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Life Time Acheivement Award Event for Shorty Joe Quartuccio on October 23, 2011



SHORTY JOE QUARTUCCIO -- A LIFETIME ACHIEVEMENT

Sharing the joy of music is a true gift, not many can lay claim to. We at the IAHF were privileged to share a glimpse into why we celebrated the achievements of Shorty Joe. On Sunday October 23, 2011 we rolled back the years to the 1950's and 1960's as we heard the Western Swing music of our honoree. Joining the IAHF in doing honors for this life time achievement award included City and County Officials with Dominic Cortese, representing his son Dave Cortese, speaking from the heart as a long time friend, as well as Anthony Martino, from the Italian Mens Club, and Richard Vanucci, from the American Italian Historical Association, along with many friends, family and those who just wanted to learn more about this Sicilian cowboy. Our IAHF Hall was actually turned into an old time radio studio, as Radio Station KKUP's Steve Hathaway did a taped broadcast that was later played on his country western music program on Sunday nights. Joining Shorty Joe on stage was award winning steel guitarist and friend, Bobby Black and Richard Chon and the Saddle Cats. Many long time musicians were also present in the audience, but sadly too, we missed having Anthony Quartuccio, Jr. and a cousin Joe D'Angelo performing, due to the passing of Shorty Joe's brother Anthony Sr. (refer to the note in our paper). It was a sadness that we all felt, for Anthony Sr. too was a long time friend of the IAHF, and had several exhibits of his art work at many of our past art shows. Even so, because so many plans were set we decided to do the event, with a moment of silence for Anthony along with a special makeshift exhibit of his paintings during the performance.

Along with Shorty Joe's long time musical experience, it should not be lost that he is/was a major innovator in the development of the western swing genre that included a blending of a "big band" sound to the more traditional cowboy music of the day. In many ways all music is fusion and it grows and changes in response to innovation and the time. It is here that Shorty Joe made a major impact in the development of his stlye, which also resulted in him being honored by The Western Swing Hall of Fame. One tribute that I can't forget was an observation by Richard Chon, the leader of the Saddle Cats. Speaking about this award ceremony and the diverse background of all the musicians who have helped make this a true American forms, as a Korean American he had much empathy with Shorty Joe's Italian and Sicilian Heritage and how profound it was that we at the IAHF recognized (in style) the contribution of one of our own to the arts in America today. Along this same line, we will be having an additional article from Richard Vanucci, a musical historian in his own right, of the significance of Italian Americans to Western Swing and Jazz in the greater bay area, and the roll of many other not to well known Italian Americans and their association with the popular musical life of the times. For a multitude of reasons, it was very difficult to track the Italian roots of many of the popular musicians of those times, especially from the 30's well up until the 60', but our Italian roots do have a direct connection with the popular music of the day even going back to the first Jazz recordings from New Orleans, and Hank La Roca's "Tiger Rag"!

WITH REGRETS

We at the IAHF were saddened to hear of the loss of several people who had long time connections with our foundation. They included Don Tamone, Sam Curto, and Anthony Quartuccio. Don was a long time friend of the IAHF and tended our bar and lounge area, along with his brother Richard, for many years at our special events, and opera programs. We also received a note from Pat Fortin of Le Grand, California, and the Curto Family, to let our members know that Sam Curto passed away in Madera Community Hospital (Oct 12). Sam was active in the IAHF's cultural life until moving out of the area, but enjoyed staying in touch via our IAHF NEWS. It is a timely reminder that we still keep our connections to those with roots in our valley and foundation.

And on the eve of a special life time achievement award for Shorty Joe Quartuccio, his brother Anthony died in Paso Robles, California. Many of you are aware of Anthony's artistic achievements, as a chronicler of a passing rural Santa Clara Valley. He was a "natural landscape painter" who captured so many regional scenes of an earlier California, including all the California missions to the tip of Baja California! He also did the mural above the altar of Holly Cross Church in San Jose. It is titled the "Mural of the Resurrection". Given the proximity of his death to the event for his brother, we developed a mini memorial exhibit and collection of his paintings and writings at the awards ceremony. A card was collectively signed and sent to the family.

Our collective condolences to those families impacted by this loss, from the IAHF. And a word of comfort to meditate upon comes from new board member Chris Hudson's mom, Mary Hudson, quoting from her book *PAINTINGS OF MAMA AND PAPA, AND THE NEW AMERICANS*. Mary wrote: "We all left home one at a time, leaving the folks alone in the old house by the river {Around McCloud, in rural Northern California}. Mama and Papa never left the old house. We always had a home to come back to. Mama made few changes in the house so the warmth of our childhood days was always there. Mama always wore her apron and Papa wore his railroad suspenders. Real love never dies, does it? It seems to go on even after material sense says there has been a change. The only change there really is that it disappears from sight and has found a permanent lodging in our hearts", From a collection of stories from Mary Hudson, sweet and to the point.

SAN MARTINO, CASTAGNE E VINO

Italy - The Chapel dedicated to San Martino and frescoed by Simone Martini in the 14th-century is certainly one of the masterpieces in our Basilica di San Francesco. St. Martin of Tours, 4th-century saint, is pictured as he gives his cloak to a freezing beggar outside the walls of Amiens. According to legend, the beggar will reveal himself as Christ. The association is there: St. Martin, the bringer of warmth.

In Italy, in fact, a spell of warm weather following the first freeze is called "l'estate di San Martino" (the summer of St. Martin", i.e., the "Indian summer" in Anglo-Saxon cultures). Due to an inordinately warm fall this year, la Festa di San Martino, November 11th, was warm and sunny but did not fall during un'estate di San Martino: we haven't yet had the first freeze.

