# President's Message

Dear Members and Friends of the IAHF,

While we enjoyed a wonderful celebration of the Festa della Repubblica in June, somehow Columbus Day slipped by almost unnoticed. Columbus was a great explorer who defied the knowledge of the time, demonstrated extreme mastery in commanding a flotilla across uncharted waters - without the aid of known navigational techniques, quelling the fears of his crew, to accidentally discover the Americas.

Sadly, the Italian American community seems to be on the defensive again by those who want to ignore this miracle of adventure and navigation and point only to the claims of injustice against the indigenous people already inhabiting the islands. While this may be the case, it is important to put these actions in perspective

with the times. At that time, Europe was just coming out of the Middle Ages, conquest, with rape, slavery, torture, and all forms of debauchery were the order of the day. Before that, the Catholic Church had embarked on centuries of Crusades, and while they claimed to be spreading the word of God, it was quite different than the lessons the Church embraces today. The atrocities attributed to Columbus are wrongfully blamed on the Italian community, for his voyage was sponsored by the King and Queen of Spain, and he sailed under the Portuguese flag. His instructions, command, and reign in the New World were not from Italy, but from Spain and Portugal.

It might also be noted that the devastation of the indigenous people of the Americas, is more likely attributed to the subsequent conquests of Cortez and other explorers, and the introduction of smallpox and other diseases to the inhabitants. And the indigenous people practiced live human sacrifice rituals, responsible for tens of thousands of sacrifices, and evidence indicates the rituals involved cannibalism. Again, this is just to frame the order of the time.

History should be changed where it is found to be inaccurate, but not where it is just inconvenient. It is the atrocities of the past that compel us to frame a better future. While I am not against a day to honor and celebrate the indigenous people of America, it does not need to be done at the cost of striking Columbus from history and ignoring the magnitude of his discovery.

At the regional lunch for Calabria, Ken Borelli made a good point about history – that if you looked at pre-Columbian times, there were no tomatoes in Italy. Think about this for a moment, no red pasta sauce, no red sauce for pizza, no caprese salad, no tomato base at all. Does this sound Italian? It was through discovery and trade the world has been shaped.

Many think the Italian American Heritage Foundation is all about celebrating Italy, but it is also about celebrating America. Our walls are covered with stories of Italian Americans and the stories on the walls show the positive influence we have brought to Santa Clara Valley. They are stores of Americans who happen to be of Italian ancestry.

As Americans, we celebrate Thanksgiving as a holiday based on reaching out to the indigenous peoples of the region long after Columbus' first voyage and the desecration of the empires of the Mayans, Aztecs, and Incas. Whatever the original intentions of the holiday, we now consider it a time to reflect and be thankful for the graces we enjoy. Whatever our circumstances, we look for the good and are thankful. For myself, my thanks come in the form of the completion of chemotherapy for Marie, a clean mammogram, a successful hip replacement, and the wonderful support of friends and family though her year long ordeal. For the IAHF, I am thankful for the incredible dedication of our Officers, Board of Directors, Chairs, Volunteers, and supporters.

Let us look to the future as an opportunity. Let us leave our mark as a footprint worthy of following. Let us find the good in others and promote good will as best we can. 

# **Atoms In The Family**

Since Enrico Fermi has been a bit in the news due to celebrations in honor of his birthday, it is my pleasure to review this delightful book for you.

Physics is a topic so far out of my realm that I honestly expected to be bored by this book. I was so wrong. In fact, Atoms in the Family is a delightful story of a magnificent man who met life's challenges as well as academic challenges with whole-hearted

determination and abundant good humor. The book is an absolutely non-threatening read for the lay reader; but, at the same time, any true physicist would be delighted by this intensely human portrait of the Father of the Nuclear Age nicknamed The Pope by his peers for his infallibility in his research and theories.

