke about their experiences in California during WWII. They described how their family members were labeled "enemy aliens", how as children they saw their homes invaded by the FBI looking for contraband radios, flashlights, etc., and how their relatives were sometimes arrested. A few were sent to internment camps. Others had their fishing boats seized. Meanwhile their families were subjected to increasingly restrictive curfews. The individual stories much like those in the book, gave moving witness to the injustices experienced by Italian immi-

grants, which very few Italians spoke about, the secret story of what had happened. DiStasi explained that the State of California apology resulted in the national legislation, 'The Wartime Violation of Italian Civil Liberties Act...which became Public Law #106-451 in November 2000".

His book contains 29 chapters from various authors' perspectives and experiences, with two by DiStasi. There are 3 Appendices. Appendix C lists the locations and authority operating each facility. It was in this appendix near the very end of the book, the listing, "East Boston, Massachusetts" operated by "INS", was found. These words wrapped around me an understanding of interconnectedness of the Italian American experience. There was no escaping the fact that all our stories have a connection. My day at the Museo Italo Americano closed with a great sadness for my beloved mother-in-law, and her mother. Actions which barred Italian from the home and silence which kept secret the effects of history upon their lives. This temporary internment station was in their neighborhood, an Italian neighborhood. This experience was not isolated to the west coast. I felt a deep gratitude to the speakers and author Lawrence DiStasi for his work, which I believe, helps us all begin to better understand the silences kept by the generations before us. It is up to us and the next generations to reclaim our language in our schools and to research our heritage. We might find, that history has woven us all into one cloth.

New Books: Culture and Heritage in the Making

History is always in the making. So in May and June, the focus is on a small collection of books by the world famous Italian journalist and author Oriana Fallaci, of these postmodern times.



Author Oriana Fallaci

June 29, 1929 - September 15, 2006

Most Americans are not familiar with this name but in Italy was and is famous. Many of her books are still remain on bestsellers' lists internationally. During her lifetime she was recipient of awards, too many to list, both in Italy and worldwide. Fallaci was a fearless reporter over throughout her working life, beginning in WWII and ending in 2006. Her interviews were never objec-

tive but subjective. Oriana believed fiction was the best way to really tell the heart of the story so she often wrote through the lens of fiction as well as nonfiction about situations she had experienced first hand. Despite the fact she received death threats, she never hesitated to write. We have gotten a collection of her writings from various donors this month.

Letter to a Child Never Born (1975): A woman apologizes to the unborn child she carries the world into which the child will be born soon. In the process, the woman begins to ask herself about her own right to exist. But it is the child who decides ultimately. Fiction. (Out of Print)

Inshallah: A Novel (English) (1990): Insciallah: A Novel: (Italiano): Considered a masterpiece by some and outrageously biased by others, this fictional novel is about an Italian peace-keeping soldier stationed in Lebanon during the civil war.

The Rage and The Pride (2002) (English): La Forza della Ragione (Italiano): Fallaci was in her New York townhouse during 9/11/2001. This experience motivated her to write this book and a later follow up book The Force of Reason (2004). The Rage and the Pride remains on the bestsellers list in Italy. In these books, with her usual candor, she comes to terms with the question if East and West will every be able to meet on common ground. The book is in the form of a letter written to the reader. (Nonfiction)

Interviews with History and Conversations with Power (2011): This book is a collection of interviews and published her death. Fallaci was primarily a journalist. Henry Kissenger called his interview (included in this book) his "most disastrous conversation". He still referred to Fallaci as "a true Italian lady and a great journalist". (From the book cover.) Fourteen interviews are in the book, from leaders of the 1960's to 1970's. The interviews will keep the reader on the edge of their seats.


Oriana Fallaci: I'll Die Standing on My Feet is written by Riccardo Nencini, writer and politician, is an Italian bestseller. The author was a friend of Fallaci and the interview was taken shortly before her death in 2006 from cancer. In it, she gives the reader rare glimpses into her personality.
