President's Message by Ken Borelli




The Forest for the Trees

As the old proverb goes, you really do have to step away from the trees to see the forest, and so it is regarding the vitality of Italian American life in the Santa Clara Valley. This observation was brought home to me this month when I was recently contacted by the President of the Patrons of Italian Culture, Paolo Romano, from the Los Angles area. There is a news release in this edition of the IAHF Newspaper giving you some of the details of their forthcoming event. Their Board will be holding their 2011 meeting in November in the San Jose area. Their mission is the promotion of Italian culture and heritage primarily in the Los Angeles area, but The Patrons also engage in regional efforts underpinning the importance of a broad base Italian American vision. The Patrons are attempting to connect their mission to our greater Western United States Italian American Community. They also work with the Italian Cultural Institute and Consul General's office for the Los Angeles/ Southern California area.

In our discussions, and, based on their news of our local Italian American community, they have decided to visit San Jose. And there lies the moment of awareness. In talking to Paolo, I had to do this mental inventory of Italian American life in our community. The Italian American Heritage Foundation's mission dovetails nicely with their goals. For many of us "in the trenches", sort of speaking, you never stop to realize where you are at, in this case, as an Italian American community, because you are frankly too busy with so many tasks that you fail to see the forest for your particular group of trees. My conversations with Paolo served as an unintended "time out", as I attempted to outline some engaging activities for their board to experience on their visit to Silicon Valley. After several e-mail exchanges, it soon became obvious with the growing list of activities and opportunities, that we really needed to limit our Santa Clara Valley Italian American experience to something doable for this four day visit.

I started to list artistic institutions, such as Opera San Jose and San Jose Rep, and went on to visits with local Italian American artists and

I then authors. went through the very long list of Italian American organizations that would love to engage and dialogue with the Patrons, along with many of the cultural establishments, and initiatives, such as the emerging Little Italy, the Sabatino Family Memorial Resource Center, the unique history of our Italian American community, a walk through the histori-



cal heart of old San Jose, the Casa Italiana at Santa Clara University (the University itself was founded by two Italian Jesuits and is the oldest institution of higher learning in California), along with the opportunities available in each of the various Italian American organizations such as The Italian Catholic Federations, Sons of Sicily, Italian Men's Club, Civic Club, Florence Sister County Commission, and on and on, including a visit to historic Holy Cross Church, St. Joseph's Cathedral, and some of the South Santa Clara County's Italian Family wineries and agricultural ventures, and not to single out one, so many wonderful and special Italian eating establishments. Paolo had to keep reminding me that they only had four days to engage our community! I did not even begin to tap into the special events and activities that each organization undertakes during their normal yearly schedule of events, each one worthy of an obser-

vation and comment, but the lesson was not lost on me.

As we are working on our particular activities, projects and events, try to take time out and reflect upon the bigger picture, in this case the interconnections and networks that make up our vibrant Italian American community in Santa Clara County. I think you will be very pleasantly surprised! I would be negligent, however, if I did not remind you of one of our own very special community event in my comments, our annual Crab Feed, on Satrurday, March 26! This fun-filled culinary experience helps support our foundation and hall

improvements. I hope to see you there, and, if you're unable to make it and want to donate to our hall improvement fund, "grazie tante" ...for a healthy forest you have to have healthy trees, so as we reflect on the big picture one is never far away from our particular program (as it should be). The Patrons of Italian Culture to Visit IAHF San Jose!

From November 10th to the 13th, the Italian American Heritage Foundation will be hosting The Board of the Patrons of Italian Culture on their visit to Santa Clara County in the Fall of this year.

The Patrons of Italian Culture is a fifty year old, non-profit organization headquartered in Los Angeles operating under the auspices of the Consul General of Italy, whose charter is to promote the Italian cultural experience in the Italian-American communities in Southern California. The Patrons offer many major cultural events each year, which are open to members and their guests. Previous events have



included numerous opera recitals and ballet programs, short plays, lectures on Italian art and architecture, and supporting Italian cinema. The Patrons have long standing collaborations with the Italian Cultural Institute in Los Angeles, The Getty Museums, as well as the Los Angeles County Museum of Art.

Last year in November, the Board of Directors held their 2010 Retreat in San Diego's Little Italy, and came back full of wonderful memories and terrific experiences. The 2010 retreat culminated a year long collaboration with the San Diego Italian Film Festival and was timed to participate in the SDIFF's Gala cinema program held Nov. 4 to 7. The Patrons were 'honored guests' at the SDIFF's Nov. 5 Gala reception held in the Museum of Photographic Arts in Balboa Park. Prior to the screening, a reception attended by more than 200 invited guests was held featuring Italian delicacies prepared by the finest chefs in San Diego. An assortment of fine Italian wines complimented the reception. Italy's Consul General, Nicola Faganello was on hand for this special event, as was San Diego's Vice-Consul, Roberto Ruocco.

