Our Vibrant Italian-American Community

No man, and I may add, no organization, is an island. As we celebrate our 30th Festa and the 35th year anniversary of the founding of the IAHF, it is timely to reflect upon our 3 C's: cooperation, coordination and collaboration, and acknowledge our

partners with whom the IAHF is engaging on so many levels. First and foremost, this month brings the tremendous achievement of putting on a great Festa. It could not happen without the efforts of so many people, groups and special

sponsors. This is an on-going process that provides all of us with the ability to celebrate and appreciate the vibrancy of our Italian American Heritage! In addition to the Festa, the IAHF is engaging in several more ventures to follow up on the Festa experience. There will be flyers out about the events, but I want to highlight some of the exciting parts of these current activities.

FROM CALABRIA TO CALIFORNIA.

In collaboration with American Italian Historical Association, its Western Regional Chapter, we are excited to present a special program on Sunday, September 26 about the Slow Food movement and its counterpart, the Sustainable Agriculture movement. Both aspects of this movement have their roots in Italy's slow food movement, founded by Carlo Petrini. His motivation included counteracting fast foods and the need to call attention to the connectedness of food on the

local environment. The program will start

with a video that highlights some of these

issues. The video is called "Calabria to

California." It is a video project conceived by Jennifer Kendzior, of San Francisco and Vincenzo Candido of Calabria. It is a work in progress, and two parts of the video will be shown at the IAHF. One clip will be of a farmer in Candido's village of Castelislano, Calabria, and a second clip and sequal is a contrast to similar issues in California with local farmers, including Tommaso La Manna. The video will be followed by a local panel composed of Phil Cosentino and representatives of the local chapter of the Master Gardner Association of Santa Clara County. There will be a delicious light dinner, composed,

of course, of fresh produce. After the film and dinner there will be a follow up discussion regarding the local scene, the video project

and some of the issues related to sustainable local agriculture, including growing local produce. Given this valley was once known as the Valley of Heart's Delight, the wonders of fresh sustainable agriculture is

not far off our radar, especially if you're still working in your home gardens and or visiting the local farmers markets. "Lets Grow"!

TWO ANNIVERSARIES! THE MISSION CHAMBER ORCHESTRA: 15th & THE BIRTH OF MODERN ITALY: 150th — On October 9th, an equally special event is being planned in cooperation and collaboration with the famed Mission Chamber Orchestra, and its conductor and IAHF honoree, Emily Ray. It is an arts benefit for

This is also a cooperative venture as part of the a San Francisco Bay Area Initiative under the auspices of the Italian Consul General and the Italian Cultural Institute, as we regionally begin many activities to highlight 150 years of Italian Nationhood. How to Get There: Caltrain

Caltrain provides train service from Diridon Station going north to the Peninsula and San Francisco and south to Gilroy. Please note that the last northbound train departs Diridon Station at 10:30pm on Monday-Saturday and at 9:00pm on Sundays.

How to Get There: Light Rails

The VTA Vasona Light Rail also serves the HP Pavilion at San Jose area with a light rail station near Diridon Station and on San Fernando Street at Delmas Avenue.

The Vasona Light Rail service connects Campbell to HP Pavilion at San Jose and beyond to downtown, north to Mountain View and south to Santa Teresa. Please check http://www.vta.org/ for full VTA light rail schedules.

In addition to Caltrain, VTA (Valley Transit Authority) buses also services Diridon Station.

Parking

There are over 6,000 parking spaces located within a ½ mile radius of the HP Pavilion at San Jose. Approximately 1500 spaces are located on-site in the large parking lot next to the building with entry from either Santa Clara or Julian Streets. There are another 500 spaces in the lots less than one block from the building off Santa Clara Street at Autumn, Montgomery and Cahill Streets. There are many other parking lots located throughout the area, usually opening 2.5 hours prior to the scheduled start time of the event. The charge for parking ranges from \$3.50 - \$15 for most events.