We see him from his wife Laura's point of view. Friends from child-hood, there is no better person than Laura to bring this brilliant man to life for us. For Italian Americans, Fermi is worth remembering as he was the greatest Italian scientist since Galileo.

Laura brings us through three decades of her life with Fermi, high-lighting his self-direction during his elementary and high school years; then the university in Rome where he blossomed. During his teaching days in Rome we learn of his amazing experiments as he bounded into the world of quantum physics. His brilliance and the success of his experiments led to Enrico Fermi's Nobel Prize.

And the prize was really a lifesaver. All this occurred during the terrible time of the rise of fascism and the persecution of the Jews. Laura Fermi was Jewish and had it not been for their permit to travel to Norway as a family to receive the prize, she and their children would have suffered deportation to a concentration camp.

Safely out of Italy, the family left Norway and went to the United States joining a rather large group of European scientists fleeing Nazism. As a professor at the University of Chicago, in 1942, Fermi's team achieved what no one had done before - a nuclear chain reaction.

From this point, as World War II is raging, we find Fermi and his fellow scientists in Los Alamos, New Mexico, as part of the Manhattan Project where they developed the atom bomb using Fermi's nuclear chain reaction. In later years, after the war, Fermi firmly opposed the development of the hydrogen bomb. The morality of it became an issue as did some of the technical factors of its production.

Enrico Fermi's legacy, however, goes far beyond the bomb. It manifests itself in all aspects of physics leading to advances in medicine, space exploration and even computer technology. Who knows how much more Fermi could have contributed? He died quite young, 54, from stomach cancer. He left his wife, Laura, and two children, Nella and Giulio.

The book is also delightful for its photographs from the 20's and 30's. Laura looked so darling in her cloche hat. And Enrico appears so lively and sociable. I had a good friend, a Ph.D. physicist, who taught at the University of Chicago and had Fermi's desk. He kept an artifact from it engraved with Fermi's name as a memento which he proudly displayed in his home.

# • > ROBERT HALUPKA, III • WINNER OF A \$1,000 BORELLI SCHOLARSHIP <



My name is Robert Halupka. I am a senior attending Bellarmine College Preparatory in San Jose, CA. While I am only a quarter Italian from my grandmother, my father has shared his mother's family history with me to keep her memory alive. Unfortunately, I never knew my father's mother, Rosario Rich "Ricci" Halupka. She passed away two years before my birth after a short battle with cancer. Her husband, my grandfather, Robert help

raised me, and always stated that he felt more Italian because of the love and acceptance from my grandmother's family.

My grandmother's father, Giovani Baptista Ricci my great-grand-father, immigrated to America from Bari, Italy in the early 1900's. After working a few years, my great-grandfather was able to bring his young wife, Amelia Verilli Ricci, from the same village to join him in his new country. Their fourth child, my grandmother was born in Bridgeport, Connecticut in 1927 and named Rosario Rich. Years later, my grandmother Rosario, or Rose as she was called by her friends

and family, married in the Holy Rosary Church located in Bridgeport. A year and a half later, my father was baptized in the same church. My grandparents stressed the importance of a higher education to my father at an early age. They both worked to provide him a parochial education, and later Jesuit high school education at Fairfield College Preparatory School in Connecticut.

My own Jesuit high school's motto contains the phrase "men for and with others." We strive to not only be intellectually challenged by the school curriculum, but we also reflect on how best to use our own gifts to be a service for others. While I have had the opportunity to serve in schools, libraries, at HOPE Charity and a retirement home, I take great satisfaction in volunteering most at the Silicon Valley Humane Society in assisting in the care of abandoned or lost animals. I have had the privilege in helping in several roles at the Humane Society.

In the last four years, I have been a Summer Camp Counselor for elementary and middle school children teaching the importance and responsibility of taking care for small animals such as cats, dogs, and rabbits. I have served as a mentor for new Camp Counselors helping them with their training in preparation for camp rota-

tions. During this school year, I volunteered for laundry duty so that the veterinary techs have the opportunity to spending more time with the animals rather than doing a chore that takes away their valuable time. My two-hour shift flies by as I fold laundry, fill and run two washing machines and dryers, and distribute the clean cloths and blankets to the kennels.