The Patrons have selected San Jose as the host city for their 2011 Retreat and hope to continue their long standing practice of collaboration with the local Italian American community, reports Paolo Romano, Patron President. This interaction with other Italian-American organizations includes participating in the host cities events and festivals and thereby share our mutual heritage and history. Over the past years, the Patrons have made many great friends across the southwest U.S. and have referred many of their members and their families to these Italian-American organizations in order to further their experiences and promote their valuable resources. IAHF President Ken Borelli noted that "this experience in collaboration highlights so much of what our organizations are all about, and of promoting a common vision regarding heritage, culture and 'Italianita'. We we look forward not only to meeting our friends from Southern California, but also the equally important dialogue with the Patrons and our local Italian American community." More information will be forthcoming as event date unfolds.

Possible Congressional Gold Medal for Giuseppe Garibaldi

U.S. Congressional Joint Resolution Recognizing Italy's National Hero and Commemorating the 150th Anniversary of the Unification of Italy

Washington, D. C., February 22, 2011 - The National Italian American Foundation (NIAF) announces the introduction of a special Congressional joint resolution by Senator Mike Enzi (WY) in the U.S. Senate, and Representative Mike Grimm (NY), Representative Peter King (NY), and Representative Bill Pascrell (NJ) in the U.S. House of Representatives. Upon passage, the joint resolution will posthumously award a Congressional Gold Medal to the Italian national hero Giuseppe Garibaldi and officially recognize the Republic of Italy on the 150th Anniversary of its unification. NIAF has been the cooperating organization to develop this resolution with the U.S. Italian American Congressional Delegation (IACD) of the 112th Congress, of which the Foundation has served as an extension

for over 30 years.

"Every American shares great pride in the culture and heritage of Italy. Its richness is an important part of what we are as Americans today. This joint congressional resolution honoring Italy of Today is an appreciation for the values we have as Americans. Giuseppe Garibaldi was central to modern-day Italy from which we all have benefitted," said Hon. Frank J. Guarini, a former Congressman from New Jersey and NIAF chairman emeritus.

NIAF serves as the voice for Italian Americans, the nation's fifth largest ethnic group of nearly 25 million individuals, in Washington, D.C. while working closely with the IADC and the White House. We

trust that this important resolution will be swiftly passed and honor the outstanding contributions that Italians and Italian Americans have made throughout history and continue to make today.

The IADC also will host with NIAF an official congressional reception celebrating the 150th anniversary of Italy's unification on March 17, 2011, in the historic Mansfield Room (S-207), U.S. Capitol. Save The Date: The Una Storia Segreta Forum

On Sunday, April 10th, the IAHF will be presenting an open public forum to re-address the secret story, which became to be known as, "Una Storia Segreta,"which tells the story about the Italian-American's evacuation and internment during World War II, in co-sponsorship with the American Italian Historical Association, Western Regional Chapter (AIHA/WRC). Lawrence DiStasi, the AIHA/WRC's, Una Storia Segreta's project director and curator and distinguished author of the book, Una Storia




Segreta, will open the program with a preview of this secret wartime story and will also narrate and answer questions from attendees throughout the afternoon. Joe Simitian, California State Senator, will be attending and giving his discussion on C A State Senate Resolution, SCR 95, which was passed in August 2010, that acknowledged the injustices suffered by thousands of Italian- Americans who were classified by the FBI as "enemy aliens" and sent to detention camps located throughout California and the the United States.

Other notables such as, US Congressman Mike Honda, Congresswoman, Zoe Lofgren, Former US Transportation Secretary Norman Mineta, and US CIA Director Leon Pinetta, are also being invited to attend.

Victims of the internment and others who were affected will be given the opportunity to share their experiences with the audience, and answer questions. The forum will take place at the IAHF Cultural Center, 425 N. Fourth St., San Jose 95112, from 2 PM to 5 PM. Admission will be \$10 for adults with free admission for children 15 and under and free for students from grades 1 to 12. The enclosed flyer has further details for your planning convenience.

