The Italian American Kitchen

Digestivi

The following recipe highlights an often overlooked culinary tradition in Italy--"digestivi'. And as the name denotes they are similar in purpose used for a tonic and or digestive aide. They are usually herbal infusions and by far the most common as noted in the "Italian Notebook.com" is Nocino. Many families have their secret recipies that verge on complex chemical formulas! Crossover digestivi into the mainstream include Limencello, Vermouth and Campari. In fact, one of my favorite drinks is a Nigroni...that is appoximately 1/3 Campari, 1/3 Gin and up to 1/3 sweet vermouth, over ice with an orange slice. It is an explosion of flavors, the herbs in vermouth, Campari and gin make for an interesting set of flavors, and it is a good summer sipping drink. For those brave souls who want to try to make Nocino here is the recipe.

There's quite a penchant around in Umbria for bitter digestive liqueurs made with infusions of vegetables or herbs and spices. All are guaranteed to put hair on your chest, and the reigning king is definitely Nocino. Nocino's main ingredient is unripe green walnuts (noci), infused in alcohol with various other flavourings varying by recipe and the region—found all over Italy, it is most popular in the center and north.

Nocino (from a quirky old family recipe):

Ingredients:

20 chopped green walnuts, picked at dawn on the Feast Day of St. John the Baptist (24 June) before the dew dries (natch!)

- № 30 dried petals of a scarlet rose
- № 6 whole crushed cloves
- № 3/4 cinnamon stick
- 🏽 strips of the zest of one lemon

1. Add all ingredients to 1 liter of alcohol in a large glass jug, seal, and place in sun for 40 days, shaking daily.

2. After 40 days, prepare sugar syrup with 500 g sugar and 500 g water. Add to the infusion and strain through filter paper.

It is said that Nocino improves with time, thus many tend to age it for 6 months to a year. Of course elderly neighbors and relatives consider this nonsense and will start drinking it the day after it's filtered.

And they all have very hairy chests. 🍬

Legislature Deplores WW II Treatment of Italian Americans



More than six decades after World War II, the California Legislature has passed a resolution calling the U.S. government's treatment of Italian Americans following Japan's attack on Pearl Harbor a "fundamental injustice."

While the federal government's forced internment of Japanese Americans is more widely known, thousands of Italian Americans also were characterized as enemy aliens and forced to leave their homes or endure other hardships.

Senate Concurrent Resolution 95, characterizing such treatment as unjust, passed the Assembly and Senate this week without a dissenting vote. "The Legislature formally acknowledges the events of World War II represented a fundamental injustice against Italian Americans, deeply regrets these acts, and reaffirms its commitment to preserving the rights of all people," the resolution said.

SCR 95 is needed to "help repair the damage to the Italian American community, and to discourage the occurrence of similar injustices and violations of civil liberties in the future," the resolution read. Sen. Joe Simitian, a Palo Alto Democrat who proposed SCR 95, said Congress took similar action earlier this decade. "The treatment during World War II of people who were unjustly considered 'suspicious' because of their ethnic background was a sad chapter for our state," Simitian said in a written statement. Simitian noted that 10,000 Italian Americans were forced to leave their homes during WW II - and greater numbers were required to carry identification cards, were subject to curfew, or faced travel restrictions.

In some cases, property belonging to Italian Americans was seized and law-abiding immigrants were denied their livelihoods, such as fishing along the coast, Simitian said. "For survivors of that experience and their descendants, I hope this resolution will provide a long-due measure of recognition and respect," he said. Restrictions on Italian Americans were lifted on Oct. 12, 1942, less than a year after they had been enacted.

Simitian said he introduced SCR 95 at the request of a constituent, Chet Campanella, in the senator's annual "There Oughta Be A Law" contest. Campanella's parents were subject to curfew and searches of their home, Simitian said. "Given America's ongoing conflict abroad, the World War II experience is an important reminder of the need to respect the role and rights of those who have ties abroad," Simitian said. **

October is National Italian American Heritage Month

The year 2010 marks the 21st anniversary of the 1989 proclamation by President George H. W. Bush designating October as National Italian American Heritage Month.