This leads me up to my desire to help or improve our society by continuing my interest in infrastructure and transportation by studying Civil Engineering in college. Why do I want to study Civil Engineering? At an early age, anything scientific captured my mind, from reading about experiments in my mom's old science textbooks to children's scientific magazines. I will never forget the time I begged my mom to buy me the materials I needed for a science experiment: Diet Coca-Cola and Mentos. Mixing the two ingredients together inside the cola bottle caused it to rocket into the air, leaving a trail of foam with the smell of soda pervading the air. In that moment, I understood how combining two objects, called reactants, could cause a chemical reaction that would launch the soda several feet high! Watching the spray splash down onto the asphalt road, I realized I was hungry for more experiments and knowledge.

Deciding to test my developing passion for Civil and Materials Engineering, I flew to Johns Hopkins University for an Engineering Innovation program. The month-long intensive introduction to engineering courses strained me to my limits with math, science and

engineering. When the time for the final project came, the smell of epoxy filled my nose and lungs, pervading the room and mixing with dry smell of broken, uncooked spaghetti. All twenty members of our class were bent over in groups of four, working to build our bridges, calculating angles, tensile strength and weight. We needed the bridge to successfully carry 6 kilograms due to penalties in design. On the last day after a week of work, we kneeled next to our bridge in front of an audience of our peers and parents. We added one one-kilogram weight after another until we were one kilogram away from our goal of seven. We held our breath as we carefully placed the last weight then watched as the timer counted the seconds and the weight displayed. As the bell rang, my team got up and celebrated, filled with satisfaction for our achievement.

Looking back, it is easy to see how my journey in science coupled with a passion for Urban Planning played a role in developing my future career in Civil Engineering. Tackling the growing pressures of the housing market combined with the overly congested roads in Silicon Valley, I know I want to be part of a career that enables me to look for ways to create a healthier and safer environment for other people and the planet as a whole. Following the Roman Catholic tradition, my Jesuit education and my school's goal to produce a "man for and with others" who possesses a faith that does justice, I know my own journey is just beginning.

# • > WILLIAM MARCH • WINNER OF A \$1,000 IAHF SCHOLARSHIP <



I am of Italian American descent. My mother and father are half Italian, as each of their mothers is Italian. Both maternal and paternal great-grandparents came over from Italy around 1900-1910, the Martinis and Rinaldos.

My grandparents and parents have bestowed upon me what it means to be Italian through love of family and faith. The appreciation of my family and extended family grew through weekly dinners and visits with them, and through

understanding what it took for each family to come to the US for a better life. I gained knowledge and appreciation of traditions by way of cooking Sunday (or weekend) dinners, and learning what it means to spend time with each other. I spent a great deal of time with both my Nonnas. They taught me to appreciate the food we eat and how we grow it.

I believe this is why I have enjoyed participating in the theater program. Each production we do involves many students and adults. Time is spent together every day for several months, including many weekends, working alongside for hours, sharing meals, and getting to know each other. They have become my second family. This sense of family has played a very big role in my life. I believe I owe the love of family, knowing what it means to be part of something greater, to my parents and grandparents.

I joined the theatre department as a Drama 1 student in my sophomore year and participated in several high school theatre productions over the past three years as Tech Crew and most specifically as one of the Stage Managers for the past two years. I also participated in a few after school programs such as Showcase and Open Mic nights. I am currently in several school clubs. I am the current Drama Club President, the historian for the Thespian Club, after becoming an inaugural member of Troupe 8455 in my sophomore year, and also involved in the Plus Club. During the summer and just before the start of my junior year, I participated in the Willow Glen Teen Drama Camp theatre production of "Heathers the Musical."

