President's Message

Dear Members and Friends of the Italian American Heritage Foundation,

Thanks so much to those of you who have taken the time to share your thoughts and ideas with me. Your ideas keep our Foundation vibrant. Keep them coming!

In January I began working toward some of the goals I have set to accomplish for the IAHF. The backyard project is moving forward. I realize that many of you are not aware of our spacious barbecue area outdoors behind the stage and extending to both sides of the building. Ideas welcome!

My desire to develop a good working relationship with Little Italy has also blossomed. I have met

with their Events Director and we are attempting to arrange two events together. You will be hearing about these very soon.

Expanding hall usage is a challenging goal. Saturday nights are very nearly booked solid but mid-week the hall sits empty. As a first step we have placed the IAHF hall on a website called Peerspace. The site is for business people looking for a place to hold meetings. The IAHF is available weekdays. Spread the word among your business-related friends and family.

My plan to work with Ken Borelli to expand our involvement in the Fine Arts was partially realized on Saturday, February 10, at Le Petite Trianon Theatre. A sell-out crowd which included about 60 IAHF members enjoyed an evening of Italian music with the Mission Chamber Orchestra under the baton of Maestra Emily Ray and with the vocals of Pasquale Esposito. The performance was superb. Also, regarding the Fine Arts, the IAHF is reserving one scholarship for a student moving on to a four-year institution to study the Fine Arts. On another note, together with many members of the Italian American community of San Jose, I attended a disastrous City Council meeting regarding the fate of the hand-carved, marble statue of Christopher Columbus. Dressed as a navigator, he stands humbly with his charts and scopes. It was gifted at great expense to City Hall in the fifties by the Italian American community. A group called the Brown Berets is demanding its removal from public eye. We were scheduled to present our thoughts at 2:30 PM but in fact were not invited up the podium until 9:15 PM! As you can imagine, many of our group could not endure this absurd 7-hour delay. The fate of the statue is still in limbo, but we are continuing our efforts to seek a home for the statue.

Happily, in the past four weeks, the Heritage was robust with lively activities and participation: our delicious Calabrian lunch, thanks to the skills of Joseph Fasano; the film *Benvenuto Presidente* was well-received (closed captions are in English); the polenta dinner was amazing thanks to the energetic cooking efforts of the Tricarico Club and line-dancing led by Lucia Clemente; language classes continue with Delia Schizzano, please sign up; our monthly Cena Fuori at Zanotto's Market on Foxworthy was a treat... all provided a great start to our year of activities.

Thanks to Ken Borelli for organizing the dinner. Many of us could be seen in the check-out line after dinner stocking up on some of the store's unique offerings.



For starters, the nimble orchestra opened with the popular overture *L'Italiana in Algeri* by Rossini, followed by works from Martucci, Verdi and the ever popular Puccini (*E lucevan le stelle*).

When Pasquale Esposito joined the orchestra onstage, the energy from the audience was palpable. He was charming, entertaining, humorous and fully exercised his impressive vocal talents. After the intermission he sparkled in a sequined jacket as he went on to sing beloved favorites, including *Con te partiro*, and *Nessun Dorma (Turandot)*.

The orchestra was conducted by Maestra Emily Ray, a petite and most capable woman who had excellent control throughout. She also managed to display a warm and mutual rapport with Pasquale in some playful onstage interaction.

* How I Remember Teatro San Carlo *

I'm a little bit familiar with Teatro San Carlo. In the 1920's my mother and father used to go and see opera performances. They heard Caruso sing La Boheme.

In the 1930's after I was a debutant, I started to go to San Carlo with my parents. I heard Beniamino Gigli, Tito Schipa, and Giacomo Lauri-Volpi and Toti Dal Monte-Sorprano in various operas, but even today nobody sings Pagliacci like Beniamino Gigli.

I remember when Hitler came to Naples in 1938. There was a big parade.

At night, in his honor, there was a gala performance at Teatro San Carlo with the

opera Aida. The theater was decorated in white roses and other white flowers. Even the ladies wore white dresses. It was a performance to remember. I was there with my mother and father.



My cousin Mario Martino, Generale de Carbineri, was assigned to be Hitler's escort for his total stay in Naples. I remember Mario's wife, Elena, was hysterical because she was afraid if someone tried to kill Hitler, Mario would take the shot.

Teatro San Carlo was closed during the war and reopened in 1944 after the Americans came to Naples. I went to see La Traviata. It wasn't very good.

This, for me, was the last time.

In July 1945, I married an American Aviation Officer and started a new life. In 1946 I left Italy, but I came back every

year afterwards with my husband and four children.

AN INTERESTING BIT OF HISTORY ABOUT ONE OF OUR FAVORITE PAINTINGS



In 1938, Benito Mussolini escorted Adolf Hitler for two hours in Florence's Uffizi Gallery, one of the world's oldest art museums. Hitler was a frustrated artist himself and was already planning his own colossal art museum in his hometown of Linz, Austria.

Three years later, Mussolini had the Uffizi pack up 34 crates of art and send them to Germany.

The pace of outgoing art accelerated after Mussolini was deposed and the Allies made their way toward Tuscany. Late in July 1944, the Allies arrived on the southern bank of the Arno.

On August 13, 1944, the Nazis grabbed a cache of paintings taken from the Uffizi and hidden in Alto Adige in northern Italy, among them Luca Signorelli's The Crucifixion with St. Mary Magdalen. They did not crate the paintings, nor did they protect them with anything but straw. The Nazis drove off with them in open trucks, exposed to the weather and jostled by poor roads. Florence officials tried to stop them, unsuccessfully.