The original 1994 exhibit, Una Storia Segreta, which made national headlines when the FBI released it' secret files in 1994 on this war time's best kept secret, will be on display for the public's viewing, free of charge, in downtown San Jose at the Martin Luther King Jr. Library, located at 150 E. Tony Cortese Honored

Washington, D.C. – Today, Reps. Zoe Lofgren (D-San Jose) and Mike Honda (D-Campbell) celebrated the renaming of Westgate Post in San Jose after local labor leader Tony Cortese. Mr. Cortese, a graduate of San Jose's James Lick High School, served as President of the National Association of Letter Carriers

(NALC), Branch 193, for 27 years before his passing in 2007. Mr. Cortese is also widely known as the founder of the NALC Santa Clara County Food Drive, which served as the model for the NALC's national food drive. Over 18 years, letter carriers have collected over 1 billion pounds of food to feed the nation's hungry, and it all started with Tony.

"I was honored to have introduced the bill to rename the post office building after Tony," noted Rep. Zoe Lofgren. "Tony was a mediator and a leader who had the amazing ability to bring people together and was deeply respected by both management and his fellow letter carriers. While he is greatly missed, his name and legacy and commitment to his community will live on at the Anthony J. Cortese Post Office and the NALC's food drive."

"Having stood on the House floor in support of legislation to designate my district's Westgate Station Post Office in memory of my friend Tony Cortese, it is an honor to see it come to reality," noted Rep. Mike Honda. "Tony's tireless advocacy for letter carriers, and his four-decade legacy at the Postal Service, will never be forgotten; this naming ensures that. Serving as the President of the National Association of Letter Carriers Local 193, Tony accomplished much on behalf of San Jose's working families, expanding health benefits, procuring buildings and providing open forums for union members, community advocates, and local elected officials. This Post Office naming is the least we can do to honor Tony's countless contributions to our community."

Congresswoman Zoe Lofgren is serving her ninth term in Congress representing most of the City of San Jose and Santa Clara County. Congresswoman Lofgren is Chair of the California Democratic Congressional Delegation consisting of 34 Democratic Members of the U.S. House of Representatives from California.

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Il Gattopardo (The Leopard) Sunday, May 22, 2011 at IAHF

In recognition of the 150th Anniversary of the unification of Italy, there will be a special showing of *Il Gattopardo* (The Leopard), at the IAHF. This is a film classic set in the Sicily of the 1860's and those revolutionary times known as *Il Risorgimento*, including the origins of the famed March on Rome, by Guiseppe Garibaldi, starting with his "band of 1000" as they land in Sicily from Genoa, and completed the struggle for Italian unification. The movie is from the book by Guiseppe Tomasi, *Principe di Lampedusa*. The film features an international cast including Burt Lancaster, Claudia Cardinale and Alain Delon.

Based on a 1958 novel by Giuseppe Lampedusa, which is still one of the

all-time best-sellers in Italy, "The Leopard" is the story of a Sicilian count, Prince Don Fabrizio Salina (Burt Lancaster), who realizes his way of life is doomed during the outbreak of revolution in the 1860s that would unite the Italian provinces into one country, and begins planning for his family's survival. He adopts his nephew Tancredi's credo, which is: "For things to stay the same, everything must change." Part of that change is marrying off the pragmatic and ambitious Tancredi (Alain Delon) to Angelica (Claudia Cardinale), the beautiful daughter of a local official (Paolo Stoppa) whose newfound wealth and importance are a direct result of the new order. Visconti (1906-76) was born into aristocracy - his full name was Count Luchino Visconti di Modrone, and he came from one of Europe's oldest families. But in his 30s he became a Marxist; his ideology was in full force in one of the key films in the Neorealist movement, "La Terra Trema" (1948). © 2011 Hearst Communications &

"Italo-Argentino" February Regional Lunch & World Travels by Ken Borelli

February's regional lunch featured the fascinating culture and flavors of Italo-Argentino. The Republic of Argentina has one of the largest and most vibrant Italian communities outside of Italy itself. It is estimated over 25 million Argentinos have some degree of Italian descent, which come to about 60% of the total population of Argentina. Italo-Argentinos are an integral part of modern Argentina and their immigration pattern to Argentina predated the mass migration of Italians to the United States. The migration started in the 1850's, responding to the political turmoil in the pre-unified Italy of the times. More than an integrated experience, the culture has blended to become a part of the Argentine national character. At our lunch we had many IAHF members who's roots also included the Argentine connection. Our consultant for the afternoon, Beatriz Campal, lives in both worlds. She is an IAHF member, as well as a member of the Circulo Argentino, and as we networked at the luncheon, there was a lot of enthusiasm to plan for a joint IAHF and Circolo Tango Night for our members! Stay tuned as these events unfold and let me know if you would like to work on such a project (the other side of the coin). Also at the event was our friend Joe Cozzotorto, and his wife, Rose. Joe, who played the accordion at the luncheon, also shared tales about his own migration to Argentina after World War II. All of those present who lived in Argentina talked about *La Boca*, the name of a section of Buenos Aires that is the center of the Italian community in the capitol city. From all reports, Buenos Aires is truly one of the great world class cities, and definitely on my must visit list.

