IAHF EVENTS HEALTH POLICY

In accordance with Santa Clara County and CDC guidelines at this time and until further notice, FACEMASKS ARE NOT REQUIRED TO ATTEND INDOOR EVENTS. THIS INCLUDES EVENTS HOSTED AT THE IAHF.

In an effort to keep our members safe, the IAHF has adopted the following policy:

All who attend an activity or event which takes place at the IAHF Hall will need to be fully vaccinated or present negative COViD-19 test results dated within 72 hours. This policy follows the guidance set by Santa Clara County and the CDC.

This means that when checking in at an event at the IAHF Hall, we will ask you to show your

vaccination card or your QR Code on your cell phone from the State Registry (see below).

If you are not fully vaccinated (i.e., it has been a full two weeks since your second shot of the Pfizer/ Moderna vaccine or two weeks since your Johnson and Johnson vaccine), you will need to show a negative Covid test from within 72 hours of the event. Many local counties are implementing measures to require proof of vaccination to at-

tend certain events or enter select venues. To facilitate proof of vaccination status, you can register your vaccination status at https://my-vaccinerecord.cdph.ca.gov. With a validated registration, you will receive a QR Code on your mobile phone which you can show upon entry. This will serve as proof of your vaccinations at most venues.



Our humble beginnings . . .

As many read this article, you will personally remember when the Italian American Heritage Foundation was founded as an organization in 1976. Throughout the next eight or nine years, the IAHF was able to raise large sums of money to purchase our current property at 425 North Fourth Street. Since then, we have held countless events spanning almost four decades celebrating our Italian history and culture. The heartbeat of the IAHF.

Our realistic present . . .

As the pandemic is (hopefully) in our rearview mirror, the Board of Directors and all our wonderful volunteers at the IAHF are doing everything in our power to bring back our celebrated events and striving to create new events. There seems to be an excited spirit amongst our members as I'm able to speak with them at our events that we've held so far. I also hear of positive reports from other members, both Board and membership, about the joy of meeting back in person and enjoying each other's company.

March 31st was the deadline for the IAHF Scholarship Applications. Seven Applications were submitted. The Scholarship Committee met to begin the review process. The role of the Committee is to read and evaluate each application based on how well it meets the criteria for the specified scholarship. Each member of the Committee conducts an independent review of each application. The Committee then convenes to discuss, rank and select the qualified recipients. The recipients are then submitted to the IAHF Board for approval of grant funds. The successful awardees were notified first by a phone call which was followed by a personal letter that they will be awarded a scholarship.

The Review Committee consists of the following members: Marie Bertola, Ken Borelli, Felix Dalldorf, Jan Prinzivalli, Maureen Susino and Marie Rose Dalldorf (Committee Chair). The

Committee represents expertise in the fields of education, analysis and culture.

This year three different scholarship grants were available:

- IAHF Merit-Based scholarship grants are awarded to high school and community college students pursuing degrees at an institution of higher learning.
- Need-Based (new this year) scholarship grants are awarded to high school and community college students who demonstrate financial need and are pursuing degrees at an institution of higher learning.
- Il Cenacolo grants are awarded to graduate or undergraduate students currently attending a four-year institution and pursuing graduate-level studies and who demonstrate interest in Italian arts and culture, including language.

The IAHF Scholarship Program has been in existence for decades. It should be noted that from 2015 to 2021, the IAHF awarded

\$121,200 to 85 recipients. This is a pretty impressive amount! The IAHF would not be able to award these grants without the generous contributions of our donor members.

The Scholarship Award Ceremony will be on Sunday, June 5, at the IAHF Hall at 1 pm. The Ceremony is an opportunity to acknowledge the achievements of these very deserving students. Join us to experience the excitement shared by these scholarship recipients and their families as they are honored. The event is open to family and friends of the awardees and anyone who would like to attend. We especially encourage our new Board of Directors to come and share in accomplishments of the recipients.

This year, we hope to have the new Italian Consulate in San Francisco, Sergio Strozzi, or his representative attend the event along with Anna Zeppieri, Director of the Education

Office at the Consulate General of Italy in San Francisco who has joined us in years past. We are also pleased that this year we may have both the Past President of II Cenacolo, David Cobb, and the incoming President, Alex Kugushev, attend the event.