Giuseppe Mazzini: The Soul of Italy by Ken Borelli

As we begin to highlight some of the major figures in the founding of modern Italy as part of our acknowledgement regarding the 150th year anniversary of the establishment of the Italian nation, it is appropriate to start with Giuseppe Mazzini, also known as the "Soul of Italy". His life spanned a critical epoch in the emergence of the Italy of today. He lived, worked and struggled from 1805-1872. While he lived to see an emerging state, he did not live to see his dream of an Italian Republic come into being. That was to be much later after World War II. Mazzini was not only a patriot and

philosopher, but a dedicated visionary who influenced emerging independence movements throughout Europe, the world and began a dialogue for a united Europe. In many ways he was, and is still, a "world figure".

What is also interesting about Italy's drive towards unity, was the fascination and interest in the republican model of government as represented by the United States of America amongst other countries, in contrast with the prevailing monarchies of the time. In an era where communication was slow and limited, you found Mazzini working and agitating through out the land, from the north to the south, for a unified nation state. There were local rebellions throughout the peninsula and deep in the fray so many times you would find Giuseppe Mazzini. He was a member of "The Carbonari", a secret society founded for the purpose of the independence and unification of Italy, and also founded the Young Italy Movement (La Giovine Italia). His goal was nothing more than "One, Independent, Free Republic".

Saying all this really only provides the framework or a glimpse into what was to be a life's calling and struggle. His life reads like an unbelievable novel. Under sentence of death in absentia many times throughout his life, and living in exile in Switzerland, France and England he became a magnet for the rights and aspirations for a unified Italy. In doing research on Mazzini's activities, one can only be amazed not just on what he helped accomplish, but the dangers and tragedies surrounding so many of these early Italian patriots, many of whom were killed by local rulers in the dangerous patch work of political governments and interest that composed the geographical boundaries of today's Italy. For example, in 1849 an Italian Republic was declared in Rome, and Mazzini was part of the governing body along with Garibaldi. The Pope in power, and head of the Papal States located in now most of Central Italy, called on the assistance of the French to crush the resistance, and it was exile again for Mazzini. Interesting to note too, for many emerging or newly self-identified Italians, it was during this time of turmoil that the seeds of immigration as a way to flee political oppression started to become a reality and option. California was one of those fabled land of dreams for many an Italian exile, along with South American, especially Argentina.

For Mazzini, the eventual development of an Italian Monarchy under the House of Savoy, and Victor Emmanuel II, was a bittersweet experience. He lived on and off in exile in London, even during the consolidation of a united Italy under a monarchy. In an attempt at reconciliation in 1867 he was provided a seat in the governing Italian Chamber of Deputies, but true to his republican ideals, he refused to serve the monarchy. He died in Pisa in 1872 and his funeral took place in Genoa. His legacy was one of a unified, free, and eventually, Republic of Italy.



Venice Poised for First Official Woman Gondolier

Giorgia Boscolo First Woman to Pass Practical Exam to Become a Gondolier; Written Test Awaits

(*AP*) Venice is on its way to having its first official female gondolier. City Hall said Friday that Giorgia Boscolo had passed the practical exam to become a gondolier.

She is the first woman to pass this test, considered the most difficult of those required to pilot a boat on Venice's canals. According to the ANSA news agency, Boscolo is a 24-year-old mother of two.

Boscolo must pass one further test, a written, multiple-choice exam, in order to join the guild of official gondoliers.

Deputy Mayor Sandro Simionato says her success breaks "900 years of male dominance" in the profession, and that it will likely inspire more women to try.



An IAHF Member Supported Recipe Exchange

* This recipe is submitted by IAHF Board of Directors Member Chuck Frascone

Stuffed Boneless Pork Chops with Red Wine Sauce

This is an Italian inspired recipe that I developed and it has gotten great reviews each time that I've served it; usually with roasted root vegetables and a crispy Caesar Salad with shaved Parmesan cheese.

