Much of this newsletter is devoted to the House of Savoy, so it was particularly appropriate that this month's lunch recipes originated with the region held and greatly enjoyed by the Royal family. It is here that we find II Gran Paradiso, a magnificent and huge national park that at one time served as the private hunting ground for the Savoy family. It is one of the few places in southern Europe to see abundant wildlife in its natural habitat.

Our chef, Tino Burzio, came to the IAHF Cultural Center early in the morning and together with Ken Borelli, prepared a Val d'Aostan luncheon for 90 hungry members. Appetizers were crisp rye bruschetta spread with a blend of anchovies, fontina and parmesan cheese. This was followed by a risotto

laden with a meld of fontina and parmesan cheese, dotted with chopped sautéed turnips, all hot and bubbly. Seasoned croutons were passed for those who desired the embellishment. This was followed by a crustless quiche made of cabbage, cheese, eggs and cream. A succulent chicken dish, typically game in Val d'Aosta, was marinated overnight in red wine and garden herbs. This was served with a tasty, seasoned, baked apple. Apples, like fontina cheese and Arborio rice, are a product of the region.

Dessert was pizzelle, crisp, delicious, and made with a sweet kiss of honey.

Special thanks to Dave Perzinski who prepared a beautiful video of the area and to Tino who shared his knowledge of his magnificent homeland.

Join us on Thursday, May 17, when Lucia Clementi will introduce us to an exotic

part of Italian cuisine known as Arbreshe!

Since our Regional Lunch featured cooking from the Aosta Valley, I thought it would be a good Idea to share this bit of information with you.

This lovely area called Aosta is the smallest region of Italy and by far the least populated. It actually had negative population growth until the situation was recently reversed due to immigration. Val d'Aosta is in the northwest corner of Italy, bordering France and Switzerland. French and Italian are its official

languages and many residents speak the dialect which is a blend of the two.

Val d'Aosta is a skier's paradise with many famous ski resorts located there, most notably Courmayeur. You will probably recognize the name of its most famous mountain: Mont Blanc, which at



15,781 feet is the highest mountain in Europe... the roof of Europe! Monte Cervino which is the Italian side of the Matterhorn and Monte Rosa, which is the second highest peak also rise in this amazing region... absolutely breathtaking scenery! If you don't like hiking, cable car rides are offered year-round.

Val d'Aosta also boasts the magnificent Gran Paradiso National Park... one of the few places in southern Europe where it is possible to see wild animals in their

natural habitat: deer, ibex, chamois, eagles and marmots, ermine, weasel, hare, badger, wolf and lynx.

Having visited there several times I can tell you, it's just magnificent.

Our April cooking class was such a success and so much fun! We had close to thirty students in attendance to learn how to make "Muffaletta Sandwiches" (Muffaletta is pronounced, "moo-foo-LET-ta") and "Ricotta Fritters". Our guest instructor was Rose Steele who taught us these amazing recipes. You may ask, "what is a Muffaletta Sandwich"? I had never heard of one myself! These spectacular sandwiches are a New Orleans specialty. The bread consists of a huge 10 inch diameter round loaf. To make this sandwich you need an olive salad which you can buy in Italian grocery stores or if you're adventurous, you can make it yourself. I must warn you though, there are 12 ingredients, including olives, capers, onions, pepperoncini, garlic and spices, just to name a few. First, the olive salad is spread on the bread and then layered with assorted deli meats and cheeses. Each of our students had the opportunity to make the muffaletta sandwich and take a whole one home to enjoy later.

During next part of the class, we were taught how to make Ricotta Fritters. This delicious dessert consists of ricotta, chocolate chips (my favorite), flour and sugar. The mixture is rolled into balls, deep fried and dusted with powdered sugar. Need I mention that they were scrumptious? It was just the right dessert to end a perfect evening with wonderful company.

Dearest, thank you from the heart for your beautiful letter. Infinite wishes for your work! Happiness – Sophia Loren 2018










One Country Under Blood

by Antonio Ciano



I was honored to have received this e-book from the author and translator for inclusion in our newsletter. I was immediately fascinated by the book's premise, so I launched into it forthwith!

One Country Under Blood by Antonio Ciano states unequivocally that the unification of Italy was a crime perpetrated upon the South by the Piedmontese House of Savoy working with the Mafia and the Camorra.

Their call to action and arms was led by none other than Garibaldi himself... the man we were all raised to consider a hero!

The author describes the take-over of the South of Italy which was then called The Kingdom of the Two Sicilies and was under the control of King Francesco II of the House of Bourbon. The author is careful to document his claims of the wealth of the pre-subjugated South. He demonstrates that the South led the peninsula in advanced technology: railroad, telegraph, bridge-building, shipping and education. Life was good.

The Southerners fought gloriously to avoid being swallowed up by the North. The author describes in awful detail the murderous rampages of the northern troops, committing gross atrocities and finally beating the Southerners into submission. One particularly poignant chapter includes the surrender speech of the last Bourbon King, Francesco II in Gaeta, Latium, just south of Rome.

After the take-over, the riches of the South was systematically confiscated and transferred to the banks in the North and became the fuel for the industrial development of Lombardy (Milan) and Piedmont (Turin). The south was utterly neglected. Roads, canals, bridges, rail tracks, ports, schools... all were left to languish unfunded, unmaintained and unpoliced... a perfect climate for self-rule by the mafia.