Il Cenacolo is an Italian organization started in 1928 that preserves, enhances and encourages all aspects of Italian arts, language and culture and recognizes the unique contribution of Italian heritage in the history and life of the San Francisco Bay Area. The Il Cenacolo Grant is awarded to students who demonstrate past and current interest in Italian arts and culture through academic course-work including language studies, performing arts, music and fine arts

The Council on International Education Exchange (CIEE) is looking for host families. The local coordinator for CIEE, Josephine Lee, asked that I reach out to the IAHF community and others who receive this newsletter to consider hosting an Italian student in your home this year.

Students will be here for 2 semesters (10 months). However, there are also a few students who will be here for one semester (5 months)! The students will be arriving at the end of August and will be placed at the high school closest to the host family's home. There are 100+ students in the program who

are requesting to come to California so we need as many host families as possible!

We currently have 18 students from Italy who need to be placed; we might be receiving more in the future. If you would like to host students from other countries as well, you are more than welcome to do so as the CIEE also has students from Germany, Spain, Brazil, Pakistan, Norway, Belgium and Slovakia!

Host families need to provide shelter, a bed and food for 3 meals a day for the student (cereal in the pantry or food for the student to prepare their own food counts as well). Ideally, the student would have his/her own bedroom with a window and a bed, OR they can share a bedroom with someone else in the family who is the same gender and within 4 years of age of the student. The students come with his/her own pocket money and medical insurance coverage.



Host Families Needed

Families can also host up to 2 students if they'd like, as long as both the students are from separate countries. The students know they are expected to take part in family activities and responsibilities like chores!

Many host families have created everlasting bonds with the students and have even visited the students in their respective countries and been welcomed in their personal family homes. All families are welcome to apply -- single individuals aged 25 or older, couples with big kids, couples with little kids, couples with no kids, empty nesters, single parent families - you name it!

On a personal note, years ago Felix and I hosted a student. You read compelling stories that the student writes about wanting to come to experience the American lifestyle. At the same time, we also had a 4th year medical student from Germany who was finishing an internship at Stanford. We thought this would have been a challenge having two people who spoke little English, especially with our two young sons, Joseph and Johnathan. However, it turned out that the language barrier was no problem. The experience was a very positive one which resulted in a lifelong friendship that continues today.



ANTOINETTE'S SISTER

Thank you so much for this recommendation! Antoinette's Sister is a new book by Diana Giovinazzo. For those of you who have been to Naples and especially have visited the Royal Palace in Caserta, you will love all the background this book gives. Equally, if you have an interest in old Italy under the Bourbon rule when the south was known as The Kingdom of the Two Sicilies, you will enjoy a sweeping coverage of this explosive era.

Our story begins in Vienna at Schonbrunn Palace, the seat of the Royal Hapsburgs. It is the 1700's and Empress Marie Terese is very busy arranging the marriages of her sixteen children to various powerhouses throughout Europe in order to strengthen and maintain the Hapsburg influence. Basically, this was the modus operendi of the royal families throughout history. Queen Victoria certainly participated in the chess game of royal blood lines. Because of deaths

due to smallpox in the palace, Marie Carolina Charlotte, who had originally been destined to be Queen of France, instead became the wife of King Ferdinando. He was the very reluctant, spoiled, childish and undisciplined heir to the Kingdom of the Two Sicilies, which encompassed Naples down to and including the island.

As we all know. Marie Antoinette, who was her most beloved sister and dearest friend, went to the ill-fated King Louis of France. The novel runs on two equal themes. One is the development of Queen Charlotte from her youth as a 15-year-old bride to a remarkable and admirable queen. She overcomes numerous obstacles and is able to do so because of her strict, no-nonsense, well-educated upbringing. She was groomed to rule. Her husband is basically, and true to history, a buffoon whose only purpose is to impregnate Queen Charlotte (15 times) and then leave her to govern while he played his games.

The second parallel theme is the relationship of Marie Carolina Charlotte and Marie Antoinette. We see them develop from childhood almost like twins. Many chapters include a letter from Queen Marie Antoinette to Queen Charlotte. The letters are fiction because Queen Charlotte destroyed all correspondence with her sisters and brothers before her death. The letters are important to the text because they are a masterful way of revealing the dramatic world situation swirling around the royal houses. America had broken with England with the help of France; but now the idea of democracy takes a foothold in France and thus the French Revolution, the Reign of Terror, the guillotining of King Louis and Queen Marie Antoinette and the rise of Napoleon Bonaparte. Napoleon, of course, is eyeing Italy.