# An Introduction



There are old, out-of-print books on

history and customs, alongside books by contemporary authors. There is also a healthy selection of fiction, including murder mysteries set in Italy.

I have to remind myself to stay focused while I catalog the books, because I want to take so many home to read from cover to cover. # ◆ IN POMPEII, SCIENTISTS UNEARTH GLADIATOR FRESCO



Archaeologists have unearthed a stunningly realistic fresco of gladiators in action amid ongoing excavation work in the ruins of Pompeii. The vibrant blue, red and gold fresco, which measures three feet by 4.5 feet, is in an area that's not currently accessible to visitors. "Probably the fresco decorated a place used by gladiators as a watering hole..." said Massimo Osanna, director general of the archaeological park.

"Of particular interest in this fresco is the extremely realistic representation of the wounds," said Osanna, adding that the outcome of the fight is unknown. The losing gladiator is holding up his finger to "implore for mercy," he added.

The fresco was found in what scientists believe was a tavern frequented by gladiators. (AP)

According to Phys.org, a "Murmillo" fighter wearing a plumed, wide-brimmed helmet with a visor is seen holding a large shield and a sword (gladius). Nearby lies the shield of a defeated "Thraex,", a Thracian fighter, who has clearly suffered a deep wound.

As part of a multimillion-dollar project funded by the European Union, Pompeii is undergoing an extensive excavation, with archaeologists removing tons of debris from long-buried parts of the city. Italy's culture minister, Dario Franceschini, hailed the discovery on Friday, noting that "a few years ago Pompeii was known around the world for its negative image. ... Today's story is one of redemption."

The ancient Roman city, near Naples, was buried by volcanic ash and pumice with the fierce eruption of Mount Vesuvius in A.D. 79. By Christopher Carbone / The Associated Press contributed to this story. -- Article submitted by Linda Binkley



# An Evening with West Valley Opera's Dabucco

Thanks so much to Ken Borelli for arranging a lovely evening for us all at the Lucy Stern theater in Palo Alto. The evening was a great success viewing and hearing Giuseppe Verdi's fine opera, Nabucco. Roy Stephens as Nabucco, the Assyrian King Nebuchadnezzar, gave us an extraordinary performance. Bearded and be-jeweled he presented the role in mighty voice and immensely entertaining character. Mr. Stephens is a world-class opera singer having sung in opera houses throughout the

world, including the New York Metropolitan Opera.

All the singers were delightful, but the role of Abigaile, sung by Christina Major, was truly powerful. It was sung by a strong woman dressed in a strong costume with a strong and enduring voice. Quite truly remarkable.

Nabucco is the opera which established Verdi's career. First performed at La Scala, Verdi said it was "born under a lucky star." The story follows the historical episode of the Assyrian conquest of the temple in Jerusalem, the distressing exile of the Jews and then develops into a dramatic fictionalized romantic plot which ultimately changes the course of history.

The chorus, which included IAHF member Dan Burns, sung by the exiled Jews "VA, pensiero, sull'ali dorati" (Fly, thought, on golden



wings) is the opera's most recognizable piece. Some of the words to this chorus are passionately patriotic which contributed to its great popularity in Italy during the years of the fight to oust foreign rulers from the country, north and south, and to unify the country.

Along the streets of Milan, as Verdi's funeral procession passed, bystanders spontaneously sang the chorus and then later, when Verdi's tomb was moved to its permanent spot, a youthful Arturo Toscanini conducted

a choir of 800 singing what is now the famous Va, pensiero patriotic hymn.

The musical presentation was excellent, and the Lucy Stern theater delivers smooth acoustics. The conductor Jose' Luis Moscovich brought out the best in his musicians and was particularly welcoming to the audience. West Valley opera has been delighting us with grand opera since 1956!