It is no coincidence the exodus of the newly impoverished southerners out of Italy began after the unification.

I am grateful to this author for enlightening me. I spent several hours reading about the era from other sources and feel a deeper and greater appreciation for my southern Italian heritage._-- Article written by Linda Binkley

It is well known that Italian immigrants, the majority from the south of Italy, have prospered wherever they landed. Many people have wondered how it was that immigrants who came from such abject poverty could rise so quickly in a different environment. The facts of the history of the South of Italy, called the Kingdom of the Two Sicilies before the unification of 1860, help to explain this success story of immigrants, a story born out of a long and thriving history.

Until the unification of Italy in 1861, Italy, south of Rome, was the largest, most prosperous, wealthiest and populous of the Italian states. Nearly half of the world's Italians, both in Italy and abroad trace their roots to the The Kingdom of the Two Sicilies.

The Kingdom of the Two Sicilies has a very long history. It was founded in 1130 by Roger II, a Hapsburg prince. His more recent heir, Ferdinando II, was an authoritative but shrewd ruler. He sponsored various agricultural projects which were at the cutting edge for their time. For example, In 1832, he ordered the first differentiated refuse

collection in what is now Italy, with a focus on recycling glass. In 1839, he sponsored construction of the first railroad in Italy,

After the 1860 unification southerners were termed "backward" by northern politicians. Please look at these facts which speak for themselves:

First, compare the gold reserves of gold lire in millions of various states on the peninsula. You can see the southern districts in bold letters.

- Two Sicilies 443.2
- Papal State 90.6
- Grand Duchy of Tuscany 85.2
- Kingdom of Sardinia-Piedmont 27.1
- Venetia 12.8
- Lombardy 8.1
- Duchy of Parma 1.2
- Duchy of Modena .4

It has been suggested that to this day the Bank of Italy has one of the world's larger gold deposits thanks to the inclusion of the Neapolitan reserves of 1860 following the unification. Also, northern Piedmont had a much higher national debt at over a billion lire compared to 411 million for the Kingdom of the Two Sicilies. No wonder the North wanted to annex the South!

At the time of the unification census data shows that the South

led the peninsula in education. The former territory of the Kingdom of the Two Sicilies, with a population of some 7 million, had half of the total of Italian university students. (excluding Rome)

The North frequently referred to southerners as "landless peasants." Facts dispel this lie. Despite the presence of large estates held by the nobility, especially in grain-growing areas, most southern Italians of the eighteenth and nineteenth centuries owned their own homes and a garden or small parcel of land. The ready proof of this are the land tax records retained at Palermo's state archive. Those of 1748 and 1811 list numerous smallholders in each Sicilian town.

Look at this list of achievements in the Kingdom of the Two Sicilies relative to northern Italian states, during the nineteenth century immediately preceding the unification:


- First pension system in what became Italy (2% deduction from salaries)
- Most printing presses of any Italian city (Naples with 113)
- Lowest taxes in Italy
- Largest naval yards based on number of employees (1900 in Castellammare di Stabia)
- Largest iron and steel engineering/manufacturing plant in Italy (at Pietrarsa)
- Largest iron casting foundry in Italy (Ferdinandea in Calabria)
- Oldest continuously-active opera house in Europe, the San Carlo in Naples (1737, rebuilt in 1816)
- First university chair and department in economics (Antonio Genovesi, Naples, 1754)
- Dwarf planet Ceres first observed (Giuseppe Piazzi, Palermo 1801)
- First constitution in Italy (Sicily)
- First steamship in the Mediterranean, the Ferdinando I (1818)
- First glass recycling program (1832)
- First steel suspension bridge in Italy (Gagliano River in 1832, components from Mongiana Works)
- First gas-fueled public lighting system (1839)
- First railroad in Italy (1839)
- First seismic observatory in the world (Vesuvius 1841)
- First steamboat with screw propulsion in the Mediterranean (the Giglio delle Onde 1847)

- First functioning electric telegraph in Italy (1852)

- First submarine telegraph in Europe
- First military steamship in Italy (the Ercole)
- First maritime code in Italy
- First public housing complex/estate in Italy (San Leucio near Caserta)
- Highest per capita number of physicians in Italy
- First botanical gardens in Italy (Naples and then Palermo)
- First school for the deaf in Italy
- Lowest infant mortality rate in Italy (1850-1860)

It's good to be aware that there was a time, not long ago when Neapolitans and Sicilians were not just "southerners" of Italy but citizens of a proud, independent nation rooted in medieval history. In the wake of the fall of the Kingdom of the Two Sicilies and its annexation to the Kingdom of Italy, Neapolitans and Sicilians became "southerners" and the region's prosperity declined relative to that of northern Italy, spawning the Italian diaspora, the emigration of millions of Italians.

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

The volunteers from Prusch Farm Park have outdone themselves this season in growing hundreds of special tomato, pepper and eggplants for us to purchase. Many unusual as well as typical Italian tomatoes will be available along with expert growing instructions. Some varieties include: Aunt Rubies Green, Old Flame, Paul Robson, and the Italian Heirloom to mention a few.