Thirty-One Days of Italians List for October 2010

The following list was compliled by Janice Mancuso of Cary, North Carolina. It focuses on Jancice's interest in things Italian and an a confluence of Italian-American history during the month of October. I asked about some of the dates and she noted: " The dates are assigned based on a particular event in each person's life, starting with the Honorary Members, who are permanent on the list. After correlating dates to the Honorary Members, for the first List in 2007, the remaining dates were assigned to those voted onto the List. Those voted to the List keep the same date for each year on the List, leaving less available dates to work with; however, when going through each person's biological resources, any number that coincides with an available date is significant. In 2010, Menotti is on the 8th, because he founded the Spoleto Festival in 1958; Dean Martin had a 15-minute radio show, so his day is the 15th, and Frazetta was 22, in 1950, when he left an apprenticeship to become a full fledged artist. Her is Janice's October History month list:

October 1: The Italian Immigrant (A day to honor every Italian who journeyed to America from Italy.)

October 2: Amadeo Pietro Giannini (Established the branch banking system in America.)

October 3: Guglielmo Marconi (Known as the Father of Radio for his experiments with long distance wireless transmissions.)

October 4: Filippo Mazzei (Supporter of American freedom during American Revolution. Thomas Jefferson's inclusion of "all men are created equal" into the Declaration of Independence is a paraphrase of Mazzei's "All men are by nature equally free and independent.")

October 5: Antonio Meucci (Original holder of the patent for the forerunner of today's telephone.)

October 6: Joe DiMaggio ("The Yankee Clipper" led the NY Yankees to nine World Championships.)

October 7: Mario Lanza (Renowned tenor and film star in the mid-1950s.)

October 8: Gian Carlo Menotti (Opera composer, founded the Spoleto Festival of Two Worlds.)

October 9: Father Pietro Bandini (Missionary for Native Americans. In 1898 established Tontitown, "a perfect example of colonization," in Arkansas.)

October 10: Enrico Fermi (Discovered radioactive elements that heralded the nuclear age.)

October 11: Antonio Pasin (Created Radio Flyer wagon.)

October 12: Christopher Columbus (Navigator that changed the world, opening trade routes and immigration from Europe to the Americas.)

October 13: Maria Montessori, M.D. (Developed an educational method for teaching children.)

October 14: Henry Mancini (Awarded 20 Grammys and 4 Oscars for his film and television scores.)

October 15: Dean Martin (Popular 20th century entertainer of stage, screen, radio, and film.)

October 16: Vince Lombardi (Football icon.)

October 17: Mother Francis Xavier Cabrini (First American citizen to become a saint.)

October 18: Enrico Caruso (World's most acclaimed tenor in the early 1900s.)

October 19: Luisa Tetrazzini (World known soprano opera singer of the early 20th century.)

October 20: Frank Capra (Acclaimed 20th century film director, best known for It's a Wonderful Life.)

October 21: Arturo Toscanini (One of the world's greatest orchestra conductors.)

October 22: Frank Frazetta (Legendary fantasy and science fiction artist.)

October 23: Robert Mondavi (Greatly influenced the wine industry in America.)

October 24: Fiorello La Guardia (First three-term Mayor of New York City, and credited for changing its landscape and building the foundation for the city's growth after the Depression.)

October 25: Amerigo Vespucci (Namesake of America.)

October 26: Geraldine Ferraro (First woman to be nominated on a major party ticket as Vice President of the United States.)

October 27: Constantino Brumidi (Known as the "Michelangelo of the [U.S.] Capitol.")

October 28: Rocky Marciano (The only Heavyweight World Champion to retire undefeated.)

October 29: Frank Sinatra (International entertainment icon.)