Ingredients:

- Four large boneless pork chops (1 1/2" thick)
- [™] 1 tsp ground sea salt (or to taste)
- [™] 1 tsp ground black pepper (or to taste)
- → 1 tsp garlic powder (or to taste)
- № ½ cup chopped golden raisins
- № ¼ cup chopped fresh rosemary

- № ½ cup coarsely grated Parmesan cheese
- ♣ 4 chopped garlic cloves
- ♣ 4 chopped shallot sections
- № ½ cup olive oil
- Dark red Wine
- № ¼ cup balsamic vinegar
- 1. In a bowl, mix salt, pepper, garlic powder, chopper raisins, chopped rosemary and grated Parmesan cheese. Slowly drizzle in and blend enough olive oil to cause the dry ingredients to stick together well but not become runny (the mix). Set aside until needed.
- 2. Opposite the fatty side of each pork chop, cut an opening about 3 to 3 1/2" long and create a square pocket down toward the fatty side.
- 3. Spoon equal amounts of the mix into the pocket of each pork chop, seal the opening with tooth picks and set aside.
- 4. Put ¼ cup olive oil in a large deep skillet over *medium high heat*. When the oil is heated, place pork chops in skillet and brown both sides until golden brown. When browned, remove chops from skillet, cover and set aside.
- 5. In the same skillet over *medium heat* (add a touch more oil if needed) add the shallots and garlic and sauté until shallots are translucent.
- 6. Return the chops to the skillet with the shallots and garlic, add enough dark red wine to cover the lower half of the chops. *Increase heat and bring to a boil then reduce heat to low*, cover the skillet and let cook for five minutes. After five minutes, flip the pork chops, return the cover and cook for five additional minutes.
- 7. Remove the chops, cover and set aside.
- 8. Add the balsamic vinegar to the skillet and mix with the remaining liquid. Turn heat to *high*, stirring constantly, reduce the liquid by half.
- 9. Into a container, pour the remaining liquid through a fine mesh sieve to remove the solids, remove the tooth picks from the pork chops, plate individually and spoon some of the wine sauce over each.

Frank Sinatra Jr., the son of famed singer and actor Frank Sinatra, will perform at the historic California Theatre in downtown San Jose on Saturday October 23rd, accompanied by a 50-piece orchestra from Symphony Silicon Valley. The Orchestra of Symphony Silicon Valley, under the musical direction of Terry Woodson, adds an impressive accompaniment to Mr. Sinatra. A champagne reception precedes the 8:30 pm performance in the newly restored California Theatre.

"Sinatra Sings Sinatra" is a benefit for the Stroke Awareness Foundation of Santa Clara County. Proceeds from the show will help support the efforts of SAF which promotes community awareness

about the signs of stroke, and the establishment of Primary Stroke Centers for the emergency treatment of stroke victims. Stroke Awareness Foundation, www.strokeinfo.org, has improved community awareness and better prepared families and loved ones for what can be the devastating effects of Stroke. SAF has been instrumental in helping Santa Clara County have the greatest concentration of certified Primary Stroke Centers in the U.S. We worked to pass groundbreaking legislation that assures all stroke victims in our community will be taken to a Santa Clara County Certified Stroke Center.

Frank Sinatra Jr. is the son of famed musician and actor Frank Sinatra and Nancy Barbato. He is the younger brother of singer and actress Nancy Sinatra, and the older brother of television producer Tina Sinatra.

Frank Jr., who served as his father's band leader for many years, recalls wanting to become a piano player and songwriter from his earliest days. By his early teens he was performing at local clubs and venues. At age 19 he became the vocalist for Sam Donahue's band. He also spent considerable time learning the music business with Duke Ellington.

Sinatra spent most of his early career on the road. By 1968 he had performed in 47 states and 30 countries; appeared on several television shows; hosted a summer replacement for The Dean Martin Show; sung with his own band in Las Vegas; and had been the opening act at major casinos.