Throughout the novel you will meet many colorful, historical characters who influenced Queen Charlotte, Naples and the building of the magnificent royal palace of Caserta. Put Caserta on your bucket list!

Italian Word or Phrase of the Month • From Linda Gaudio Binkley

Sono sazia/o - I'm full

After a robust meal, this phrase will come in handy.

Sazia is an adjective, so it will agree with the subject: sazio for a male, sazia for a female.

The word is derived from the verb *saziare* which translates to satiate, to satisfy, or to have enough. So, I'm full in English can be I'm satisfied, or I have had enough

Ne vuole ancora un po'? – No grazie, sono sazio. Would you like some more? – No, thank you, I'm full.

Sono sazio/a is also considered more polite than the common alternative: Sono pieno/a. Some people consider the word pieno (full) more vulgar, especially in polite circles, because it projects the unpleasant image of a full belly.

Various adverbs you can add to sazio to emphasize your state of fulness.

- Sono così sazio! = I'm so full!
- Sono talmente sazio che... = I'm so full that...
- Come sono sazio! = I'm so full! (lit. How full I am!)

Sono talmente sazio che non mangerò per una settimana! I'm so full that I won't eat for another week!

And let's not omit essere pieno/a come un uovo; literal translation: to be as full as an egg.









What is savory, flavorful, delicious and melts in your mouth? Hint: If you attended the Poached Polpette class in April, you know exactly what I'm talking about! This class kicked off our cooking class season with Robert Brower and his assistant, Mary Reynolds, teaching the class.



Robert, who is a certified food handler, provided detailed information on the specific equipment and ingredients to make this recipe. For example, he stressed the importance of using an NSF (National Sanitation Foundation) approved thermometer, pasture raised eggs, Italian seasoned breadcrumbs, Pecorino Romano cheese, San Marzano tomatoes and Kosher salt. These ingredients make this recipe not only appealing to the taste buds but healthy as well.

Next, Robert reviewed the ingredients to make the sauce, "Brodo Di Mamma," which he simmered and which produced a fragrant aroma. He then hand-mixed all the ingredients for the polpette, scooped out ¼ cup of the mixture for each polpette, rolled the mixture into balls and gently placed them in the brodo to simmer for about an hour and measured 160° with the food thermometer.

While the polpette were simmering away, Robert presented the first five parts of his delightful "Sunday Gravy" program. The presentation began with a history of spaghetti through film. It included amusing clips featuring the likes of Buster Keaton, Rita Hayworth and even Disney's "Lady and the Tramp." There were also clips from famous Italian restaurants in New York such as Joe's Restaurant and Emilia's in the Bronx. Another entertaining portion of the presentation included a segment of Martin Scorcese's 1974 documentary called "Italian American." In this documentary, Martin Scorcese interviewed his mother, Catherine, and his father, Charles, regarding their Italian origins. This was a priceless interview and included Catherine's description of how she made "the sauce."

After the presentation, the polpette were ready to mangia. The sauce and meatballs were poured over steaming Ziti and arranged in containers for the class to enjoy. The sauce complimented the tender, tasty polpette and Ziti.

Between Robert's instruction and presentation, it was a culinary evening to remember!
This is the adapted recipe that Robert taught:
Gina's Brodo di Mamma e Polpette – From Heirloom Kitchen: Heritage Recipes & Family Stories from the Tables of Immigrant Women, by Anna Francese Gass. Recipe from Anna's mother, Gina Crocco Francese.

For the Sauce (Brodo di Mamma) Ingredients:

- 5 fresh basil leaves
- 1/2 cup (120 ml) extra-virgin olive oil
- 2 garlic cloves, peeled and lightly smashed
- 2 teaspoons crushed red pepper (optional)
- 10 ½ cups (three 28-ounce cans) whole San Marzano tomatoes, trimmed and hand crushed
- 3 tablespoons double-concentrated tomato paste
- 1 tablespoon coarse Kosher salt (Diamond Crystal)
- 1 teaspoon freshly ground black pepper

For the Polpette (meatballs)

Ingredients:

- ½ pound freshly ground pork
- ½ pound freshly ground veal
- ½ pound freshly ground beef (85/15)
- 1 tablespoon chopped parsley
- 1 tablespoon Kosher salt
- 1 teaspoon freshly ground black pepper
- 2 large eggs, beaten
- 1 cup freshly grated Pecorino Romano cheese
- 1 cup breadcrumbs, preferably Italian seasoned (not Progresso)
- ½ cup milk
- ½ cup Brodo di Mamma, cooled

Directions for the Brodo (sauce)

- 1. Tear the basil leaves into pieces. Combine the torn basil, crushed garlic and olive oil in a small pan and heat over very low heat, allowing the basil and garlic to "steep" in the olive oil for 10 to 15 minutes. The oil will become fragrant and rich with flavor-be careful not to let the garlic burn or go beyond a medium-brown color.
- 2. Meanwhile combine the hand-crushed tomatoes and 2 cups of water in a large pot. Add the tomato paste, diluted, salt, and pepper. Remove the infused olive oil from the heat, strain the basil and garlic out, adding the oil to the pot. Stir to combine. Bring to a boil over medium-high heat then immediately reduce to a simmer. Remove ½ cup of the brodo for the meatballs, setting it aside to cool.

Directions for the Polpette (meatballs)

In a large bowl, hand-mix with open fingers all the ingredients. (This prevents overmixing.) The mixture will be very soft but resist the urge to add more breadcrumbs as this makes a tender, melt in your mouth meatball! Once all the ingredients are just combined, scoop out about ¼ cup, and with wet hands gently roll into balls. Place each meatball on a baking





- sheet and repeat with remaining mixture, making approximately 16 to 18 meatballs.
- 2. Carefully place the meatballs into the sauce. If the pot seems to be full, simply shimmy the pot back and forth to make more room. (Do not stir with a spoon—you will break the meatballs.)
- 3. Simmer the meatballs in the sauce, with the pot partially covered, for an hour or more, or until the interior of a test meatball measures at least 160°F with an instant read thermometer.
- 4. Cook the dried pasta of your choice, all dente, and toss with some of the sauce. Garnish with additional chopped fresh basil and grated Pecorino Romano.
- 5. Remove the meatballs to a warm platter when ready to serve, either on the side or as part of a second course.

IAHF Recipient of Eagle Scout Project

Josh Nguyen first made his appearance as one of the interns from San Jose Works selected to work for the IAHF as part of the Winter 2020 cohort. Josh was a productive and daily contributor to our initiatives, and his contributions stood out, especially with the development of a Tombola game we were able to use for our premier IAHF Family Game Night. He went on to develop other fun games the IAHF can use for future family activities.

In May 2021, Josh was the first to propose a reunion for the interns from San Jose Works, which the IAHF hosted the following month in June. At that time, the IAHF received special recognition as the most involved host organization, having hosted over three dozen interns in 2020 and 2021. The reunion was the first post-pandemic gathering to be held at the Hall and was surprisingly well attended which resulted in other interns volunteering to help with the Fall IAHF Harvest Festival.

Early this year, Josh once again reached out to the IAHF to offer his services to complete his Eagle Scout project. Several alternatives were discussed, and the IAHF recommended the construction of planter boxes on wheels, which could be used for the backyard patio project. The planter boxes would be used to separate the backyard dining area from available parking. Having the planter boxes on wheels would allow for easy reconfiguration and for easy storage when not in use. Steve Ricossa, representing the IAHF Board who is also an active Scout Leader, and Felix Dalldorf, former IAHF President and former Cub Master and Scout volunteer, agreed to serve as Josh's co-mentors.



Josh was able to arrange for the design, provision of materials, assembly and delivery of three large planter boxes to the IAHF at the beginning of April, which was less than an eight-week turnaround time. The IAHF is also exploring the possibility of Josh's Troop performing a flag retirement ceremony at the IAHF.

Exciting Update: IAHF Library, Archives, Photos & Oral History Project

BACKGROUND

Back in "pre-covid days," the IAHF applied for and received funds from the Santa Clara County Historic Grant Program which is administered by the Parks and Recreation Department to support community endeavors that focus on maintaining and promoting local history programs countywide. This is an important statement and an attempt to preserve the diverse history of Santa Clara County. One of these threads is the contribution of the Italian American Community to the rich and historic ethnic diversity of Santa Clara County.