Those of us who stayed a bit afterward were invited back stage where we were able to mingle bit with the cast and especially congratulate our IAHF member, Dan Burns, who, besides singing in the chorus had the rather exciting role of threateningly holding a sword to the neck of a lead character, Fenina. Happily, he was disarmed!



October's regional lunch featured Calabria. As it was the last one of the year, I had wanted to feature some selections from my book Flavors From A Calabrese Kitchen. What was so special about the lunch was the "process" of the food preparation. It was and is a family effort. Regardless of the region we prepare our lunches from, they all take a walk down memory lane, and the foods we all grew up with. As with other favorite lunches this sense of family came through in true form.

This year's event saw a special crew, Kathy and Larry Lohman, Pauline LoMonico, Cheryl Burger and Marie Dalldorf came in a day before the event to make about 100 braciole, which were then braised and simmered in a sauce premade the day before by Joe Lucito and me. In other words, the lunch was a threeday process, with a lot of division of labor.

The menu included a special antipasti of roasted peppers, warmed olives and almonds, lupini, and a dish of tarali per table. Kathy Lohman prepared over 100 taralli for our guests. The week before she also taught a class on taralli making. While she used the recipe from my book she has refined it through practice and makes them so much better than me. The specialty dishes included:

- Green salad with fennel
- Calabrese soup with rapini, fava and spinich in a meat broth
- Imported cavatelli pasta in a rich tomatobased sauce with braciole
- Citrus-flavored ricotta , amaretti biscotti, semifreddi (parfait)

Helping to make the salad was Maria Bandy and Kay Virgilio and included a variety of greens and fennel. From my perspective, the Minestra was a pure antioxidant vitamin pill(!) with a medley of greens (rapini, chard, spinach) along with potato and mushroom, in a chicken broth. One of these days I would love to have a lecture on the nutri-







tional value of the Mediterranean diet since so much of food science highlights its attributes. I am thinking too of the rich tomato sauce, not only does it taste good, but tomatoes, per se, are a rich antioxidant.

Part of the "Calabrese Family" of volunteers for the day also included Dorothy LoPresti, Dave Perzinski, Lucia Clementi, Stanley Olivar, Jan Prinzivalli, Linda Felice and Sandi Strouse. Maria Gloria our IAHF member from San Francisco, donated some Calabria Tea Towels, and we have a couple left for a donation of ten dollars, to help defer the expenses of the regional lunch.

Likewise, I shared two books Norman Douglas's Old Calabria, and a book about the history of Calabria, during the Napoleonic wars, which basically redefined Southern Italy. The book is called The Most Monstrous of Wars, by Milton Finley. In addition, we had a video sent by relatives from my ancestral town, Veribicaro, Prov. Cosenza, and I referenced a study called "La Paura di Veribicaro" about the 1890 draft riots, when young men from the "mezzigiorno" (Southern Italians) were drafted to fight in Libya and East Africa.

A very special treat was a surprise "show and tell" by Sandi Strouse who brought her mom, Norma's, regional costume. Norma purchased it on a visit to Calabria and is now a family heirloom. Italian regional costumes are a whole subject in itself and would make a great program if someone has the expertise and willingness to share!

Next year we are already lining up some spe-

cial regional lunches. There is also an open invitation for you to share your regional traditions at the lunch. We have a staff of great volunteers willing to help support you, and a great library to secure educational materials too. While this is our last regional lunch of the year, the holiday lunch is part of the series and that will be on Thursday, Dec. 19, 2019. -- Article by Ken Borelli



In October, a group of us gathered at the IAHF for a Taralli class taught by master baker, Kathy Lohman. To fill you in, taralli is an interesting cross between a biscuit and a bagel. The recipe is included in Ken Borelli's cook book and surprisingly enough, Ken gladly admits that Kathy makes taralli better than he does! This southern Italian specialty goes well as a snack, paired with coffee, tea or a nice glass of vino! Not only that, but dunking is encouraged!