In rural cultures, the *mezzadria* (share-cropping) contracts were stipulated during this period, with termination of some contracts and the renewal of others. At this time, farm families might move into a farmhouse on another farm; in fact, "fare San Martino" means "to make a move". An old Italian proverb announces the Saint's feast day as the time to slaughter the pig and enjoy wine, "San Martino, uccidi il maiale e

bevi il vino". That might have been possible years ago – when November brought the cold weather needed for the curing of prosciutto.

A Piedmontese saying, "Oche, castagne e vino, tieni tutto per San Martino." ("Geese, chestnuts and wine, save it all for San Martino") refers to the period before Advent when farm families indulged in abundant meals before the "lean" period prior to Christmas. And legend says that when St. Martin was elected Bishop of Tours, he hid in the countryside, preferring the contemplative life. A flock of screeching migrating geese revealed his hiding place. Wine consistently stars in the many sayings of this feast day. "Chi vuol far buon vino, zappi e poti a San Martino" ("For a good wine, hoe and prune at San Martino"); that is, the vines should be pruned after the grapes are picked and before new growth.

Interpreti Veneziani



A group of IAHF members and friends attended the Interpreti Veneziani concert at the Le Petit Trianon Concert Hall in San Jose on Sunday, November 13th.

From Venice, Italy, this fabulous ensemble of master musicians received several standing ovations and everyone enjoyed their performance. They made their debut in 1987 and were a main attraction for residents and visitors to the romantic city of Venice. In Venice they play some 350 concerts and have over 60,000 subscribers to their own season at the San Vidal Church where Vivaldi used to play.

Interpreti Veneziani has performed in the United States, Turkey, Italy, Holland, Venezuela, the Bahamas and at the prestigious Australian Melbourne International Arts Festival. They have over 18 albums to their name.

CHRISTMAS IN THE PARK

Christmas in The Park is an annual holiday tradition that takes place in the heart of Downtown San Jose at the Plaza de Cesar Chavez. For over 30 years, this whimsical event has brought people from all over the Bay Area together during the holidays.

Each year, the two-acre park is transformed into a holiday fantasy with over 60 musical and animated exhibits, glittering lights and the 60-foot Community Giving Tree. Some of the original displays housed in one of the largest exhibits, the Lima Train, include a melting snowman, caroling mice and elf woodcrafters. The Victorian Village is a 25-foot Christmas tree surrounded by the animated Nutcracker Suite exhibit and Santa's Photo Den. Guests enter a winter wonderland of lights, songs and local entertainment while strolling through an enchanted forest of trees decorated by San José schools, community groups and businesses.

Christmas in the Park is a non-profit organization that is supported through fundraising efforts by the volunteer Board of Directors and is free to the public. Children can have their photograph taken with Santa, watch nightly entertainment and enjoy holiday themed refreshments.

The City of San José is an in-kind sponsor and works closely with a volunteer Board of Directors in providing services. It takes more than 260,000 volunteer hours from Board Members and the community to bring this well-loved holiday tradition to San José each year.

CHRISTMAS IN DARING COLORS



Changes in the political theatre, the economic recession and my desire to stay positive have prompted me to design Christmas in unusual daring colors. To be different doesn't have to be challenging. This year anything goes as far as colors, but it seems that warm, rich jewel tones are dominating the scene. Some people are finding their decorating answers in vintage stores to save money and to add that *je ne sais quoi* of retro elegance. Some other people are just putting together new stuff with no rules.

To unite all the details of your casual Christmas dining table, I suggest to find a nice linen or cotton peacock blue tablecloth, but if you want to add elegance, your Christmas tablecloth should be made of silk, smooth, shiny, luminous silk, which I adore as tablecloth. Blue tones are some of the new colors for winter 2011-2012, precisely peacock blue, indigo blue and sky blue.

To be different it takes a little fantasy. I believe any dining table prepared for a special occasion need a surprising element. Find two common picture frames 4x6 or 5x7, they don't have to be the same size or shape, spray them in apple green, print your Christmas menu from the computer and insert it in each frame. Place both frames on each end of the table in front of the most important people.

Next to each place setting, add a small present wrapped in peacock blue tulle fabric tied with apple

green ribbon. Inside of the small package there will be a little something, nothing really valuable under \$5.00, the thought is enough.


One idea could be a scented candle wrapped in a napkin that can have various functions later. Your guests will feel very special and will take home a momentum of your Christmas.

I like to mix sets of modern and antique or old plates all together with no rule. Even those white plates with a gold ring edge that every one has as a remembrance of someone's wedding gift might be used together with a modern plate. Arrange each place setting with three plates of different sizes and a napkin on top.

This year, I will turn to nature for my Christmas table decorations. My tablescape will be designed with a low arrangement made of a few bell pep-



Nature doesn't go wrong in combining textures; colors are always the right colors in each season. I can enjoy the decorations for a while longer past the holidays if I fancy and once I discard them back into the nature, they will dissolve again to become part of the earth once more.

This is my advice this holiday season: stay away from artificial decorations, be respectful of the environment, support your local artists and craft people, buy local, buy handmade and give unique gifts from your heart.

This Christmas use happy colors for your table, they will slap the winter out of anybody's face. Dare to be different, dare to be unique, dare to do the contrary of everybody else.

If you are in a bind, or feel the stress of the holidays, relax and let me take care of your decorations for the holidays, or any organization you need to do to make your successful holiday events.