To these ends, the project has developed a number of "deliverables" or project tasks and goals to be completed over the life of the 3-year grant. The following then is a brief update of the grant and some of the landmark deliverables that are currently being worked on and in some areas completed. It comes as no surprise that during the Covid-induced lockdown, the IAHF had to regroup and reconfigure an action plan. Fortunately, we were able to do a lot of online work because there was a pre-established work plan prior to Covid. Some of the results are noted below.

STATUS OF THE ACTION PLAN


The IAHF has been able to repair and improve part of the IAHF Online Display Collection along with develop some amazing additional historic panel boards. The areas covered include an overview history of San Jose's Historic Italian Communities, the diversity within the local Italian American Community (ie Trabia, Tricarico, and Arberesh boards), a special historic terminal market board, panels from various donors of stained glass windows from Sacred Heart Church (the vast majority of them donated by Italian American families) and some overview boards on the history of the community, the Italian American Almanac and an introductory panel.

While bits and pieces of the collection have been shown as they have been completed at our regional lunches, there are also community outreach efforts underway. The first showing of a majority of the collection was at the Berryessa Neighborhood Association Center, which in many ways is a fitting introduction since there was so much history associated with the Italian community in the north side of town.

Another display will be forthcoming at a special celebration of the unique relationship between Opera San Jose and the IAHF. That will be on May 19 at a special event.

An in-depth review of the history boards, in the form of mini-lectures, is being planned for the IAHF Family Festa so that several people associated with each board will be able to present a particular component of Italian American History. Should you wish to view the boards or use them for a special event, they will be made available for public display by contacting the IAHF.

There are additional components to this multifaceted project. Next month, IAHF Librarian Madeline Damiano will review major updates from the archives and library component of the project. Her work and material will be a rich source of family history, lore and documents, easily accessed online and likewise a source for scholars and researchers about the diversity and achievements of the Italian American communities in Santa Clara County. Likewise, while the Covid experience curtailed a lot of face-toface activities, it also indirectly contributed to a wealth of "online" material that is now in the process of being cataloged by Dave Perzinski and will complement the documents and history boards in the form of oral histories.

Many members and friends of the IAHF have contributed to this project with photos, archival materials and donations. In a sense, this archival project will always be a "work in progress" since that is one of the ongoing purposes of the Foundation. The IAHF is dedicated to promoting Italian American Heritage, especially in our community. This special SCC Grant along with the work and commitment of so many members and with our invaluable archival collection will ensure a legacy for generations to come. As members of the IAHF, you are a part of this history and legacy, "treasure and share it"! Bravi!

EXCITING NEWS ON THE DIPLOMATIC FRONT FROM ITALY

The Republic of Italy just appointed its first female ambassador to the United States, Mariangela Zappia. She is a career diplomat and also served on Italy's permanent delegation to the UN and, prior to that assignment, was on Italy's permanent delegation to NATO.

In keeping with a strict rotation policy, the previous Consul General Lorenzo Ortona (2016-2021) in San Francisco has been reassigned, and the current Consul General is now Sergio Strozzi. Plans are currently underway for a visit to the South Bay.

I was excited and happy to learn at a recent meeting at II Museo in San Francisco that the prior Counsel General, Mauro Battocchi, has been promoted and appointed as Italy's ambassador to the Republic of Chile. Many of you realize that Chile, Argentina, Brazil and Uruguay are home to long-standing Italian immigrant communities with strong ties to Italy. So I am sure he will be a very busy Ambassador.

Interestingly too, San Francisco and California have had a historic consulate presence even prior to the unification of Italy in the form of the Kingdom of Savoy that later became the Kingdom of Italy. Some of the



earliest Italian immigrants to the Bay Area came from Chile in the 1850s! I wanted to add to the article the name of the US Ambassador to Italy but found out an ambassador has not been appointed under the current administration. They have an interim person called a "Charge d' Affairs," and his name is Tom Smitham.

As a point of reference, embassies are located in the capital city of a nation, hence Rome or Washington DC. Consulate offices are located in strategic areas of a nation depending on the needs of the country and special treaties and arrangements. A Consulate also has at its disposal vice consular offices, honorary counsel and vice consulates and consular correspondents. In San Jose, we have an honorary consulate, Salvatore Caruso, who is designated certain tasks and responsibilities by the Consul General. The area for the San Francisco Consul is quite large and includes many Western US States along with special projects including the Italian Cultural Institute, trade missions and services to overseas Italians. There is also a Consulate in Los Angeles with similar responsibilities.