October 30: Andrea Palladio ('Father of Architecture,' wrote The Four Books on Architecture, the most famous and influential books on architecture of all time, and still in print.)

October 31: Your Favorite Italian (Celebrate someone not on the list, but greatly admired.)

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A Visit From the Italian-American Community Service Agency by Ken Borelli



At last month's regional lunch we had the privilege of hosting the Executive Director of the Italian American Community Service Agency, Anna Maria Pierini. She shared with us the purpose and vision of the agency. Anna Maria also noted that the center was incorporated in 1916 to help with social issues related to the then immigrant community. In addition to that roll, today their mission is to support many of the seniors in the San Francisco area who need assistance maintaining their independence within a home setting. They provide social and outreach programs to this population and keep them connected to community life. This is a vital task in helping keep people supported and engaged with friends and neighbors. Anna Maria noted that their cliental includes all those who have had on going connections with the Italian American community, including many non Italian Americans who through affinity and marriage identify with the culture and social network. The agency funding is all through donations, bequests and fund raisers. No public monies or grants sponsor their activities. The Agency truly has grass root support from the local Italian American community.

Anna Maria also noted the service agency is unique in the United States in the scope and types of services they provide. She also pointed out there is a great need out there in terms

of outreach to those who for a variety of reasons often are shut in and isolated. The goal of strategic intervention is really about prevention, and breaking down the negative consequences of isolation, such as poor dietary practice, a decline in personal grooming, and keeping connected to the daily realities of life. She concluded her talk with a discussion about some of our needs in Santa Clara County and her willingness to visit a group of IAHF members and help set up a support network for our own community. While we do have services in Santa Clara County, there are very few that really address the specific and sometimes unique needs of our cliental especially from an Italian American perspective. This is certainly a challenge, but it is also an opportunity for our various Italian American organization to collaborate in, so we can help to provide the service basics, such as outreach, friendly visiting, and bilingual service referrals. If we have some members who would like to take this project on, Anna Maria would be willing to meet with you and we can begin this task. Let me know via the IAHF if this is a project that your interested in working on.

Regional Lunches Go Global

August concluded part one of our regional lunch series. After two years we have visited each of Italy's regions, sampled some of its culinary faire and learned perhaps more than we realized about the diversity that is modern Italy. I am sure you have heard the terms "Arm Chair travelers" referring to learning about a region by reading a book; however we at the IAHF became "kitchen table travelers", sampling some of the typical dishes of a specific part of Italy. Many of these dishes were made in consultation or actually from those members and friends who had roots in the region. A lot of research went into this culinary project. The afternoons also fostered many new friendships and interests about Italy. The group became know as the "kitchen cabinet"!

While technically we should start our regional tour over, the influence of Italian cuisine really goes beyond its land boarders and interacted with other parts of the world. We want to explore those culinary experiences before we re-visit the regions and provinces of Italy. We are continuing our adventures with a visit to the Italian Swiss, or Swiss Italian Canton of Switzerland known as "II Ticino". Several members of the IAHF trace their roots to that geographical area. Their cuisine looks to Milano

and the Italian Lake area as well as some of the other Swiss Cantons and makes for some great dishes. The lunch will be on Thursday, October 21, and our chef for that event is Linda Filice. Don't forget our special guest artist, David Evison, pianist and song stylist. There will be a schedule and flyer out shortly for the other dates, but some of the areas we want to cover include, Italian American and Italo-Argentine flavors, and foods from the Albanian Italian community. In our Santa Clara Valley a lot of families, especially from Southern Italy trace their Italian roots to specific Albanian Italian villages and in fact one of our chefs for next year, Massimo Chiessi, will be visiting his relatives in Sicily and going to pick up some of those specialty dishes. We await his return and many stories. In fact his goal is to organize a tour to his area of Sicily. Another area very much overlooked is the Italian influence in East Africa, stemming from an on and off culinary and economic connections , so we would like to check out some of the foods from Eritrea too.