Kathy began the class by talking about the ingredients that go into the taralli, including flour, oil, eggs, yeast, fennel seed and salt. She demonstrated mixing the dough and told delightful stories along the way. After the dough was mixed and kneaded, it was covered and kept warm for about an hour so that it would rise. Once it was ready, the dough was rolled out and worked into various shapes. This is where the class flexed their creative skills by making round, pretzel and other interesting shapes for the taralli.

Next, we all convened to the kitchen for the second part of the class. Here, the raw dough shapes were blanched in boiling water, removed, and placed on cookie sheets for baking. They were baked for about 20 minutes until they turned a light golden brown. By that time, they were popped out of the oven and sampled by our eagerly awaiting students. They were soft, hot and flaky, right out of the oven and enjoyed by all.

Thank you to Kathy Lohman for sharing her phenomenal baking skills with us and to her wonderful crew, including Larry Lohman, Rose O'Brien, Jessica Cole, Debbie Alton. Your help saved us time and energy!

Our last class of the season will be our annual Italian cookie class, scheduled on November 7<sup>th</sup>. So sorry folks, but this popular class is sold out. Please tune in for the new 2020 cooking class schedule which will be announced in February. Grazie mille!

Somebody got angry about that, because it was Everybody's job.



What an exciting time for the Sbandieratori who returned to their beloved Faenza, Italy and prepared to participate in the Italian Championship held there. Two Italian guests, Ilaria Minghetti and Franca Lippi hosted by Jan Prinzivalli, provided details about the event and the two amazing photos below.

What a treat to have these accomplished flag wavers and musicians perform at our Italian Family Festa this past August, and then return to Faenza to win the Italian Championship! Tanti compliment a Faenza Sbandieratori!

Faenza is divided into five districts: Verge (green), Rosso (red), Nero

(black), Giallo (yellow), Nero (black), and Bianco (white). formerly Borgo Durbecco that compete. In June, Faenza's districts competed in two types of competitions: one with flags and musicians and another with horses. Flags and musicians performed in the square of Faenza while the horse races took place at the Faenza Stadium. The winners of the flags' and musicians' competitions in June are then admitted to the Italian Championship which took place in September. This event happens in a different Italian City each year.

This year Faenza hosted the championship on September 13<sup>th</sup> through 15<sup>th</sup> with over a thousand Italians traveling to Faenza from all over the Italy. During the three-day competition, the local hosts were responsible for feeding the groups lunch and dinner. According to Franca and Ilaria, the event was a great success and a meeting of old friends.



The competitions were in different types of specialties: 'solo performer' i.e. one flag waver performing alone; 'couple-performers' i.e. two flag wavers performing together and they must throw flags to each other; 'little team performers' of six flag wavers performing together and who must throw flags among themselves; 'big team performers' of twelve or sixteen flag wavers performing and throwing flags among themselves. In every specialty, the flag wavers were judged for the number of flags they move, for the difficulty of the throws, and for the artistic nature of the movements. In every specialty, musicians

play accompaniment, but in the "big team performers" the flag-wavers and musicians are judged together for sound and choreography. In the championship competition, Faenza won two titles: the best solo performer, and the combination title for the sum of the scores of every specialty

The IAHF plans to create a cookbook of Italian regional dishes with a section for recipes provided by our Faenza Sbandieratori guests. While we have already received some recipes, we are asking host families to reach out to their guests and ask them if they would like to submit a recipe or two for the cookbook, along with their photo. I LIVED THROUGH THESE HORRIBLE MISTREATMENTS AND I REMEMBER THEM WELL. WHAT WE WERE FORCED TO ENDURE WERE THE FOLLOWING: WE WERE FORCED TO ENDURE A NIGHTLY CURFEW, WE WERE FORCED TO ABIDE BY TRAVEL RESTRICTIONS, WE HAD TO CARRY ON OUR PERSON ITALIAN "ENEMY ALIEN" BOOKLETS FOR