A lucky chance led to the discovery of yet another cache of paintings that the Germans had squirrelled away in Castello di Monteguoni, a 13th-century castle in Firenze. That July, the Eighth Indian Division took over the castle as their headquarters. While exploring, a Maratha soldier discovered 261 works of art stolen from the Uffizi and Palazzo Pitti. Among them was Botticelli's famous Primavera and his masterpiece, The Birth of Venus.

The British and Indian armies turned the paintings over to the MFAA (the Monuments, Fine Arts, and Archives section). The MFAA began a third and final phase to their mission: uncovering artwork stolen by the Nazis, much of it already hidden in Germany. The MFAA found The Crucifixion with St. Mary Magdalen and other Florence works in a Nazi hiding place in a jail cell in San Leonardo, Italy. They returned them to Florence with great fanfare in July 1945.

Without hesitation he befriended the somewhat lost sailors and found that the three of them were all seeking something different. One was searching for adventure, one for beauty, and one for mystery. Little did Michele know that by joining this trio of wanderers he would enjoy a great adventure, find astounding beauty and solve an abiding mystery of Capri.

Enjoy this lovely little read of about 150 well-crafted pages. Red Sails to Capri is somewhat old-fashioned in its gentleness and exotic atmosphere. This story is a lovely way to be introduced to Capri and its now well-known "mystery."

Il Ballo del Doge e altri divertimenti: Carnival delights and celebrations

La magia di Carnevale è arrivata! Quest'anno (2018) le feste durano da sabato il 27 gennaio fino a martedì il 13 febbraio. È il periodo che tradizionalmente precede la quaresima e conclude con il mercoledì delle ceneri, primo giorno di quaresima.

The magic of Carnival has arrived. This year (2018) the holiday lasts from Saturday the 27 of January until Tuesday the 13 of February. It is the period that precedes Lent and concludes with Ash Wednesday, the first day of Lent.

In particular the events that take place in Venice are really special It is the moment of the year when la Serenissima surpasses her natural beauty and indeed becomes a garden of earthly delights!

Quest'anno il Ballo del Doge avverrà sabato 25 febbraio presso il palazzo veneziano del 15° secolo che si affaccia sul Canale Grande — Palazzo Pisani Moretta. Il nome del ballo deriva dal titolo del capo dello stato Doge, "Duke" in inglese. Ogni anno al ballo partecipano da quattrocento ospiti vestiti in costume d'epoca. Le maschere, naturalmente, sono obbligatorie.

Perhaps the most elegant of affairs at this time of the year, that inspire and cause one to fantasize and dream are the





Venetian costume balls. There are many throughout the city, but the most elaborate is Il Ballo del Doge. This year the Ballo del Doge will occur on Saturday, February 25th, at the 15th-century Venetian palace that flanks the Grand Canal — the Palazzo Pisani Moretta. The ball's name is derived from the title of the elected head of state — Doge or "Duke" in English. Every year the ball is attended by four-hundred guests dressed in period costume. Masks, of course, are obligatory.

Il Ballo del Doge has been described by Vanity Fair as "one of the most exclusive parties in the world. Guests have included members of European, Middle Eastern and Asian royal families, celebrities, and leaders in international business and finance. It is an exclusive affair and tickets are quite expensive.

L'idea del ballo deriva da Antonia Sautter. (Infatti le immagini che vedete in quest'articolo sono del sito di Antonia) Ogni anno crea un'esperienza unica che permetta agli ospiti di esplorare i loro cinque sensi – vista, udito, gusto, tatto e olfatto. Non appena gli ospiti varcano la soglia del palazzo, entrano in un mondo di sogni incredibili, che sicuramente li delizierà e li stupirà. Antonia, non solo costruisce scene insolite e belle come sfondo del Ballo, ma crea anche abilmente costumi sontuosi e maschere fantastiche, che coprano i volti più famosi. Per intrattenere i suoi ospiti organizza esibizioni di acrobati audaci, artisti teatrali e abili musicisti.



The Ballo itself is the brainchild of Antonia Sautter. (Infact the images you see here in this article are from Antonia's website) Each year she creates an elaborate experience that allows guests to explore their five senses - sight, sound, taste, touch, and smell. As soon as each guest crosses the threshold of the palace, he enters an incredible dream world that is sure to delight and amaze. Antonia not only designs unusual and lovely venues, but also skillfully creates sumptuous costumes and beautiful masks, designed to conceal the most famous of faces. To entertain her guests, she provides performances by daring acrobats, theatrical artists, and accomplished musicians.

- Articles must be submitted in either Word or PDF format, or as email text. PDF documents must have text that can be selected and copied. PDFs made from scanned hard copies will not work.

Photos

The IAHF media staff reserves the right to use images at their discretion.

Transmission:

Image files should be sent as email attachments, not embedded in a text document or in an email message.

Format:

- JPEG preferred; BMP, EPS, GIF, PDF and TIFF formats may be acceptable as well.
- Photos should be big, bright, and sharp, with no timestamps or watermarks. Low-quality photos or out-of-focus photos cannot be used.

Size:

- Send full-size, unedited, high-pixel-count files. Make sure your email program doesn't downsize the files. Sizes of 500 KB and larger are preferred.
- Each photo must have an individual name. Leaving the name of the photo as named by your camera is suggested.

Credits:

• Original photos should include the name of the photographer. If you are not the photographer, you must give credit or secure permission to use the photos with your article.

Captions:

• Please provide captions as either email text, as a Word document, or as a PDF document