The meal itself included Argentine empanadas, salad, pasta Boglanese, sausage (chiorizzo) with chimichurri sauce, fruit and flan, all with a Valentine Day theme, courtesy of Norma Mestice and Carmella Gullo. And speaking of Chimichurri, a sauce used throughout Argentina, Uruguay, and now throughout South and Central America, is a blend of chopped parsley, minced garlic, olive oil, vinegar and red pepper flakes. There are many variations of the sauce and also included minced red bell peppers, tomatoes, lemon juice and other spices. You can check it out on the Internet, but this basic sauce is one of those legendary condiments with many variations. Interesting too, the name itself may have come from a concoction made by a Jimmy McCurry, an Irishman. Jimmy McCurry soon became localized to "Chimi-churri", at least that's how the legend of this signature dish goes.

EAST AFRICA, TOO: Our regional lunch tour now takes a month off for St. Joseph Day, March 19th, and continues on April 21, with a special East African Lunch that highlights the cuisine of Ethiopia and Eritrea, followed by a discussion of Italian East Africa and former Italian Colonies. As far as I am aware this is a first time discussion of this part of Italian history at the IAHF. We will begin to learn about this little known part of our Italian legacy and the luncheon will feature the blends of Italian and East African culture and foods. If you wonder about how Italy's colonial past influences us today consider, first of all that most of those former colonies are certainly in the news today, especially Somalia, Lybia and the Eritrean Ethiopian conflict. Interesting too, a friend sent me a copy of a book *La Paura di Verbicaro – storia di una rivolta nel sud: The Fear of Verbicaro*, by Felice Spingola. Verbicaro is my family's ancestral village located in Northern Calabria. The book talks about the draft riots of the early 1900's when many young Southern Italians were being drafted to fight in the new country of Italy's "catch up race" to have colonies in Africa. The only problem was many of these villagers, or *contadini*, dealing with life threatening issues such as starvation and cholera, did not particularly want to leave their families and livelihoods to fight in these sort of colonial wars. Draft riots throughout the south ensued and the central government in Rome came down hard on these *contadini*. Such was the case in Verbicaro. The book actually had the draft trial records, which included a who's who of immigrants from that particular part of Italy who migrated to San Francisco! Those immigrant experiences were replicated throughout the south of Italy. But history is what it is. We should know a little about this not to0 distant past. And of course, as we check out this part of our Italian history, we will also sample one of the more enjoyable byproducts, the foods of the region. Make your reserva



Dining was communal, the fork and china were not yet invented and food was eaten on slabs of stale bread called "trenchers". In the Papal and noble

courts of Italy, the Renaissance banquet hall could also be a place of political intrigue with rivals dispatched at table with a few discrete drops of arsenic called "The Liquid of Succession".

Bigné di San Giuseppe

Here is yet another sign that spring will soon be here!

Although this sign is neither a change in temperature nor returning migrating birds or early blooming flowers. To the joy of all those with a sweet tooth, this sign can be eaten.

These are *zeppole* in other parts of Italy, where they are usually of made of denser dough and are occasionally prepared savory, too. In Rome, however, they are called *bigné di San Giuseppe*, light, puffy, wee clouds of... sheer gluttony that begin to appear in most pastry shops a few weeks before March 19th, the Saint's day.

Step 1: deep-fry some sugared butter and egg-based batter. Remove from oil once they puff up.

Step 2: fill to the gills with pastry cream (butter, sugar, and eggbased). Then, because they're light on sugar and still too low on calories, cover with powdered sugar before serving!

When you eat your first one during those few weeks that they're available, it is hard not to have a "Why aren't you made year-round!?" moment. Given their nutritional value (!?), good thing they aren't, actually. By the time San Giuseppe actually rolls around you'll have eaten so many (a bigné binge?) that 48 weeks of bigné-abstinence is the absolute minimum.

But what a treat! "Un altro bigné con il cappuccino?" ("Another bigné with your cappuccino?") says the *barista* with a devilish smile. Oh well, it'll be easy to work them off soon... spring's coming, right? **

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