IDENTIFICATION, FORCED TO ALLOW F.B.I. AGENTS TO SEARCH OUR HOMES FOR SIGNALING DEVICES, "ENEMY ALIEN" DEEP SEA FISHERMAN HAD THEIR FISHING BOATS CONFISCATED BY THE NAVY WITH NO COMPENSATION, 10,000 ITALIAN 'ENEMY ALIENS" WERE FORCED TO BOARD UP THEIR HOMES AND WERE FORCED TO EVACUATE TO INLAND AREAS WITH NO COMPENSATION, THE SAME WITH 2000 LIVING IN PITTSBURGH, CA. THERE WERE HUNDREDS TO THOUSAND ITALIAN "ENEMY ALIENS" WHO WERE ARRESTED BY THE F.B.I. AND SENT TO INTERNMENT CAMPS THROUGHOUT THE UNITED STATES.

OUR GOVERNMENT MADE ALL OF THE DOCUMENTS RELATING TO THESE MISTREATMENTS AND INJUSTICES CLASSIFIED INFORMATION TOP SECRET FOR 65 YEARS.LESS THAN 3% OF OUR ENTIRE AMERICAN POPULATION HAVE ANY KNOWLEDGE OF THESE HORRIBLE HAPPENINGS. WE MUST NOW EDUCATE OUR AMERICAN PUBLIC ABOUT THESE HORRIBLE HAPPENINGS AND RECEIVE THE APOLOGY THAT WE RIGHTFULLY DESERVE.

CONGRESSWOMAN ZOE LOFGREN HAS INTRODUCED CONGRESSIONAL BILLS H.R. 3913 (WHICH ASKS FOR A MONETARY EDUCATIONAL GRANT OF \$3,000,000) AND H.R. 3914 (WHICH ASKS FOR AN APOLOGY FROM OUR GOVERNMENT). TO YOUR 116TH CONGRESS. WHAT WE ASK FOR IS WELL DESERVED AND LONG OVERDUE. THIS IS A HUMAN RIGHTS ISSUE.

I WOULD LIKE TO ASK FOR YOUR SUPPORT PLUS THE SUPPORT OF ALL OF OUR ITALIAN AMERICAN HERITAGE MEMBERS. I WOULD LIKE TO ASK THAT THEY TAKE A MOMENT OF THEIR PRECIOUS TIME AND CONTACT THEIR CONGRESSMAN AND ASK HIM/HER TO SEND BOTH OF THESE BILLS WHICH ARE NOW IN COMMITTEE TO THE HOUSE FLOOR FOR A VOTE, TO VOTE YES IN FAVOR OF EACH, AND MAKE THEM LAW. YOUR CONTACT MAY BE MADE EITHER BY PHONE, LETTER, OR E-MAIL.

AGAIN, OUR GOVERNMENT MADE THESE HORRIBLE MISTREATMENTS AND INJUSTICES CLASSIFIED INFORMATION TOP SECRET FOR 65 YEARS. WE MUST NOW EDUCATE OUR AMERICAN PUBLIC ABOUT THESE HORRIBLE HAPPENINGS AND RECEIVE THE APOLOGY THAT WE RIGHTLY DESERVE. THE AMERICAN JAPANESE RECEIVED AN APOLOGY FROM OUR GOVERNMENT IN 1988 FOR THE MISTREATMENT THEY WERE FORCED TO ENDURE. THE APOLOGY WAS MUCH DESERVED AND LONG OVERDUE.

WE ITALIAN SURVIVORS BELIEVE THAT IN MANY WAYS OUR 600,000 ITALIAN "ENEMY ALIENS" WERE MADE TO SUFFER AS MUCH AS THE JAPANESE.

OUR ENTIRE NATION MUST BE EDUCATED ABOUT THE MANY MISTREATMENTS AND INJUSTICES THAT WERE FORCED UPON OUR ITALIAN "ENEMY ALIENS."