As is goal of the regional lunches if you have a passion for a specific region and want to help in the preparation of the lunch contact Rosa at the IAHF and we will be in touch. Norma Mestice's kitchen team will help support you. In addition part of the fun of these events is coming and sharing a story or two after the meal about the area, especially about your families experience in the region at hand. August was one of those months....On one level we were very busy with the work on the Festa and enjoying the celebrations. At the same time there was a sadness too in a cluster of losses of long time members, and friends of the IAHF and our local Italian American community. The IAHF wishes to acknowledge these passing's and express our condolences to the family members.



Pat Restucchia, our former president in 1981 and 1982, and long time board member along with his wife Marie(now deceased) were extremely active in the life of our community. Pat spent much of his early childhood in Sicily but he was born in Waltham Mass. Part of the World War II generation Pat served in the US Army and an inter-

preter for the allied forces. He was also a Vice President and Manager for the Bank of America and for a time specialized in international banking, traveling throughout North Africa and the Middle East. He served the IAHF in a number of volunteer capacities from Festa, fundraiser's, and his presidency. His leadership was invaluable as we worked on securing the foundation facility and setting in place many of the management systems we utilize today. He also was a past president of Sons of Sicily and Gli Amici Club. Pat is survived by his daughter Deborah Barton (Gary), son Michael (Mona) and sister Connie Rotolo (Joe).



Al DeRose, was a volunteer's volunteer. He, along with his wife Lee (now deceased) were strong IAHF boosters and someone you could always count on to help our foundation out -- from hard labor, to raffle donations from the DeRose Winery in Holister. One of his major accomplishments along with several other members was building

the symbolic IAHF Cart that we actually show at all our feste. I am not sure who all were involved in the construction of the cart (perhaps some one who knows more can send us an update) but I suspect it was a fun project that many a bottle of wine and friendship was incorporated into its construction. It definitely was a labor of love. Al was born in Calabria and when he came to the area, his talents were put to good use as an orchardist, and local farmer when this valley was a rural paradise. He had a passion for classic cars and the famous T Bird and part of a loving family of nieces and nephews that also reflect the " Al and Lee De Rose" creativity gene.

Henry Bertucelli, another long time San Jose resident, friend of the IAHF and part of the "cart construction team", also recently passed away. He too was a veteran of World War II fighting in the south pacific. He was preceded in death by his wife Edith. Both were active volunteers with the IAHF. Also they were part of the network of community people that represented the diversity and richness of our foundation and community.

Palmira Abronzino, the mother of the past president of the Sons of Italy, her daughter Linda, is another long time mem-

ber of our Italian American community. She along with her now deceased husband, Umberto helped to establish "Calcio" or soccer in this valley long before it became the "in sport". I would say they helped make it the "in sport". They were assisted in this project and by our one time IAHF sports writer Linda! Palmira was a long time member of the order of the Sons of Italy, volunteering in numerous capacities at countless events. She was a native of Manciano, Arezzo, Italia. Her brother Leo and sister in law Irma are part of our regional lunch fan club.

Walda Bradly, a singer and vocal coach, friend of the IAHF, one of our biggest opera boosters in the valley. As long as we have been doing our IAHF opera events Walda has attended. We will be remembering her at our annual World of Italian Opera this December. I was guaranteed to see her at least twice a year. She taught at San Jose State, and provided voice lessons in Italian, French and German, and a supporter of Italian culture especially in the arts. It is a reminder too that our culture and heritage transcends our local Italian American community. It represents an important part of what we as a culture contributes to the greater South Bay Community.

And finally as we go to print we were sad to hear of **Lawrence "Larry" Pugno's** passing. Dr. Pugno was a professor of secondary education at San Jose State University. He was a long time IAHF member and , attended many of our events, especially our Opera nights and regional lunches. Larry served in the navy in both the Mediterranean and Pacific fronts during World War II and is survived by three children many grand children and great grandchildren. Upon retiring from the university he founded two book stores, one in Murphy California and one in Willow Glen.