In 2006, Sinatra released an album entitled That Face! which includes the songs You'll Never Know and the self-penned song Spice. A veteran of many television appearances, he recently played a guest spot on The Sopranos, and has appeared on two episodes of The Family Guy. **

The Tiny Republic of San Marino

Repubblica di San Marino - what!? There is another country inside Italy? Si! It is the Republic of San Marino, located between Emilia-Romagna and Le Marche, sitting high (750m) upon Mount Tiano.

San Marino was founded in 301 A.D. by Saint Marinus, a stonecutter from Dalmatia, who was fleeing from religious persecution under Emperor Diocletian. San Marino still has a reputation for welcoming people seeking protection.



Even Garibaldi stopped there for 24 hours in 1849 when fleeing the Austrians with his troops. During WWII, over 100,000 were given safe haven. Today, the Republic has diplomatic relationships with over 100 countries, is a member of the UN, and even held the Presidency of the Council of Europe for six months in 2006-07.



San Marino claims to be the oldest republic with the longest continuous democracy in the world. Its first legislative statutes, enacted in 1253, are still in effect! (The 31,632 San Marinesi are very

proud of that fact.) In 1797, Napoleon legitimized San Marino by recognizing it as a sovereign power. Two Captains Regent govern for six months, appointed by the democratically elected Great and General Council.

Three towers now sit high upon the mountain in the old town. The first, Guaita, built in the 11th century, was critical in the battle against Rimini's 15th century Malatesta rulers. The second tower, Cesta, was built in the 13th century, while the third, Montale, was erected in the 14th century. All still standing tall, for the MANY visiting travelers to see.

Mike Console: Newest IAHF Board Member

As part of our new board member series, we have asked "Traveling" Mike Console to tell us a little about himself and his aspirations for the IAHF.

Mike writes: I am a 100% first generation Italian-American, born in Springfield, Ill. My papa came from Sicilia, Castal Vetrano, and my mother came from a small village on the Adriatic Coast in the Abruzzo Region. They met in the USA, after my Nonno took a liking to my dad while working together in the coal mines, and announced "he had a nice girl for him"...his daughter. Well, it worked out OK as I was the second child born out of eleven "ragazzi" (seven boys and four girls)! In my youth I delivered newspapers to Abe Lincoln's home town of Springfield, Ill. For the longest time as a young child, due to all the publicity about Abe Lincoln, I actually thought he was still alive. In 1945 the family moved to San Diego, California. There I graduated from high school and San Diego State University. Soon after high school my Uncle Sam got me and I was drafted into the US Army for 21 months. I spent time in Japan (medical operating room technician) and Korea as a medic, about a mile from the front lines, a little further before the famed "MASH Units". Upon returning to San Diego, I continued my education at San Diego State University, and all through my high school and college days I worked at the well known El Cortez Hotel as a pantry man (preparing their cold buffets). After college I worked for the San Diego Recreation Department for ten years and opened up two new community centers and was the principal center director.

I had the opportunity to advance myself by moving to San Jose in May of 1965 and worked for twenty six and a half

years for the San Jose Recreation Department as a principal district supervisor. I made one significant trip back to San Diego to marry my wife to be, Vera. I retired in 1991 to take care of my wife who was seriously ill and who eventually passed away in Sept. 1993. We were married in 1970 and had two children, Kristina and Gary. Since my wife passed away I have been busy raising my children; volunteering at Senior Centers; escorting senior trips; serving on the Board of Directors for retired city employees; senior games committee; SIR Trip Chairman for Branch 10; State Travel Committee for SIR's; travel director for California Pioneers of Santa Clara County; and now a Board Member of the IAHF.

As a new Board Member of the IAHF, I would like to see more activities that require the members to interact with each other more, in a fun and informal way while at the same time learning about and preserving our rich heritage. I am pleased that the IAHF has started this theme with the cooking classes, mask making, recipe swapping, etc. I also want to see more classes such as Italian Card Games, arts and crafts, tournaments, bocci ball, Italian folk dance lessons and ball room dances. And travel: one day trips and extended trips. Trips are where I can particularly help out, and I am always open to suggestions as to where our members and their friends would like to travel as a group.
